## Bedford Chamber Concerts: Grand Piano Finale, May 11

The 2010-11 Bedford Chamber Concert season celebrating great concertos presents its grand finale on May 11 with a program featuring two pianos. The gifted young pianist Steven Beck will join Tony Newman in works by Mozart and by Dr. Newman himself. Mr. Beck, a Juilliard graduate, has been lauded as "one of the city's most admired young pianists ..." by the New York Times.



The concert includes Mozart's Concerto for Two Pianos in E flat, K. 365, originally composed towards the end of his years in Salzburg and most likely first performed by Mozart and his sister Nannerl. The outer movements radiate youthful confidence while the interplay between the two soloists may reflect the strong emotional bond linking the two siblings.

Mr. Beck will also perform Mozart's Concerto in C., K. 467, written half a dozen years later in Vienna and a fine example of how Mozart was raising this genre to a whole new, symphonic, level. The piece is perhaps best known for its haunting slow movement, used in the soundtrack of the 1967 Swedish film, "Elvira Madigan," that seems to transport the listener from the Classical to the Romantic era.

Rounding out the program is Tony's own "Tango and Fugue" for two pianos, a novel linkage of the sacred and profane. As a dance, the tango has never quite overcome its associations with its dubious origins in the slums of Buenos Aires.

The concert takes place at 8 p.m. in the Fellowship Room. Ticket prices are \$40, including the usual exceptional display of virtuoso desserts. RSVP: 914-522-5150

## Prison Ministry

*For I was in prison, and you came to visit me. – Matthew 25:36*

Bedford Hills Correctional Facility is a maximum-security prison for women. Only God can help many of the inmates achieve reconciliation and redemption for their terrible crimes. It is not an easy path. The Wednesday Bible Study Group and other parishioners are attempting to support the women of Bedford Hills in their search for God. At Christmas, we made a donation of candlesticks and candles for use on the altar of the prison chapel. We have been collecting used Bibles from parishioners to be given to inmates for their own private use in their cells. As a Lenten offering, we contributed copies of **The Secret Life of Bees** by Sue Monk Kidd, a wonderfully inspirational book, for their Episcopal book group. Several parishioners make regular friendship calls to visit with inmates, many of who have not had a visitor for years. We have all been struck by how strong the faith of these women is and what an important role Christ plays in their lives. Please keep these women in your prayers. ## A Little Bit of History... Needlepoint Kneelers

St. Matthew's Church, both inside and out, is a tapestry of beauty and grace. One of the most endearing features within the church is its needlepoint kneelers. There are 256 needlepoint kneelers in the sanctuary of St. Matthew's! That is correct---256 kneelers. I counted them. They have been designed and knitted by members of our parish for over forty years. The kneelers are often in memory of a family member or friend, and a photographic record of all the kneelers is kept in the Parish House. The project is ongoing.

There are also seven needlepoint cushions around the altar rail, a cushion for the Rector's chair as well as one for the Bishop's chair and several kneelers for Acolytes, Lay Readers and other clergy. None of these wonderful needlepoint pieces existed prior to 1965. It was in November of that year that Mrs. Walter W. Hitesman, Jr. and sixteen other ladies began a project to supply new altar cushions and proper cushions for the chairs and the kneelers of the clergy. A central theme was decided upon to symbolize peace. The designs on the altar cushions would flow to each other using sprays of olive leaves on a light blue background.

The cushions would be arranged in a specific manner. The middle cushion depicts St. Matthew with an image of the St. Matthew's key, which opened the door to the church, and for which this monthly bulletin is named. The first cushion, to the right of the St. Matthew's kneeler, utilizes pomegranates as a metaphor for everlasting life; the middle cushion depicts the Agnus Dei for Jesus as the Lamb of God; the far right cushion has HIS and a rose, symbols of Jesus and Mary. To the left is a cushion of Communion symbolized with wheat and grapes. The second cushion on the left has a fleur de lis, symbolizing the Virgin Mary. The final cushion on the left directly beneath the Church flag depicts the Seal of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

The lovely rug in front of the altar showing the dove of peace was the gift of Mrs. Harold T. Whitman.

# St. Matthew's School: A Great First Year

The end of the school year is just around the corner and marks a very important milestone—the end of the first year of operation for the St. Matthew's School (SMS). SMS, which operates in the space previously used by Hi-Ho Nursery School, opened its doors in September 2010 and welcomed 15 three year olds and 11 four year olds to its inaugural programs.

**Under the outstanding leadership of Director Stephanie Scanlon** and her wonderful teaching staff, the children have had a terrific year. In addition to their regular classroom activities, they are enjoying Spanish classes (taught by parishioner Elizabeth Foote,) yoga classes (taught by parent Kristle O'Brien,) music classes, cooking projects in the parish kitchen and wonderful nature walks in the woodlands.

One of the most special elements of the preschool program is the weekly chapel service led by Susan Wyper. Susan magically transforms a small area of the Fellowship Room into "God's Garden" complete with picket fence and leaves on the ground. To help develop the spiritual lives of the children, they hear stories and learn songs that reinforce the values of faith, love, hope and service to others. It is difficult to describe how heartwarming and inspiring it is to see Susan sharing her love of God with the little ones!

Parents have been very pleased with the school and word of its success is spreading rapidly. We are delighted to report that 14 out of 15 members of the three year olds class have enrolled in the fours program and that demand for the fours program is so strong we had to create a waitlist.

In spite of the abundance of 4 year olds, a "shortage" of three year olds left us with a smaller class than we had hoped. Stephanie Scanlon was able to come up with a very creative solution that will enable the school to better accommodate demand in the 3's and 4's programs. We will be opening up our threes program as a mixed-age experience, serving both 3s and 4s. This structure will address the shortage of three year olds and allow us to welcome additional families with 4-year olds who are very interested in the SMS preschool experience and who might otherwise have to be put on a waiting list.

**In the Fall of 2011, we will also begin welcoming 2 year olds** into the newly renovated nursery space. There will be separate Monday/Wednesday/Friday and Tuesday/Thursday sessions. Response has been terrific - there are already 13 children enrolled and only space for one more!

St. Matthew's School is also blessed to have a vibrant and very creative Parents Association that has helped to build a strong community among the parents; provide support to the teachers and staff; and raise funds to support the school. The Parents Association is hard at work planning the school's very first fundraiser, which will be in June at the Bedford Golf & Tennis Club! Invitations will be in the mail shortly.

Although the school does not receive funds for its operation from the church, we want to say a special thank you to the Women of St. Matthew's and the Bedell Commission, both of which made gifts to the school that were instrumental in enabling us to renovate and outfit the school space prior to opening.

**The St. Matthew's school is off to a fantastic beginning** and we are grateful to the members of the Vestry, the clergy, staff and all the parishioners for their guidance and support. If you are in the Parish House in the morning, please pop in, say hello and see the children in action.
