**Lenten Holiness**

One of my favorite prayers in the Prayer Book is the Prayer of Humble Access. This is prayed in the Rite One liturgy of the Holy Eucharist. In addition to praying this prayer at every 7:45 AM worship service, during the season of Lent we say this prayer at our other services. The context of the prayer is the invitation to receive the Sacrament.

"We do not presume to come to this thy Table, O merciful Lord, trusting not in our own righteousness, but in thy manifold and great mercies. We are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs under thy Table. But thou art the same Lord, whose property is always to have mercy. Grant us therefore, gracious Lord, so to eat the flesh of thy dear Son Jesus Christ, and to drink his blood, that we may evermore dwell in him, and he in us. Amen."

Indeed, this is a prayer that tells us we are in the presence of the Holy Spirit of God. This prayer also allows us the opportunity to say we are not worthy, that nothing we have been or said or done give us the right to be here. We are here only because of the incredible grace of God. A God who graces us through His love and forgiveness and sacrifice. And, to realize that is truly "to dwell in him, and he in us."

As we say this prayer or prepare in our own way for receiving communion, we are certainly in the presence of the Holy Spirit. May this prayer and our meditations be a moment of holiness as we come to the altar at St. Luke's on the Lake.

**Giving as Believing in the Mission of  
St. Luke's on the Lake**

At different times in the lives of generous stewards, gifts are made to the church that are above and beyond the usual pledges offered to operating budget or even to the Endowment Foundation. Frequently, these gifts are anonymous and are often given with a specific purpose. In recent months, St. Luke's on the Lake has been the beneficiary of three sets of gifts. First, a group of four families donated to a sound technology fund that will allow us to purchase a new sound booth and new speakers. These and other smaller purchases will improve the audio obstacles we face in our sanctuary. Second, in memory of a loved one, a family is making a gift that will allow us to extend the wireless internet to the entire campus. Third, also in memory of a loved one, a parishioner has agreed to work

with the wardens and me in paying for the construction of a Columbarium that will be built on-site. This structure will allow us to receive the cremations of those who wish to have their church home be the location of their final resting place. In the months ahead, more information will be shared with the entire congregation on this Columbarium project.

The Vestry and I certainly welcome and encourage such generosity. Indeed, it is important to remind ourselves, that such gifts come because the donors believe in and have committed to the mission of St. Luke's. They have seen and experienced lives changed. We are the receivers of this faith, and we join them with a glad and generous heart.

## CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

### Christian Ed – Not just for kids anymore.

Christian Ed. Many look at Christian Ed and think “Sunday School for kids.” In fact, Christian Ed at St. Luke’s on the Lake (SLOL) is so much more. But, I’ll get to that later. I like the term Christian Formation over Christian Ed. You may not be aware, but Christian Formation does not just happen in Sunday School.

Lifelong Christian Faith Formation in The Episcopal Church is Lifelong growth in the knowledge, service and love of God as followers of Christ and is informed by Scripture, Tradition and Reason. – from *The Charter for Lifelong Christian Formation, The Episcopal Church*.

As you can see, Formation is *Lifelong growth*. That necessarily implies that we are never done. We are always growing. Many believe CE or Formation happens only until we are older. But what is older? Notice too, that the definition does not say knowledge, service and/or love of God. It is AND. That means ALL THREE.

Faith Formation is not something that can be checked off on an attendance chart. That explains the “service” part. My favorite part. In order to grow in service, we must be serving. Pretty basic. Yet so many of us are self-limiting in this area. We use excuses of being too busy or too tired; yet, we expect “the church” to be there when we need help.

Okay, back to my statement that Christian Ed at SLOL is so much more: VBS, Rite K and Little Liturgy (elementary and preschool level Liturgies of the Word), worship support, Nursery, All Parish and Intergenerational Events, providing ongoing and Seasonal resources for home devotionals, Youth Discovery. And who benefits from all of these ministries? Kids, right? Right. But again, there is so much more. For every “kids’ program” there are numerous (VBS=70+ adults!) adults that are leading, teaching and being otherwise engaged. What about them? They TOO are growing in knowledge, service and love. They not only are enabling the

growth of our children, they themselves continue in the Lifelong Learning process.

So what’s my point? Come grow with us. Find your spot in the Lifelong Christian Faith Formation process as a volunteer in “Christian Ed”. And in the meantime, be part of something bigger than yourself.

### Coming up sooner than later

**Sunday mornings, April 3rd & 10th** – Lifelong Christian Faith Formation (Sunday School) continues for everyone. Highlights: BLAST Island concludes a fun study of David, Shepherd and King, while the Confirmation class churns through a service project that will benefit the entire congregation.

**Wednesday nights, April 6th & 13th** – We (4 year olds through 5th Grade) conclude our Lenten series study of the Eucharist, just in time for Easter.

**Palm Sunday, April 17th** – No Sunday School. Instead, come join us for our 3rd Annual All Parish Event. We will prepare ourselves for Holy Week as we combine our “celebration” with a report back on our Spring Break week of service. How else better to reflect on the sacrifice of our Lord and Savior?

**Easter Sunday, April 24th** – No Sunday School. But our Alleluias are back! Remember to have your child bring a flower for the cross and be present to a vivid reminder of the joy we share as Christians.

**June 13th -17th – VBS2011: Hometown Nazareth.**

Go Ba-a-ack in time to discover what it was like to grow up in the sleepy little town of Nazareth – where Jesus was a kid. We will discover that

- Jesus had a family . . .
- Jesus had a name . . .
- Jesus had a home . . .
- Jesus went to church . . .
- Jesus served others . . . we do too!

As we plan and prepare for VBS 2011 – Hometown Nazareth, our team cherishes your prayers. There are a few other things we would cherish

as well. For starters, please pray for the right staff members to join our team. Please pray for YOUR role on the team. Then go ahead and sign up through our website!

**Attention: By the time you read this note, we are most likely onto a waitlist for participants. But we are still needing volunteers! Please contact LoriAnn Lavallee, VBS registrar (lalavallee@stlukesonthelake.org) to find out how you can assist in this ministry.**

But wait! There is one more area we will still need your help on: borrowing or donating some specific items. The list is posted on our website and will be published in periodic emails. ## CHILDREN'S MINISTRY Continued



Welcome to our little corner of the church! In the nursery, you will find everything you would expect – age-appropriate toys, caring nursery staff, volunteers, books, children, and animal crackers. Perhaps you will also find a few things you don't expect, such as crafts that relate to the Gospel lesson of the week, hands-on Sunday school lessons (geared toward those even as little as toddlers), chapel time in which children are listening the Word, learning The Lord's Prayer, and worshipping Jesus through music.

Currently, we are in need of volunteers. You do not have to have children in the nursery to be a part of this ministry. Please prayerfully consider volunteering once every 6 weeks in the nursery.

### **Lent Books: Experiencing the Season of Lent in Preschool**

Starting on March 13th, the preschoolers have been working on Lenten books. Each week they have learned a basic principle about Jesus and His role in our lives. They have illustrated that principle using various craft supplies or other manipulatives in their Lenten book. These books will stay at church throughout the season of Lent. The last page will be Easter Sunday and they will be able to take their books home at that time. If you would like to see their progress, please feel free to step into the nursery to see what your child has done that day before you take him/her home. Here are the principles we will be exploring:

- March 13: God loves us so much that He sent His Son, Jesus.
- March 20: Jesus is gentle and patient.
- March 27: Jesus hears us when we pray.
- April 3: God shows us His beauty and love through His creation.
- April 10: Jesus shows us that we can find joy in Him.

•April 17: The cross reminds us of the sacrifice Jesus made for us.

•April 24: We find light and life with Jesus as He is raised from the dead.

### **Little Liturgy**

Did you know that even if your child is 2 years old, he or she is hearing the Gospel reading every week? With a few exceptions (some of those Gospel readings get a little too heavy for young minds), your child is hearing and learning the same concepts you are in Big Church, but on a level that they can understand and really apply in their lives. From 9:15-9:30, children from PSC A, B, and C go to the Chapel room in Riker Hall. They "light" the candles on the altar, hear the Gospel, and participate in an interactive "sermon." The children also hear an age-appropriate collect (determined by the liturgical season) and pray the Lord's Prayer. After processing back from the chapel, the children create and engage in a craft or game that applies to that particular lesson. Feel free to ask them questions about what they did in the nursery. You never know what you can gain from the wisdom of a child!

### **Sunday School is in Full Swing!**

Even though the children hear a Bible lesson and engage with a craft that connects with what they learned in Little Liturgy while the parents are in church, I still want to stress how important and how much fun the children also have in Sunday school. Not only do they learn a TON (even if they can't reiterate all the time what they have learned, God does not let anything go to waste! His Word does imprint on their hearts, even if they are only 2 years old!), but the entire family gets into the awesome habit of going to church and to Sunday school!

We have amazing (amazing!!) teachers that just LOVE to teach your children. Lindsey Thompson teaches the toddlers in PSC A. Dana Thompson teaches PSC B & C.

The current rotation has the kids diving into the world of David. We are discovering the amazing ways that

God worked through His life. Feel free to jump into David's world with your children. You never know what you could learn.

### **Lord, Bless My Child**

In this new section of the newsletter, I want to start posting ways to pray for your child(ren). Praying for our kids is one of the most important things we can do for them. I want to get in a better habit of praying specifically for them and not just when there is a crisis or I've run out of patience! Can anyone relate? I have hard copies of all of this, so if you are interested, please let me know.

### **21. Purity**

*"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God." Matthew 5:8*

*"Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in life, in love, in faith and in purity." 1 Timothy 4:12*

Lord, to many people, "having values" no longer means choosing God's purity, abstaining from sex outside of marriage, and fleeing temptation. Instead, values today are relative; people are encouraged to do as they please. Lord, help my child to be wise enough to choose the way of purity, to resist the sensual temptations that are so prevalent in society. Please give my child Your strength to do this. Teach us what it means to love You with an undivided heart, with all our heart, soul, mind, and body...May my children realize the importance of sexual purity, that they will save the gift of sexuality for the person who You have selected for them to marry. May they see sexual intercourse within marriage as a "life-uniting" process that is beautiful and blessed when it happens according to Your perfect design...Guard my children's hearts, O Lord. ## First Communion not a Prescribed Event



Here at St. Luke's on the Lake, we believe that once baptized, every soul is eligible to receive Communion as a full member of the body of Christ. However, we have found, over the years, that many of our families have a certain age at which they want their children to start taking Communion. As St. Luke's does not have a "first Communion Class" or other regular, formal training, we try to supply resources for those parents who wish to have their child receive some training before that first time. We also find that Easter seems to be a popular time of year for "First Communions" to happen. If you find yourself in this position this year (and were unable to have your child attend the Lenten series Eucharist training), please contact LoriAnn Lavalley at [lavalley@stlukesonthelake.org](mailto:lavalley@stlukesonthelake.org); she will be happy to provide you with materials and recommendations. You may also find a 2-3 page handout at the Family Resource Center in the Narthex, that is helpful in answering Frequently Asked Questions. In any event, please remember to let LoriAnn and/or the St. Luke's on the Lake office know when your child receives their First Communion. We would like to provide you with a certificate and report the milestone in the Parish and Diocesan records.

## Being Christ to the World: The Imperative to Love as God Loves

In her book *To Love as God Loves*, Roberta Bondi offers a radical reimagination of the Christian life, drawn from the tradition of the desert fathers and mothers, monks and nuns who lived in Egypt during the Third Century. Explore the contours of this tradition—especially what it means to be human before God, how we understand sin, and how we find a prescription for salvation—using Bondi as a practical guide. The goal is to shape a fresh vision of what it means to be like Christ that will equip participants to imagine new ways to bring Christ's love to the world.

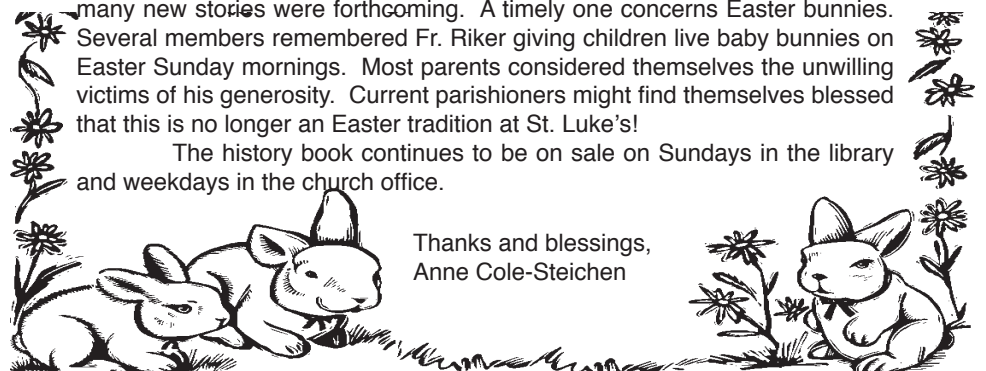
St. Luke's on the Lake parishioner, Dr. Annie Bullock, will teach a class on this book, **Saturday, May 7th from 9:30am-1:30pm at the Austin Seminary**. Professor Bullock received her PhD in Religion from Emory. Annie has extensive training in the history of Christianity, especially early Christianity. She currently is co-leader for the High School Sunday School Class at St. Luke's on the Lake and has taught courses in theology and world religions at St. Edward's University and in church history at Austin Seminary and Episcopal Seminary of the Southwest.

## Thank God for a "No Bunnies" Easter

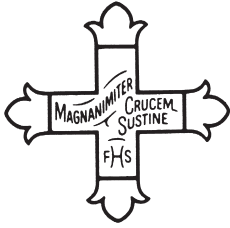

### Rector's Bible Study: Letter to the Colossians

The Parish Hall  
The Christian Church at Colossae was one which Paul had not founded. During his three years in Ephesus (located about 100 miles from Colossae), the church had grown from his teaching and evangelizing, especially in western Asia and Turkey (modern day).

The church at Colossae was being exposed to a false teaching that Paul regarded as subversive of the faith. So, part of his letter is to offer a rebuttal. "The Colossian Heresy" is countered by Paul's clear teaching on the uniqueness of the person of Christ. The new or false teachers proclaimed "Christ was not enough." Paul was adamant that the fullness of God is in Christ alone. We are set free only through the life and ministry of Jesus. "If then you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God(3:1)."

### Centering Prayer And *Lectio Divina*

Kat Duck is experienced in the spiritual practices of both Centering Prayer and *lectio divina*. She will be teaching how to do each and leading the class in the practice of each form of prayer. This is a great opportunity for persons new to either or both to explore them, and for persons already familiar with them to deepen their practice.

### What is centering prayer?

We may think of prayer as thoughts or feelings expressed to God in words. However, in the Christian tradition, contemplative prayer is considered to be a pure gift of God. It is the opening of mind and heart—one's whole being—to God, the ultimate mystery, which is beyond words or thoughts. The ancient practice of centering prayer is one pathway to contemplative prayer, and silence, so often absent from our busy days, is the hallmark of centering prayer. In centering prayer we sit in silence and allow ourselves to listen to God with the "ear of the heart," so that we may become aware of God's presence in ourselves and in others.

### What is *lectio divina*?

*Lectio divina*, literally "divine reading," is a way of praying a brief portion of God's word each day that helps us engage in a conversation with Scripture, thus encouraging us to reflect on our lives in light of our tradition and our own lived experiences.









### NEW Thursday Night Healing Service

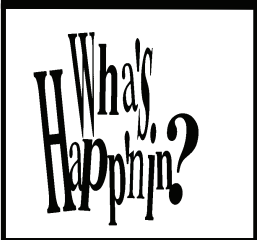

Guilt reminds us that we are doing something wrong. It's painful, so we don't like it, but maybe if we experienced it a little more we would stop doing the things we are falling short on. We would start to really practice what we preach. We could look our children, and Jesus, in the eye and say, "Yes, I did my best."

March 8, 2010 was the day many workers arrived at our Villa from the Village of Hope Orphanage. Most of the workers came to the Villa for debriefing. I learned so much in that time. I and a colleague led 2 group debriefing sessions and then I led 1 group debrief for the teenagers who were involved.

That was one year ago with dear people I knew very well and already had a trust relationship with. Friday I will be going to another country in our region. I was calling it Tuna, but after remembering the two-man play, Greater Tuna, (look for them on YouTube) I will forever call it that. But I digress... Friday I am going to GT to assist another company with a group debriefing of a team of 10 adults and 6 children. These folks don't know me at all, but I get the privilege of serving them in the name of our Lord.

I will be joined in GT on the 14th by a group from the Villa. We will stay until the 25th of March as tourists, praying for the country and its people. I would like to ask for prayer especially during this time. I wonder if some of you might be willing to take a specific day of the week to begin praying for me on a regular basis. For those who like abstaining from meat on holy days during Lent, there are lots of seafood and vegetarian ideas. Judy Burns offered this recipe for the cookbook and we want to share it with everyone since it got accidentally omitted. It will be handy to have for leftover meats after Easter lunch.

### My Mother's Barbeque Sauce

1 medium onion, chopped  
2 T. butter  
1 tsp. salt  
1 clove chopped garlic  
1 tsp. yellow mustard  
¼ tsp. black pepper  
2 T. vinegar, (apple cider vinegar is best)  
¼ c. water  
½ c. catsup

Stir and cook over medium heat until all blended together.

Note: In Georgia, where I grew up, barbecue was a popular item when "all the relatives" came for any special occasion. My mother always made this sauce and my father always cooked the barbecue. It is delicious and you can use it in just about any kind of leftover meat you may have such as beef, chicken, etc. I usually double the recipe.

### A Couple of Book Reviews from Paula Jameson

I was drawn to an article in the Austin paper last June. It was about the growing number of male authors penning books on their own stories of their personal faith journeys. It had never occurred to me that most of the personal stories of one's faith journey were written by women, until now, that is. I wanted to read some of these books, I guess because we have two grown sons for whom we poured many years of intentional parenting into giving them strong spiritual "platforms" that they could each launch out from into their own faith journeys through adulthood. And it occurred to me how nice it would be to have some of these books in our own church library for men, young and old, to read.

*Hope for the Thinking Christian* will capture your attention just by reading the chapter titles like "A Man's Man," "Struggle for Success," "Fatherhood as an Unnatural Act," and "Competitive Faith." He is refreshingly honest with his questioning and fears.

Jinkins in *Called To Be Human* says his book is really a testament of his faith that he shares with his children. This book is a compilation of individual letters addressed either to his son Jeremy or his daughter Jessica on some life issues that they have turned to him for help or perspective. Many of these letters cover eerily familiar topics even though they are so personally written.

*Hannah's Child* is like reading a good novel except that it is a true story full of honest joy, honest pain, honest vulnerability, honest everything. It feels like you are sitting in the same living room listening to Stanley talk to you as if you were one of his close friends privy to so much of his inner thoughts.

I am so glad these books exist. It gives me faith that our sons won't live in a world where men can't be vulnerable; where being a Christian isn't seen as manly; or where they feel like they must live in a technologically fast paced world that demands only concrete answers as a measure of success. These books will add to the richness of our library shelves here at St. Luke's.
