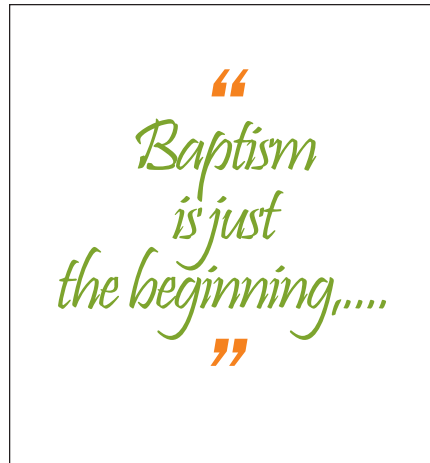

From the Rector

Getting Wet This Summer

If you are ever in certain parts of the Philippines on June 24, you will want to carry an umbrella. Or perhaps you'll want to be wearing a bathing suit. In any event, you'll want to be aware that on June 24, the Nativity of St. John the Baptist, you might very well get water thrown on you. Buckets of water, hoses of water, balloons of water, squirt guns of water—all make an appearance in what sounds like a wonderfully playful way of celebrating St. John the Baptist since, according to scripture, John baptized many and even got Jesus wet.

We have gotten wet a lot in church during the month of May. This year, in particular, we have had a number of baptisms. At All Souls, not only does the baptized person get wet, but after the baptism, the priest sprinkles the whole congregation with holy water. In the prayer of thanksgiving over the water we thank God for the water of baptism, "In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection. Through it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit." (*Book of Common Prayer*, page 306)



We share baptismal water as we baptize infants, children, and adults. More seasoned parishioners sometimes observe that once a child is baptized, the family seems to disappear. But this happens far less frequently than some might imagine. The young families I know make tremendous efforts to come to church, though they balance careers, parents in other cities, weddings of friends and family, and the occasional time away to get reacquainted with one another. We get the whole family wet at the time of baptism, and such experiences make a big difference in the life of the one baptized and in the life of the entire family.

Baptism is just the beginning, of course. As we live out our faith, we also share baptismal water in other ways. We share it symbolically by inviting them to church, bringing them to a program or mission of the church, or simply sharing our faith in some way. We make a strong witness to our baptismal identity when we serve in a leadership role at church, when we volunteer, and when we contribute financially. These various ways in which we live out our baptism drip with faithfulness as they help the church make a splash in the world.

All right, I know I've gotten carried away with the metaphors, but I hope you get my point, that baptism may seem like only the beginning, but really, it continues to be spread and lived out our whole lives. I hope that, wherever we may be, some of us get splashed on St. John's Day and continue celebrating our baptisms and sharing the water with others throughout the whole summer.

Father Beddingfield to Attend CREDO Conference

From June 12 through June 22 Father Beddingfield will participate in the CREDO conference at Bishop's Ranch Conference Center in Healdsburg, California. The conference provides clergy with the means to explore and deepen in four primary areas: spiritual, physical, vocational, and financial. Participants are selected at random from all active clergy with more than one year in the Pension Fund and the Fund pays for most of the cost.

Father Beddingfield will join approximately 30 other clergy (including former parishioner, now priest, Father Dan Gross) in the conference. During their time, participants will



meet in plenary sessions, small groups, and private consultations with faculty members.

For the several months leading up to the conference, Father Beddingfield has been working through the pre-conference materials and surveys that

focus on personal and professional wellness. Some parishioners have been involved in the surveys as well. Through this discernment and visioning process, and with the help of a faculty team of professionals, each participant builds a CREDO plan, which is a personal covenant based on his or her CREDO work and a formal expression of the experiences. This plan provides a personal baseline and strategy for growth and faithfulness into the future. ♦

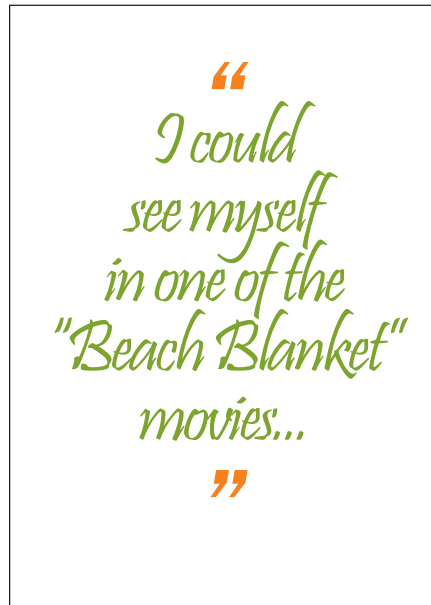

It's been a busy couple of months! Let me bring you up to date on where we are with several building and grounds related things.

My thanks to everyone who has been turning in the *Problem?* sheets that are on the welcome table and the kiosk in the undercroft. We've gotten some problems you've identified fixed and we're still working on others. Please keep the *Problem?* sheets coming—the way we make All Souls better/cleaner/more appealing is to keep working at it!

Our gardens were spectacular at Easter and only seem to be getting better. Neighbors and passersby frequently compliment us on the gardens in the context of what our gardens do for the overall appearance of the neighborhood. Aside from looking like a million bucks, our gardens are sending the right message about the kind of neighbor and the kind of church that we are. If you haven't taken time to thank one of our gardeners, please do!

In the next few weeks, ALL SOULS ARE GREEN, our new team focusing on All Souls energy efficiency and environmental footprint, is going to do an



initial inventory of what we need for easy, near-term energy savings (CFL bulbs, aerating faucet nozzles, weather stripping.) We'll be asking for volunteers on a Saturday early-June to do the installation. We're going to be tracking our energy and water usage and we're expecting real improvements. There's also a fair probability that the District of Columbia Department of the Environment Energy Office will get Federal stimulus money which could fund a free energy audit of the church—we're staying in touch with them.

With respect to handicap accessibility, I've sent an initial statement of work to our architect Marc Fetterman as a basis for a contract with him. We will contract with him to spend time with a number of groups within All Souls as well as meet with the entire congregation. In the course of those meetings, he will do two revised drawings of the accessibility project as both he and we as a community better understand what we want in the handicap accessibility project. Finally, the contract with Marc will allow for him to provide final detailed plans and a detailed estimate of cost to allow us to go forward with fund raising and obtaining bids for construction. In the next few weeks, Building Committee members will be visiting St. Alban's with Marc to get a firsthand look at their handicap accessibility instantiation. More to follow.
