The Liturgy of the Palms

The Opening Acclamation & Prayer

Celebrant: Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord.
People: Peace in heaven and glory in the highest.
Celebrant: Let us pray.
Assist us mercifully with your help, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy upon the contemplation of those mighty acts, whereby you have given us life and immortality; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Reading: Luke 19:28-40

After telling a parable to the crowd at Jericho, Jesus went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem. When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, saying, "Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it.'" So those who were sent departed and found it as he had told them. As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, "Why are you untying the colt?" They said, "The Lord needs it." Then they brought it to Jesus; and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. As he was now approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, saying, "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!" Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, order your disciples to stop." He answered, "I tell you, if these were silent, the stones would shout out."

Celebrant: The Lord be with you.
People: And with thy spirit.
Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.
People: It is right to give him thanks and praise.

Celebrant: It is right to praise you, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which you have redeemed us through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was proclaimed as King of kings by those who spread their garments and branches of palm along his way. Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. Amen.

I gave my back to those who struck me, and my cheeks to those who pulled out the beard; I did not hide my face from insult and spitting. The Lord GOD helps me; therefore I have not been disgraced; therefore I have set my face like flint, and I know that I shall not be put to shame; he who vindicates me is near. Who will contend with me? Let us stand up together. Who are my adversaries? Let them confront me. It is the Lord GOD who helps me; who will declare me guilty?

Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Holy Week Worship: Holy Eucharist will be celebrated at 6:30pm in the church on Holy Monday, Tuesday & Wednesday, April 15, 16 & 17. All are welcome!

Maundy Thursday Holy Eucharist will be held in the church at 6:30pm on Thursday, April 18, followed by a Canterbury-led Vigil with foot washing at 8pm in St. Mary's Chapel.

Good Friday Worship on April 19 begins in the church from 12-3pm with The Hours, commemorating the hours Jesus spent on the cross. Half-hour segments include hymns, readings, meditations, prayer and silence (come for the entirety or single/multiple segments). There will be an organ interlude where worshipers may come and go. Stations of the Cross will begin at the church at 3pm, process through the college campus to the Catholic Campus Ministry (old St. Bede's). Good Friday Liturgy will be held at 6:30pm in the church.

Walk A Labyrinth on Holy Saturday, April 20, at 11am at the Eastern State Hospital Labyrinth. We start with prayers, walk as a group, and close with sharing (about an hour).

The Great Vigil of Easter begins at 8:30pm in the churchyard Saturday, April 20, with the "Lighting of the New Fire of Easter," followed by Holy Eucharist (with incense) in church.

Six Services of Holy Eucharist on Easter Sunday, April 21, begin at 7am, 8:30am, two services at 10:15am (in the church and churchyard; child care for nursery through four-year-olds will be available in the Parish House during this service only), 12 noon and 5:30pm. All are invited to bring cut flowers to decorate the Flower Cross which will be located in the churchyard. Following the 10:15am service in the churchyard, an Easter Egg Hunt for children pre-K through 5th grade will be held (bring your baskets)!

Easter Sunday Traffic & Parking: Drive down Prince George Street towards the church, turn right at the Palace Green, and you will be directed where to park (you will not be permitted to enter Duke of Gloucester St. from Nassau Street; visit our website for details).
