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From Pastor Tom

Giving Christmas Away

Surveys report that the average American will spend \$646 this year on Christmas presents, slightly down from last year's \$658. They also report that most of us still do our shopping in stores, but roughly one-third of gifts are now purchased online. Although Black Friday remains popular for sales, most Christmas buying still happens closer to the holiday itself.

I have been praying and thinking a lot about the Christmas season as I prepare for an Advent series, "Giving Christmas Away". As I have studied the first encounters with the Christ child (Simeon and Anna in the Temple, the magi/wise men from the east, and even Joseph and Mary), I have been moved by the moment when they responded to what they saw. They each gave something away. For Simeon and Anna, it was a testimony. We could even call Anna the first Christian preacher. For the magi/wise men, it was gifts that they carried on their journey.

Remember that they did not plan to bring gifts; they were men, after all, and we never plan anything like that! For Joseph and Mary, it was the gift of their lives and time that would be spent fostering God's plan for the Christ child.

This has caused me to reflect on how I will respond to Christmas morning and the promise of the Christ child, especially since it arrives on a Sunday this year. I will certainly open presents-- hopefully not \$646 worth--and will certainly enjoy the gift of being with my family. But I suspect that I will need to have given Christmas away somehow before I can truly receive it. And I suspect that you will need to do the same. So here are some ideas.

Give the gift of time. You and your family can contact the Salvation Army to ring bells at kettles, contact Threads, Hope and Love to help prepare for Christmas giveaways (call the church office if you need contact information), or simply

make a visit to an area nursing home and visit the residents there.

Give the gift of treasure. Make a special Christmas donation to a great, local charity like The Children's Home of Peoria, The Baby Fold in Normal, Southside Mission or the Neighborhood House. On Sunday, December 18th, we will have an opportunity to make a special gift to these charities through our March to the Manger offering.

Give the gift of testimony. Connect with someone who is struggling to understand the Christmas message, perhaps a friend or family member, and spend time listening to them and sharing how much the promise of Christmas means to you.

For it is in giving away the holiday that we truly receive it. May the Spirit of Christmas come to you, and to me.

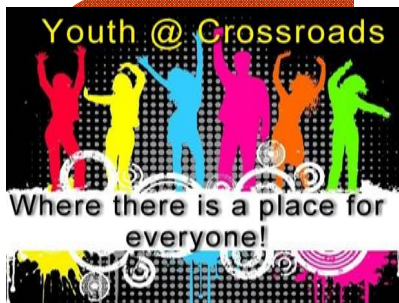

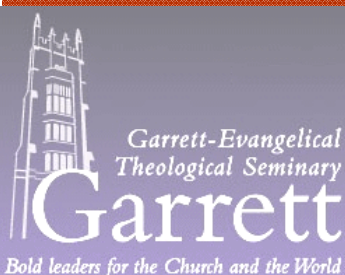

She is a second-year Master of Divinity student, primarily concerned with developing skills in providing pastoral care in healthcare settings, with hopes to begin a career in chaplaincy post-seminary. Kentina is also particularly interested in eschatological issues related to suffering, death, dying, and bereavement, and spiritual disciplines for

dealing with grief and loss.

Kentina had a friend who earned her Master of Divinity from Garrett-Evangelical through the Medill School of Journalism at Northwestern University. Her friend was the first person she had ever met who had attended seminary just because she was interested in studying theology and/or using her Master of Divinity in a context other than the traditional ordained pastoral ministry. Her friend now works as an editor/acquisitions specialist for a Christian publisher. Seeing her friend thriving in her field after having had a

great experience at Garrett-Evangelical sold Kentina on pursuing graduate studies there. In addition, the warmth of the admissions staff and student tour guides helped to seal the deal.

Kentina feels a very strong calling to both academia and to practical ministry. She sees herself pursuing a terminal degree and also pursuing certification from the Association of Clinical Pastoral Education as a chaplain after she completes her Master of Divinity. Having experiences at Garrett-Evangelical – both inside and outside of the classroom – are providing her with a priceless wealth of knowledge to be a bold leader for the Church and the world. Children Celebrating Christmas

The Children of Crossroads will be using their gifts to celebrate the joy of Christmas at both worship services on December 18.

Christ Revealed – Christmas Seen Through Symbols

The children in K-5 Sunday School are learning that many of the decorations they see at this time of the year are symbols that reveal lessons about Jesus.

Did you know that the candy cane has 7 symbols?

1. The cane shape reminds us of a shepherd's cane. Jesus is the Good Shepherd who never leaves his sheep.
2. The J shape reminds us that the J stands for Jesus.
3. The candy cane is hard candy that reminds us of the spices the wise men gave Jesus.
4. The peppermint flavor reminds us of the spices the wise men gave Jesus.
5. The white color reminds us of the holiness of Jesus.
6. The red color reminds us of God's love. God loves us so much that he sent his only Son to us.
7. The red stripes remind us that Jesus died for us that we might have eternal life.

In other lessons, the children will learn the Christian meaning of the 12 Days of Christmas, the geography of the Christmas story, and the idea that Christmas lights should remind us that Christ is the light of the world. They will learn the

legend of the poinsettia and make paper poinsettias to be delivered to a nursing home by the members of Kids for Christ. The children will hear the story of the first Christmas and learn how to retell the story of God's greatest gift to us.



The *Christ Revealed: Christmas Seen Through Symbols* unit will continue through December 18.

All children are welcome to attend Sunday School. Pre-K through 5th Grade will continue to gather in Faith Chapel at 9:45 every Sunday for group worship before going to the rotational workshops listed in the brochures next to the maps of The Shoppes on God's Prairie. Hope to see you there!

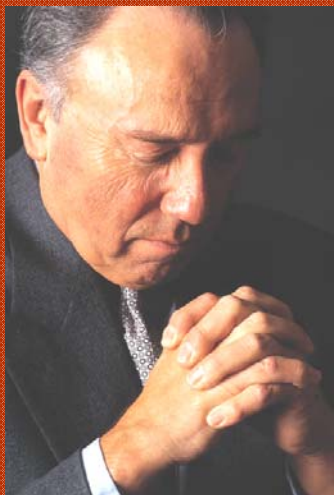

Did you know that the words "think" and "thank" come from the same root? They do. So when you and I think, we should immediately expel words of thanksgiving. Simply put, we are to be thankful people. Far too many of us have a hard time seeing what we have to be thankful for. We are like the little girl who was told by her mother to eat all her spinach, which she hated. The Ministry of Listening

The Ministry of Listening to others during the holiday season of "busyness"

Think of a time when you really felt cared for. Chances are someone focused on what you had to say, was attentive to your needs, and listened to how you felt instead of telling you how you should feel or what you should do.

Listening is a very powerful way to minister to someone. The definition of "minister", as a verb, is "to give service, care or aid; attend as to wants or necessities, to contribute as to comfort or happiness". That is what a Stephen Minister does. In Stephen Ministry, a great deal of time is spent in teaching and practicing listening skills because of its importance as a caregiving tool.

Listening is all of these things:

- Active
- Takes patience
- Involves more than just words
- Good listening is not being completely silent
- Happens over time
- Confidential

Are you gifted with compassion? Do you desire to give care, to comfort and to contribute to others when they're in need of someone to listen to them?

We need more people to step up and share their gift of listening and caring for others by volunteering to become a Stephen Minister.

The choice is yours. Training doesn't begin until January so you will still have time to bake one more batch of holiday cookies or shop for one more gift.

The gift of time we've been given is the same for all of us – 24 hours a day. Choose this day where you will spend some of those hours.

Blood Donation

Every minute of every day someone needs blood. While it is wonderful for Americans to respond in record numbers to a disaster, we must remember that blood is always needed. Some people may need blood for surgery; others may depend on it after an accident. There are those who have cancer or other diseases that require whole blood or components. That blood can only come from a volunteer donor, a person like you who makes the choice to donate. Currently only 3 out of every 100 people in America are blood donors.

Typically, a unit of whole blood is separated into these components that can be used to help several people:

- **Red blood cells.** These cells carry hemoglobin, an iron rich substance that transports oxygen throughout the body. Red blood

cell transfusions are typically given to people with significant blood loss or those with chronic anemia.

- **Plasma.** This is the liquid portion of blood. Plasma contains proteins that are critical for blood clotting. Plasma transfusions are typically used for those with bleeding disorders.

- **Platelets.** These small cells are also a vital part of the clotting process. They repair injured blood vessels and stop blood loss by gathering at the site of an injury and plugging vessel holes.

- **What's stopping you?** Donating blood is a relatively painless procedure, and it is safe. New, sterile, disposable equipment is used for each donor, so there is absolutely no risk for acquiring a blood borne disease.

All blood types are needed to

ensure a reliable supply for patients. Individuals who are 17 years of age and weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health are eligible to donate.

Immediately following donation, you will be given a snack and liquids and you will be asked to rest for a short while before leaving. You will be advised to drink a lot of fluid for the next 24 hours and to be careful about lifting heavy objects.

Crossroads will be sponsoring the Bloodmobile on December 12th at Five Points. This holiday season is the perfect time to give someone the gift of life. You may call the Red Cross, 636-4441, to make an appointment

The **Walk to Emmaus** is a spiritual renewal program intended to strengthen the local church through the development of Christian disciples and leaders. The program's approach seriously considers the model of Christ's servanthood and encourages Christ's disciples to act in ways appropriate to being a "servant of all." The Walk to Emmaus experience is a 72-hour short course in Christianity, comprised of fifteen talks by lay and clergy on the themes of God's grace, disciplines of Christian

discipleship, and what it means to be the church. The course is wrapped in prayer and meditation, special times of worship and daily celebration of Holy Communion. The Emmaus Walk begins Thursday evening and concludes Sunday evening. Men and women attend separate weekends.

Chrysalis is the name chosen for the youth and young adult version of The Walk to Emmaus because it symbolizes the spiritual growth that is essential between adolescence and adulthood. That growth is as crucial for youth as the cocoon is for the caterpillar. It is that precious time of nurturing a person's faith for discipleship. Chrysalis Flights (for high school sophomores

through age 18) and Chrysalis Journeys (for young adults 19-24) are 3-day events. This 3-day spiritual renewal time provides an opportunity to learn more about faith, to experience Christian love and support, and to make new faith commitments. Young people are inspired, challenged, and equipped for a closer friendship with Christ and for Christian action at home, church, school and community.
