Are You An Episcopalian?

You don't have to be confirmed to be a member of St. Matthew's. And some of you, for whatever reason, have opted to be members of our church and not become Episcopalians. And that's just fine with me. The only reason you need to be a confirmed Episcopalian is if you're called to serve on the vestry. But the option of becoming an Episcopalian is always available to you.

How do you go about it? If you're a Roman Catholic or a Lutheran, you must be received. If you're a member of another Christian denomination—or no other denomination—you have to be confirmed. That happens when the bishop comes to do our youth confirmations, which this year takes place at the 10 a.m. service on May 11. You would come forward at any time to be received, confirmed—or if you've been confirmed, you may reaffirm your faith as an Episcopalian. In preparation, join the class my clergy colleagues and I will be teaching after the 10 a.m. service on Sundays Apr. 13, 20, 27 and May 4.

The course is called "What it Means to be an Episcopalian," and in it we explore together those things that make the Episcopal church unique, dynamic, interesting and to me — wonderful. To sign up for the class, call the Parish Office 234-9636.

I hope a lot of you will say "Yes." See you in class!

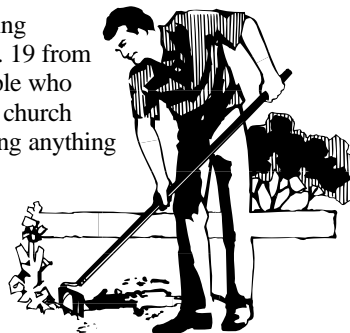

Make the Spirit Soar, Apr. 23

The Bedford Chamber Concert series resumes this spring, on Wed., Apr. 23, at 8 p.m. with music featuring the clarinet and flute. Internationally acclaimed Moran Katz will be showcasing the versatility of the clarinet in Bartok's brilliant and evocative Contrasts, written for jazz clarinetist Benny Goodman, as well as in Mozart's great Trio in E-Flat Major, popularly known as the "Billiard's" or "Kegelstatt" trio. Ms. Katz will also join Maestro Anthony Newman in his own work Chamber Concerto for piano and four instruments. First performed in Barcelona in 2005, where critics noted that it "ends in an explosion of optimism,"

tonight will be its American premiere. The concert will close with the legendary flutist Peter Bacchus playing Bach's mighty Sonata in E-Flat Minor for flute and piano and Vivaldi's popular Concerto in D for harpsichord and strings.

The 2007-08 series ends with our gala finale, on Wed., May 14. With more instruments, it will be a glorious concert that will feature two great concerti — the D Major of Haydn for orchestra and harpsichord, and the G Major of Mozart for violin and orchestra. The evening will conclude with Mozart's Symphony No. 33 in B-Flat, which was the first of his "big" set of last symphonies.

The Labyrinth is Coming!



Next month, St. Matthew's will host a 22' replica of the labyrinth laid in the stone floor of Chartres Cathedral near Paris, France. The Chartres labyrinth dates to around 1200, but labyrinths go back thousands of years before that. Medieval Christians walked labyrinths such as the one at Chartres instead of making the hazardous pilgrimage to Jerusalem to walk in the "footsteps of Christ." This Easter season, come on pilgrimage with St. Matthew's - without ever leaving Bedford!

Walking the labyrinth is a tool for reflection, meditation, and prayer. Following a single path that leads to the center and back out, you find yourself at once grounded and released to new experience and wonder. The labyrinth will be at St. Matthew's from Wed., May 7 through Mon., May 12. It will be available for individual use as well as guided sessions for different parish groups. Consortium of Endowed Episcopal Parishes Annual Conference

Kelley Johnston, Had Talbot and Robert Cummings accompanied Terry in representing St. Matthew's at the annual conference of the Consortium of Endowed Episcopal Parishes (CEEP) held in St. Louis, Feb. 20-23. CEEP is an organization of 120 endowed Episcopal churches from across the U.S. that brings together lay and clergy leaders for education and discussion on leadership, stewardship, and issues facing Episcopal parishes. St. Matthew's has been a member for several years.

This year, the theme was "Gateways to Understanding: Living Faith in a Changing World" and featured a provocative presentation by the Institute for the Future, a think tank in Palo Alto, that addressed the future forces such as global warming and the growing rich-poor divide that will impact all of us over the next ten years and what the implications are for the Episcopal Church. It made us appreciate the value of considering the changes that may happen in our Bedford community as we develop our long term plan for St. Matthew's.

In addition to the future forces presentation, there were some excellent workshops on leadership, endowment management, environmental issues, and stewardship that provided good food for thought regarding our own programs. The conference also provided great fellowship and opportunity to network and exchange ideas and experiences with our counterparts from other churches.

Since we view our CEEP membership as an opportunity to share our experiences as well as learn from others, we have proposed to the CEEP leadership that St. Matthew's lead a workshop at the 2009 conference to be held in New Orleans that describes the work of the Bedell Committee in making grants to other churches, such as St. Mark's and St. Mary's on the Gulf coast. In addition, we have proposed hosting a regional conference at St. Matthew's for CEEP members in our area.

St. Matthew's Future: Long Range Planning Committee

The Committee, formed last autumn, has had three four-hour sessions and numerous individual and team assignments, ably led by our co-member Jeff Freeman. This spring, we will be working on a draft "Directional Statement" for review and refinement with the entire spectrum of parish constituencies— committees, commissions, younger parishioners, older parishioners, 8-o'clockers and 10-o'clockers, and Women and Men of St. Matthew's. The Committee's intent is to engage the broadest

possible spectrum of our parishioners in this process of developing a plan for what we want St. Matthew's to be 10 or 20 years from now. Over the next months, we encourage every member of our church to think – and pray – about this initiative so that together we can forge a vision of the future that is consonant with the very best of our present and past. Whatever your constituency, we will be in touch!

Outreach spotlight: Caring Circle

The Caring Circle, offered by Hospice Care in Westchester & Putnam, is a supportive program for grieving children and their families. It was developed to respond to a need for age-specific, open-ended support groups for bereaved children in our community. The Caring Circle provides a supportive and welcoming community to help children deal with their feelings.



A child's reaction to death can include confusion, stress, and an increased sense of vulnerability. The added loss of a significant and meaningful relationship can impact a child's sense of identity, feelings of trust and safety, and his or her values and belief system. Children experiencing grief can benefit from an opportunity to express their feelings. The peer support groups of The Caring Circle use a variety of activities including art, music, games and creative writing to give children an opportunity to share and express their feelings. Bi-weekly support groups meet at locations in Yorktown and Yonkers.

In 2005, the Caring Circle introduced a one-day camp open to all participants. Last year marked the third annual day camp hosted at a home in Pound Ridge. Over 50 children were trained in juggling, scarf tossing and stilt-walking by performers from the Big Apple Circus. The day also included swimming, games, face painting, lunch, a visit from the ice cream truck and a finale performance by the Big Apple Circus.

The Caring Circle is coordinated by professionals from Hospice Care in Westchester & Putnam's staff and supervised volunteers who receive specialized training and ongoing education. Volunteers are always welcome and needed.



Hospice Care in Westchester & Putnam would like to the opportunity to recognize and thank the Women of St. Matthew's and the Outreach Commission for their continued support of The Caring Circle. As this program is free of charge to all participants, it is run solely on the generosity of our good friends in the community.
