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From the Senior Pastor

Our government recently announced a change in the mission of our space program to landing human beings on Mars, which means an end to missions to the moon. They believe there is much more to learn about Mars than the moon at this point. It is sad for those of us who remember Neil Armstrong and the Apollo 11 mission in 1969. I remember watching the grainy footage of the lunar landing in a school classroom. Mr. Armstrong and his crew reached the moon only because we were committed as a nation to achieve this goal. President John F. Kennedy had announced at a joint session of Congress on May 25, 1961, "I believe that this nation should commit itself to achieving the goal, before this decade is out, of landing a man on the Moon and returning him safely to the Earth." We committed to the mission and reached that goal.

Crossroads United Methodist Church has a mission. Our mission is to "grow disciples for Jesus Christ and send them out into the world." We grow as disciples through Christian fellowship, prayer, worship, service and outreach, stewardship and Bible study.

Our ministries at Crossroads are focused on growing disciples.

But we, the church people, must also be on board with this mission. We need to intentionally grow as disciples and ask God to stretch us and challenge us to be the people and church He has called us to be. America reached the moon not just because of John Kennedy and Neil Armstrong. We reached the moon because millions of Americans committed their tax dollars, resources and public support to this mission.

My favorite story about the lunar mission comes from a time when President Kennedy was touring NASA headquarters shortly after the national mission was announced. He was being introduced to a variety of engineers and astronauts who all reported that their mission was to put an American on the Moon. The tour turned down a hallway and encountered a custodian with a mop. President Kennedy playfully asked her what her mission was at NASA and she responded, "Why Mr. President, I am working to put a man on the moon."

How are you growing as a disciple for our mission? Where is God challenging you to step out of the boat? What progress can you measure in your service, stewardship, prayer life and outreach to others?

A mission statement is effective not because people know it, but because people engage in it. So let us continue to allow God to grow us as disciples through the ministries of the church, and go out into the crossroads of our communities and work as disciples. I am glad to be on the journey of discipleship with you.

Adopt-a-Block



Adopt-a-Block is a ministry of the South Side Mission of Peoria. In this program, various area churches have “adopted” a block of homes in the 61605 zip code, which is on the far south side of Peoria. (It is not the area where most of the shootings and drugs are.) Most of the residents are elderly, and some are handicapped. Each church group is assigned a block, and two Saturday mornings per month, they visit the residents. Groups have brief fellowship with the residents, sometimes pray with them, and check to see

if they have a need the group or the South Side Mission might address. A baked item (bread, banana bread, cookies, etc.) is given to each resident. Soon a relationship is developed and these people know there will be someone checking on them at least every couple of weeks.

The groups meet at the South Side Mission for prayer before going out. It takes about one and a half hours.

Crossroads is planning to “adopt a block”. If you are interested in being a part of this ministry by attending the Saturday sessions or by providing a baked item, contact Chuck Dixon at 444-9461.

Step by Step

This year, 2010, has been a year of celebration for Celebrate Recovery. Many ‘firsts’ have been celebrated throughout the ministry and April was probably the most outstanding month to date ~ although we can hardly wait to see what God has in store next. Not only did the ministry celebrate three outstanding years of operation at the end of April, but it also graduated the second group of recovery leaders through men’s and women’s step studies.

What is a Step Study? A step study is a group of men or women who:

- recognize their ‘obstacles’ to living a life that honors Christ first and foremost
- learn to break through their denial
- come together as a group to work through the Christ centered Twelve Steps and Eight Recovery Principles.

These steps and principles help us work toward peace with God, help us make peace with ourselves, and with others, and give us tools to maintain that peace.

A step study is a **BIG COMMITMENT!** Step studies progress at the level of the group members and can take as few as six months or as many as eighteen months. Group members become very close as they find honesty, acceptance and Truth using God’s Word as the measuring stick. Who belongs in a step study? A step study is for **ANYONE** who struggles with any hurt, any habit, or any hang-up. If this statement is true of you, “I am a sinner,” then you can join.

There is nothing more satisfying than working toward intimacy with God ~ becoming willing to allow God to work on our character defects and living life

without the things that hold us back. This process is not magic ~ but it offers tools for daily living to give us serenity and joy no matter what the circumstances. New step studies for women and men are planned in the fall. Look for announcements in the Messenger and in the church bulletin. Questions? “Collecting Copper to Go to Copperhill TN”

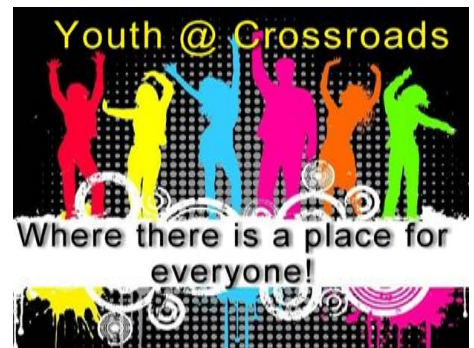

Heart Disease in Women

Heart disease is often thought of as a man's problem but more women than men die of heart disease each year. Women are six times more likely to die of heart disease than from breast cancer. Heart disease kills more women over 65 than all cancers combined. It's the third leading cause of death for women ages 25 – 44 and the second leading cause in women ages 45 – 65.

One challenge for women is that heart disease symptoms can be different from the symptoms in men. The most common symptom in both sexes is some type of pain, pressure or discomfort in the chest. But it's not always the most severe symptom.

Women are more likely to have signs and symptoms unrelated to chest pain, such as:

Neck, shoulder, upper back or abdominal discomfort

Shortness of breath

Nausea or vomiting

Sweating

Lightheadedness or dizziness

Unusual fatigue

Some of the **risk factors** include a combination of fat around the abdomen, high blood pressure, high blood sugar, high triglycerides, mental stress, depression, smoking and low levels of estrogen after menopause.

Some **lifestyle changes** that can help reduce your risk include: exercising 30 – 60 minutes on most days, maintaining a healthy weight, not smoking, and eating a diet low in saturated fat, cholesterol and salt.

A daily aspirin can have a number of benefits for women, such as preventing a first stroke or heart attack, preventing a second heart attack and reducing heart disease risk. **Have a discussion with your doctor about the risks and benefits of taking aspirin based on your own individual risks. Do not start on an aspirin regime without first discussing it with your physician.**
