From the Senior Pastor

"May the Lord lead your hearts into a full understanding and expression of the love of God and the patient endurance that comes from Christ."
~ 2 Thessalonians 3:5

Each year about half of all Americans make at least one resolution for the New Year. Most who resolve to lose weight, overcome an addiction, spend more time family, eat more veggies or apply themselves more struggle to keep that resolution for even two months. Statisticians report that one quarter of all resolutions don't last one week, one-third are lost before one month, and more than half are forgotten at the end of a second month.

Statistics like this are sobering, but that is no reason to simply give up on a resolution. Experts (you did not know that there were "resolution experts" did you?) share that one of the best ways to keep a resolution is to find one or two trusted people to be accountability partners. If you resolve to drink less caffeine in 2011, then find someone you work with who has permission to ask as you head to the coffee pot or soda machine, "hey, how many is that today?"

I am resolving to be more patient in 2011 and I am asking you, my Crossroads family, to be my accountability partner. (just not all 900 of you at once!) You have permission to ask me, "Hey, Tom, how is that patience thing going?"

Let me share a bit more about my spiritual quest for personal restraint. I am easily frustrated by lines at restaurants, commercials on television and downloads on my laptop. When an idea comes to me, I want to put it into play immediately. Don't even tell me about an upcoming movie or record release until I can actually see or hear it.

But where I really struggle is in my relationship with God, through prayer. When I seek direction, confirmation or blessing from the LORD, it means I am ready for Him to act immediately. Sometimes, I confess, it is as though I have God on my watch, calendar, or time clock.

And yet I know that God keeps His own time and I am not in a position to dictate issues of time with Him. God answers all prayers according to His will

and His time. Sometimes we receive God's response quickly and sometimes...well...we need patience.

John Ortberg tells a wonderful parable about God and patience. "A man read 2 Peter 3:8 in the Bible, a passage where Peter proclaims 'a thousand years is like a single day to God'. He was amazed by it and talked to God about it. 'Lord, is it true that a thousand years for us is just like one minute to you?' The Lord said, 'Yes.' The man, an economist, said, 'Well then, a million dollars to us must be like one penny to you.' The Lord said, 'Well, yes.' The economist said, 'Well, Lord, will you give me one of those pennies?' The Lord said, 'All right, I will. Wait here a minute.' (Ortberg, "Waiting on God" at Preachingtoday.com)

So I am resolving to be more patient with myself and my spiritual time with God. I know that as I learn to wait, to endure, and to reflect, I am doing so in good company.

Nurse Sally's Tip of the Month

COLD REMEDIES:

What works, what doesn't, what can't hurt

There is no cure for the common cold and remedies are almost as common as the cold. Here is a look at some common remedies and what is known about them.

WHAT WORKS:

Water and Other Fluids. You can't flush a cold from your system, but drinking plenty of liquids can help. Water, juice, clear broth or warm lemon water with honey helps loosen congestion and prevents dehydration.

Salt Water. A salt water gargle (¼ - ½ teaspoon of salt dissolved in 8 ounces of warm water) can temporarily relieve a sore throat.

Saline Nasal Drops or Sprays. Over-the-counter (OTC) saline nasal drops and sprays combat stuffiness and congestion. Unlike nasal decongestants, saline does not lead to a rebound effect, a worsening of symptoms when the medication is discontinued. Most are safe and nonirritating, even for older children.

Chicken Soup. Generations of parents have spooned chicken soup into their sick children. Scientists have discovered that it does possibly act as an anti-inflammatory agent, and it does speed up the movement of mucus, helping to relieve congestion and limit time the viruses are in contact with the nose lining.

Humidity. Cold viruses thrive in dry conditions. Dry air dries the mucous membranes, causing a stuffy nose and scratchy throat. A humidifier can add moisture to your home but can also add mold, fungi, and bacteria if not maintained properly.

WHAT DOESN'T WORK:

Antibiotics. These destroy bacteria but are no help against viruses. The inappropriate use of antibiotics contributes to the serious and fast growing problems of antibiotic-resistant bacteria.

ZINC. The cold fighting reputation of zinc has had its up and downs. That's because many zinc studies have been flawed. The highest quality randomized trials generally show no benefit. In studies with positive results, zinc seemed most effective when taken within 24 hours of the onset of symptoms. Taking zinc with food may reduce side effects, including a bad taste and nausea. Intranasal zinc may result in permanent damage to the sense of smell.

WHAT PROBABLY DOESN'T HURT:

In spite of ongoing studies, the scientific jury is still out on popular cold remedies such as Vitamin C and Echinacea.

Vitamin C. It appears that for the most part taking Vitamin C won't help the average person to prevent colds. However, taking it before the onset of the cold symptoms may shorten the duration of the symptoms.

Vitamin C may provide benefit for people at high risk of colds due to frequent exposure. (for example, children who attend group child care during the winter)

Echinacea. Studies of the effectiveness of echinacea are mixed. Some studies show no benefit. Others show a significant reduction in the severity and duration of symptoms when taken in the early stages of a cold. Research is ongoing. In the meantime, if your immune system is healthy and you are not taking prescription medications, using echinacea supplements is unlikely to cause harm.

Although usually minor, colds can make you feel miserable. It's tempting to try the latest remedy, but the best thing you can do is rest, drink fluids, and keep the air around you moist. Remember to wash your hands with soap frequently.

Prayer Challenge

Someone recently asked me how my walk with God was. I answered that it was ok, but for the past several months God was curiously silent. We discussed the different times and ways I believed God did speak to me in the past. There were no burning bushes, no booming voices, definitely no drama. It was in fact always a small quiet voice that urged me here, or nudged me there. It was a voice I heard with my heart and not with my ears or brain. "You know, God has been talking to humans since he created us," he replied. "There was Adam, Abraham, Noah and Moses. And God kept on talking to us down through the ages. He never stopped. You don't have to be a biblical giant, or celebrated author to hear from God. I don't think God is silent in your case, I think your receiver is

out of whack!" It made me stop and think. He was right. I was not tuned into God's frequency. I was focused on and concentrating on how I was going to do all the stuff life in the 21st century requires of us.

In his book, "Walking with God", John Eldridge tells us, "All day long we are making choices. It adds up to an enormous amount of decisions in a lifetime. How do we know what to do? We have two options. We can trudge through life on our own, doing the best to figure it all out. Or, we can walk with God. As in, learn to hear his voice. Really. We can live life with God. He offers to speak to us and guide us. Every day. It is an incredible offer. To accept that offer is to enter into an adventure filled with joy

and risk, transformation and breakthrough. And more clarity than we ever thought possible."

So here is my challenge. Before you start making all those New Year's resolutions; (you know, all those things you tell yourself and others you are going to change in the coming year), resolve to spend time every day tuning your receiver to God's frequency. Make room in your prayer time to stop talking to God and listen to God. I admit, it is not easy at first, but with a little practice you will find yourself hearing with your heart, making the right decisions, and living life the way God and you really want to anyway; without all that nonsense of year end resolutions.

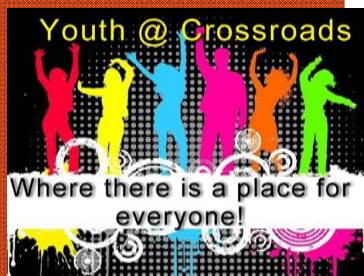

CORNER

This month's spotlight will focus on John Sitler, Video Director at Crossroads. John began serving in this ministry after he and his wife started attending Crossroads (then known as "First United Methodist Church") in 1996. Danny Cox, our pastor at the time, decided to start a Video Ministry and John volunteered. Soon he was the leader of the team.

At first the only responsibility of the team was to show the power points during church services. The ministry has grown tremendously since then. The video team is responsible for making sure the words to worship songs and hymns are up on the screens. This involves making sure the words match what the congregation is singing. John says it is very frustrating if the words don't match the music, so he tries to make sure his team "practices" the slide presentation with the songs. Something that John really enjoys is matching images to the words in a song. "A song is a story", John says, and it's important to enhance the story with pictures to go along with a song.

Another responsibility of the Video Team is to run the cameras from the balcony. Did you know there are 3 people upstairs video taping the service

every week? These videos are available to people if they want a copy of baptism, confirmation, or other special services.

John loves music and is spiritually fed by listening to the music at Crossroads, no matter if it is contemplative or energizing. He loves the idea of putting a thought into a person's mind through an image on the screen that may not have occurred to them before. He also loves the fellowship with the youth helpers, the sound & video team, and Acts 29. He enjoys watching the youth bring new ideas to the team.

Another important part of this ministry that he really enjoys is video taping weddings and putting together a video for the wedding party using 4 different camera angles.

I asked John to tell me about a funny story or a memorable moment he has had while serving on the Video Team. He remembers one particular Christmas Eve at the Elm Street location when the computer crashed right in the middle of the service. They needed to reboot the computer, find the power point, AND find the right place in the power point all while the pastor's daughter sang one song! They were able to accomplish all of this and no one knew there had been a

problem. It was stressful at the time, but he laughs about it now.

John and Karen have been attending Crossroads 14 years and John is also a member of the Crossroads Ringers, and has served on the Board of Trustees, the Worship Committee, has taught Sunday School, and has led Bible Studies. His favorite memory is when we broke ground for our current church building.

Thank you, John, for all your hard work! If you would like to "step out of the boat" as John has, the Video Ministry is looking for anyone high school age and up to run the cameras on Sunday mornings. They also need volunteers to help with lighting and to learn our slide show program to integrate all visual aspects of the service.
