



THE VIEW from ST. LUKE'S ON THE LAKE May 2011

Mission Statement: God calls us to be a community in Christ and to be Christ to the world.

What is the meaning of the Resurrection?

We ask the above question every Eastertide, as we should. A good place to find the answer to this question is to look, mark, and read closely the resurrection narratives of the Gospels. Another good place is found in St. Paul's letter to the Romans, chapter six. In chapter six, Paul leaves behind the long descriptions of how we have fallen into the grip of sin. Now, he talks about what happens to Christians when we are baptized... "Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him in baptism into death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life (6:3, 4)."

These are truly amazing words. Paul is saying that those who are baptized into Christ are crucified with Christ. So, all of the benefits of his death become ours. Our sinful selves are put to death on the cross so that we are no longer slaves to sin. Think, for just a moment, of all the things we find upsetting about ourselves – the habits we cannot seem to shake, the traits that get us in trouble, the secrets we struggle to hide even from ourselves. All of this has been put to death!

Paul seems to be saying that sin no longer determines us. Why? Because in baptism, something has happened, something that comes to us from outside ourselves. In verse 5, Paul writes, "For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his." This is, you see, our new identity. Our unity with Jesus in his death and in his resurrection gives us a new future. And, this unity and future cannot be defeated by sin. There is nothing we can do to undo it, because God is stronger than sin and death.

"For we know that Christ being raised from the dead will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him, the death he died, he died to sin, once for all, but the life he lives, he lives to God. So you also must consider yourself to sin and alive to God in Jesus Christ (6:9, 10)."

Finally, we can answer the opening question, "what is the meaning of the Resurrection?" Paul's declaration makes all the difference in the world. As we continue in Easter, living as Easter people, we need to know that we have a new power over sin. We can live as a new people because we live in a new world, a world not anything like the old one.

While we still sin, we are, by virtue of our baptism, justified sinners, baptized sinners, sinners united to Christ by his prior action on our behalf. May this victory in Christ Jesus give you new hope!

Strategic Goals Give Directions

All institutions, including churches, need a sense of direction. The temptation is to try and do everything, and that is risky (and should be avoided). Some mechanism is needed to determine priorities. Some over-arching vision needs to shape the life of the community of St. Luke's on the Lake. How can we incarnate our mission statement, "to be a community in Christ and to be Christ to the world?" In short, a good organization needs to be shaped by a strategic plan.

We are doing just that, in a faithful way. After identifying five strategic goals – welcoming, communicating, participating, evangelizing, and forming – we are ready to move into a plan of implementation. This will be an open process. We need suggestions from everyone who calls St. Luke's on the Lake their spiritual home. We plan to have the strategic goals to guide our future life together, and to revise them as necessary. Along the way, we will mark achievements, and add suggestions.

On Saturday, April 30th, from 9 AM to 2 PM in the Parish Hall, our consultant, Mary McGregor, will be with us to lead a retreat on this broad subject of "implementation." In attendance, will be most of the Vestry, some of the Staff and several parishioners. I ask your prayers for this retreat, and if you feel called to attend, please give me or a member of the Vestry a call. Join others in ensuring a strong future for St. Luke's on the Lake, as we seek to serve the church and the world in significant ways.

St. Luke's to Host Fr. Jeffrey Samuel from the Diocese of Peshawar in Pakistan

On Sunday, May 1st, St Luke's will host a young priest from the Diocese of Peshawar, in Pakistan, near the Afghanistan border. Fr. Jeffrey Samuel has been studying at the Seminary of the Southwest. He will address a combined adult forum class at 10:30 a.m. in the Parish Hall. Fr. Jeffrey's ministry includes outreach to the Muslim community, which places him at risk and challenge. His presentation has been shared with other churches in the area.

We cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard.
Acts 4:20

Have you ever had a really GOOD secret? You know the kind. One that you were just bustin' to tell? As a kid, maybe you made a beautiful gift for Mom a week before Mother's Day and she can't open it yet. As an adult, maybe you got the dream job promotion, but it won't be announced until next month. Maybe you made it through Hollywood week on American Idol but can't tell anyone yet because the air date is in two months (okay, that's just dreaming).

The apostles had a really good secret too. It was a secret that was SO wonderful, they told the Chief Priests and Pharisees that they could not hold it in.

We cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard.

What they had heard, what they had seen was the cleansing power of faith from a woman who just touched the hem of Jesus' garment. They had seen a poor widow give everything she had to further God's work. They had seen Jesus, blameless and yet forgiving, die on a cross, only to be raised three days later by an ever gracious God. And though they were not learned men of the Scripture, they spoke God's word and followed Jesus' example of grace and compassion.

Most of us are not learned men of God. For most of us, our children can find a scripture reference faster than we can. But that should not stop us from sharing God's Word and showing Jesus' grace and compassion! For it is not our words but His Word that we must proclaim through our actions and our speech.

Don't be afraid to live the BIG SECRET. Or better said, don't live your Christian Faith IN secret. Let it bust

through, even when it calls attention to yourself. Because it calls attention to our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, we have no choice: We cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard.

So let me give you a head start on that "...speaking about what we have seen and heard" business.

VBS 2011 : HOMETOWN NAZARETH As of May 1st, we are now within 44 days of our biggest on campus outreach endeavors of our entire Parish! Yes, VBS is mere weeks away! Before you know it, Hometown Nazareth will be here and gone, and we don't want you to miss out. Don't you want an opportunity to share with others what you have seen and heard?

Oh no, you say? Whatever can I do? Well, we have a list. Several lists in fact. And there is something for EVERYONE on ONE of those lists. ☺

List 1 - We still have prep projects to be completed. Prep projects are small activities to be done at home, such as cutting 240 lengths of yarn or separating Bible Buddies into baggies for each day of VBS or cutting wood pieces. No matter what your skill set or level, I am sure you will find something you can assist with.

List 2 - On Deco Party Days (Decorating Prep Days - we call them Deco Party Days, because they are so much fun!), we need hands to paint and build and cut. Of course, our most crucial day is June 12th, the day everything goes up in the Sanctuary and is finalized in the Parish Hall. Note that June 12th is Pentecost: what better way to show the Spirit of the Lord dwelling in you than to assist in setting up our Hometown Nazareth for the 240 kids and 120 volunteers that will converge on the campus the very next day? Our schedule of Decorating Prep days are noted below.

Please try to make 1, 2 or all of them. We have fun (and chocolate) and the more we have helping, the less each of us has to do!

List 3 - We need stuff. Lots of stuff. Please check your closets and start bringing in items you don't mind us borrowing or you would like

to donate. You can check our display in the Narthex for more items or the website where we have a list as well. Here's just a partial list:

-Egg beater style hand drills (for the kids to use) and other "hand operated" wood working equipment (for use in demonstrations)

-Raw wool (know any sheep farmers?)

-Bunches of dried herbs or flowers

-Large metal wash tubs (6-8)

-Hand held whisk brooms (8)

-Small Nerf balls (200)

-Earthenware bowls

-Baby name books, with name meanings (10 books)

-Small floor rugs or Mexican blankets

-Old fashioned brooms

-Glass or pottery wine carafes (6-9)

-Pottery urns, 2-4 feet tall (many)

List 4 - Now don't be fooled.

We can still use volunteers for our week IN Nazareth, June 13th-17th. In fact, as of this writing, we still needed about 50! So, even if you can only help 1 or 2 days, we can put that Spirit within to work in our workforce of volunteers. May 1st, we begin our last round of regular BLAST Island sessions. As we conclude our study of The Great Commission in Preschool and Elementary, we have some really special days planned. As you will read elsewhere in the newsletter, adults have an outstanding month of fellowship and learning opportunities that are set up to coincide nicely with our kids' activities. Don't miss a one!

May 8th is Mother's Day! We officially honor all mothers. At our services, The Floral Guild supplies the flowers and Christian Ed supplies the kids to hand a flower to each Mother

Perhaps you will also find a few things you don't expect, such as crafts that relate to the Gospel lesson of the week, hands-on Sunday school lessons (geared toward those even as little as toddlers), chapel time in which children are listening the Word, learning The Lord's Prayer, and worshipping Jesus through music.

May Sunday School

Even though the children hear a Bible lesson and engage with a craft that connects with what they learned in Little Liturgy while the parents are in church, I still want to stress how important and how much fun the children also have in Sunday school. Not only do they learn a TON (even if they can't reiterate all the time what they have learned, God does not let anything go to waste! His Word does imprint on their hearts, even if they are only 2 years old!), but the entire family gets into the awesome habit of going to church and to Sunday school!

We have amazing (amazing!!) teachers that just LOVE to teach your children. Lindsey Thompson teaches the toddlers in PSC A. Dana Thompson teaches PSC B & C.

The May rotation has the kids diving into what The Great Commission means. We will be learning how to go out and make disciples and discovering how we can be Jesus "with skin on" to our friends, families, and those we may not know.

Little Liturgy

Did you know that even if your child is 2 years old, he or she is hearing the Gospel reading every week? With a few exceptions (some of those Gospel readings get a little too heavy for young minds), your child is hearing and learning the same concepts you are in Big Church, but on a level that they can understand and really apply in their lives. From 9:15-9:30, children from PSC A, B, and C go to the Chapel room in Riker Hall. They "light" the candles on the altar, hear the Gospel, and participate in an interactive "sermon." The children also hear an age-appropriate collect (determined by the liturgical season) and pray the Lord's Prayer. After processing back from the chapel, the children create and engage in a craft or game that applies to that particular lesson. Feel free to ask them questions about what they did in the nursery. You never know what you can gain from the wisdom of a child!

PrayFAST Pray for a Soldier Team

As we approach Memorial Day, St. Luke's is launching a new program, PrayFAST, a ministry of prayer and support for our Armed Forces.

MISSION STATEMENT

To provide deploying soldiers the opportunity to request a prayer warrior that will pray for the soldier and his/her family by name for a period of one year.

•PrayFAST is a prayer ministry based at Fort Hood, Texas. It offers soldiers an opportunity to have someone pray for them daily, by name while they are deployed -- it offers us an opportunity to support our soldiers with daily prayer.

•PrayFAST is sponsored by the Garrison Chaplaincy and is unique to Fort Hood. What began with a small group of volunteers praying daily for the first unit of soldiers deployed in 2003 has spread to many congregations (PrayFAST is nondenominational) around the country.

•PrayFAST is not a pen-pal ministry; often a soldier will not know who is praying for him/her; only that someone has committed to pray daily for that soldier.

•Prayer Warriors are given the soldier's name, plus additional information as provided by the soldier (rank, unit, email address).

As deployments continue at Fort Hood, additional Prayers Warriors are needed as we seek to fulfill our Mission. With the positive response from soldiers to this outreach of prayer, each Prayer Warrior is asked to consider praying for three soldiers each day.

Many thanks to all who responded to the need for financial assistance to allow the students orphaned by AIDS to continue their Secondary (High School) education for another school year. Education after age 12 is not free: the average annual cost of one student is \$500 for tuition, meals, uniform & books. News from Colorado Discipleship Training School

Hello everyone!! Snow still covers the mountains but it feels like spring here! Sorry it took me so long to get to you guys, things have been a little crazy here at Eagle Rock. It's been a rockin' good time but at the same time this is one of the toughest schools and it has proved it to be on many occasions.

The students are awesome and I absolutely love getting to hang out with them and do life with them. They are some of the most fun people that I have ever met and daily I am reminded how blessed I am to be able to be a part of this.

So you probably aren't wondering why we call this the Boarders DTS but I'm gonna let you guys in on it anyway. Every Saturday and Sunday we drive out to either Keystone, Breckenridge (Breck), Arapahoe Basin (A-Basin), Vail or Beaver Creek. On Saturdays we just go to ride and to have a good time and minister to people on the hill. Sundays however are completely different. Every Sunday we go to either Breck or A-Basin and work with a lady named Pat who is a part of Alpine Resort Ministries (ARM). As soon as we arrive to the resort, we find Pat at the base of the mountain where she gives us "Jesus Cookies"

that she made the night before in zip lock baggies. We split into groups and go all over the mountain delivering the cookies to the employees at the lifts (the people who make sure little kids don't fall off the lift and who scan your lift pass). They are always overjoyed that people would go out of their way to bring them cookies and it's awesome for us to get the opportunity to bless them. After that we snowboard for a little bit before putting on a service on the hill. For this we have students lead worship, share testimonies and give teachings that they prepare. Our audience is anybody who stops by and the people we meet and invite on the hill. It's a great chance for us to be able to come together and worship and praise God and to not be ashamed when people ski or ride by us and give us weird looks. 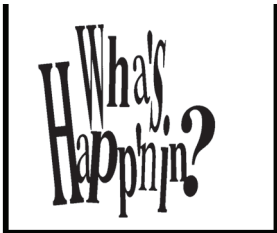

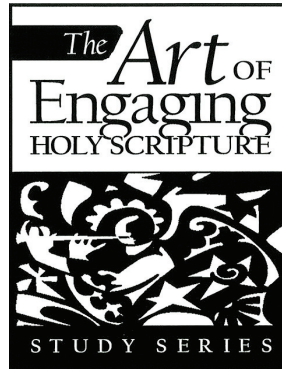
History introduces you to those elements of the Episcopal Church which are distinctive to the Episcopal Church and those which we share with other Christian churches.

Important Requirement for Safeguarding God's Children Especially for Vacation Bible School

Communications Corner... "On Nametags"

St. Luke's has a reputation for being a friendly place, but there's something missing... NAMETAGS! Unlike the famous bar in Boston [yes, I am dating myself], "Where Everybody Knows Your Name," believe it or not...that's NOT the case at St. Luke's!!

Even if you've been a member for 20+ years, there are newer members, and, of course, visitors, who have no idea who you are...and most likely, vice-versa [do YOU know everyone's names? Didn't think so...].

I've been a member for seven+ years myself and there are many of you whose name I've never learned because we haven't had the opportunity to spend much time together. Or I may have learned it and forgotten it. Or I may THINK I know it but actually have you mixed up with another nice person who looks a little bit like you.

Did you know that even our priests struggle sometimes to put a name with a face...and it bothers them a lot! It's a courtesy and a very welcoming act—and really not too much trouble, is it?--to wear a nametag.

What does this have to do with communications?

By definition, the word communication means "a: a process by which information is exchanged between individuals through a common system of symbols, signs, or behavior also : exchange of information b: personal rapport"[—Merriam-Webster's On-Line Dictionary, www.merriam-webster.com].

It's an awkward feeling, isn't it, when you are in conversation with someone whose name you don't know? They don't offer their name, thinking you remember it...and you're embarrassed to ask because you think you SHOULD know it. That awkward feeling is a barrier to communication. Because you're uncomfortable, you're less likely to openly exchange information. Communication is hampered. When you wear a nametag, you remove that small barrier to communication, help facilitate the exchange of information, and foster personal rapport. It's that simple.

Nametag Sundays Throughout Easter Season

Be sure to wear your nametag to services each Sunday from May 1st to June 12th. Wearing nametags welcomes and helps our newer parishioners associate faces with names (plus, jogs the memories of our seasoned parishioners)! Create a stick-on nametag at stations located at the Narthex, the Library foyer, and the entrance to Riker Hall building. St. Luke's magnetic nametag order forms are also available at the nametag stations, simply fill-out and drop in the offering plate with your nametag payment.
