If it weren't for the fact that I am happily married and reasonably responsible for the lives of two growing teenage boys, I would only stock cereal, bananas and milk in our household. In my bachelor years, much like Jerry Seinfeld, I would frequently only have cereal in my cupboards.

I like virtually all types of cereal (I only avoid those that are too sugary) and even like the healthy kinds. New types of cereal are like an adventure. So recently when the good people at the Peoria Journal Star have been enclosing free cereal samples with the morning paper, it is like Christmas at our house. My wife said to one of my sons, "Why is dad so happy this morning?" My son replied, "There was a free box in the cereal wrapped in the sports page this morning!"

Hey, if the cereal moguls want to keep giving their product away, I will keep eating it! Keep giving it away!

Which gets me to thinking about how much we are giving away at Crossroads!

For example, in the past few months we have given away over one hundred bags of groceries to the food pantries in Washington (WHIP) and Eureka, and fifty bags of cleaning supplies to the Dream Center in Peoria. We gave 75 backpacks filled with school supplies to Cunningham Children's Home and another 75 to Common Place in Peoria. We gave away around 5,000 items of clothing last Spring at our Samaritan's Closet.

But it's not just "stuff" we are giving away! We are giving away our time as well. There are adults giving time away on Wednesday and Sunday nights

to our youth groups, on Thursday nights to AWANA and on Friday nights to Kids for Christ (KFC). Can you believe it? They could be home watching re-runs on television and instead they are giving their time away for a bunch of kids!

On Sunday mornings we are giving away free music and lessons and listening time. You can even get a hug for free here!

Which gets me to thinking about all of this. If we keep giving away our stuff and time like this, we are going to get a reputation in this community. At least that is what I hope for!

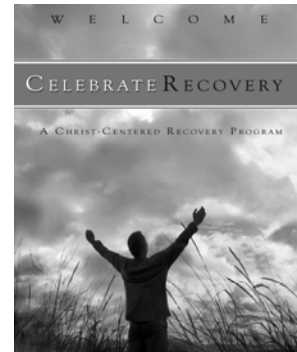

## Celebrate Recovery Western Fellowship Night

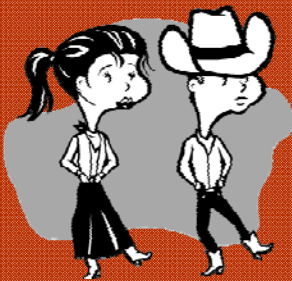
**Thursday, October 1

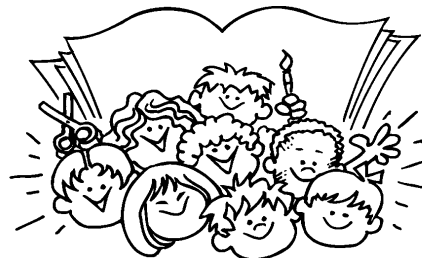

## Save your box tops!



For many years, the United Methodist Women collected Campbell's Soup labels for Cunningham Children's Home. Cunningham then used them to "purchase" free items such as markers and glue, maps, computer software, and sports equipment for the children.

Recently, Cunningham has decided to switch to collecting Box Tops for Education. Last year, Cunningham collected and sent in 66,800 points in Campbell's Soup Products UPC's, earning them \$668.00 worth of materials from a special Campbell's

catalog. It took a large amount of staff time to organize these orders, on top of the many hours of volunteer labor that goes into the project.

By contrast, they collected a much smaller number of Box Tops (20,649 points) but were able to redeem those points for a cash donation to support their programs. With less effort, a small number of Box Tops brought in \$2,069.40! Just think of what they can do if they focus only on Box Tops!

Please help the United Methodist Women with this important mission by bringing your box tops to the kitchen at Crossroads. Place them in the top drawer of the plastic container next to the white refrigerator.

What an easy way to help provide the items the children need at Cunningham Children's Home!

# Nurse Sally's Tip of the Month

## Flu Vaccine

Everyone should get vaccinated against the flu because it can be a serious disease. Most people are ill for only a few days, but some get much sicker, to the point of hospitalization and even death. Influenza causes an average of 36,000 deaths each year, mostly among the elderly. **The flu shot will not cause the flu because all vaccines made in the U.S. are made with inactivated (killed) viruses.**

### Q. Who should get a flu shot?

A. An annual flu shot is recommended for:

- \* People 50 years of age or older
- \* Residents of long-term care facilities
- \* People who have long term health problems; for example, heart disease, kidney disease, lung disease, diabetes, asthma, anemia and other blood disorders and many other chronic medical conditions.
- \* Those with a weakened immune system because of HIV/AIDS, or another disease that effects the immune system, long term treatment with steroidal drugs, cancer treatment with radiation or chemotherapy.
- \* Health care workers, family members or anyone else coming in close contact with people at serious risk.
- \* It is recommended for children 6-23 months of age

\* Anyone caring for infants 0-23 months of age, especially those younger than 6 months

\* People living in dormitories or under other crowded conditions.

\* Anyone who wants to reduce their chance of catching the flu.

### Q. Do I need a flu shot every year?

A. Yes, influenza viruses change often. Therefore, the vaccine is updated each year. Protection develops about 2 weeks after getting the shot and may last up to a year. Some people who receive the vaccine may still get the flu but they will usually get a milder case. In addition, "flu" is often used as a catch-all phrase that people use to describe other viral infections.

### Q. When should I get influenza vaccine?

A. The best time to get it is in October and November. **You can receive it at church on Sunday morning, October 11<sup>th</sup>, from 9 – 11 a.m.**

### Q. Are there side effects?

A. Some people have mild side effects but they are usually minor and last only a short time. The most common side effect is soreness and swelling at the site of injection. If severe reactions develop, it is usually within a few minutes to a few hours after having

received the vaccine.

### Q. Is this shot for the Swine Flu also?

A. No, H1N1 (Swine) flu vaccine is a separate vaccine. When the vaccine becomes available, people between the ages of 6 months to 24 years, parents and caretakers of young children, healthcare workers, and people with chronic medical conditions should be the first ones to receive it.

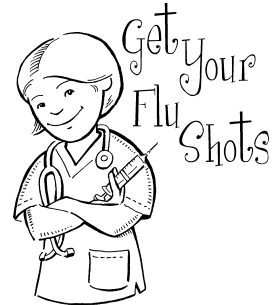
### Q. Can we receive H1N1 Vaccine at church?

A. No, please contact your doctor or watch for clinics in the area.

*If you are unsure about getting a flu shot, please talk it over with your doctor.*

**Flu vaccine will be available to anyone over the age of 18 at Crossroads on Sunday, October 11th, 9-11 a.m. The cost of a flu shot is \$25. Medicare will be billed for seniors who have Part B. You must present your Part B Card.**

# Prayer Challenge

## Shoes and Prayer

Do you sometimes just forget to pray? Need a trigger? Why not just look at your shoes as a reminder to pray? Ok, I know what you are thinking. . . this is going to be a stretch.

Shoes carry us everywhere we go: to school, to work, to play. As I peer into my closet, I see fancy leopard shoes with a bow for special occasions. Then I see beater tennis shoes that have walked many nature paths and run that competitive mile. There are the snow boots, which make my back ache just looking at them. The bright fuchsia shoes some consider loud. In the back of the closet are the black plain shoes I needed for my brother's memorial service. Of course, my husband's work loafers, boring but professional. I reminisce about special shoes bought for my first born son, kept to be treasured forever. Yes, a lifetime of miles those shoes carried me. They carried my earthly body and while some were practical and many more were just "too cute", they carried me.

You know, prayer carries us everywhere we go: to school, to work, to play. There have been elaborate prayers for special occasions and the joy-filled prayers. The prayers when I have felt beaten down and just needed help to put one foot in front of the other. The prayers

for body aches and sickness, my own and for others. Prayers for my first born child to treasure forever. Prayers for my husband as he landed a professional job. The prayers at my brother's memorial service. Of all the prayers, simple or elaborate, loud almost shouting, or barely a whisper, I know God heard every single one. Those prayers have carried me through this lifetime. They have been all shapes, sizes, and sometimes just noises when I was unable to speak.

Shoes have carried my earthly body through sun and rain, warm and cold. Prayer has carried my earthly body and my heart and soul through joy and sorrow, trials and the stuff that life throws out. I have needed prayer. . . I have needed the communication with God every single day, to carry me through the day. Several years ago I was shopping in a department store, the shoe department as a matter of fact, when as I weaved throughout the display racks all of a sudden I heard an audible, "I Love You Lord." I looked around to see who said it when I realized those words had been spoken out of my own mouth. To whom? I was not shopping with anyone, nor was there a clerk in sight. I stopped dead in my tracks. What was this all about? I realized my prayer time had grown to constant communication with God and I wasn't afraid of it. Now, I say it audibly and often.

Communicating with God – that is prayer. I am sure you talk to your best friend – and listen to them.

Prayer is talking to God – and listening to Him. You can do it on your knees, in your car, at work, singing in the shower. The place doesn't matter and the words don't matter. Just talk to God like he is your best friend. Then listen. Practice anywhere and everywhere. I pray that you will experience your own audible voice saying, "I Love You Lord." And when you look down at your shoes that have carried you thus far remember to pray, for **prayer will carry you every single step of the way!**
