From the Rector

'Why do you want to grow?'

The current bishop of Connecticut once found himself in a conversation with a parishioner of his diocese that went something like this –

“Oh, bishop, we’re so glad you’re here. We want you to help our church grow.”
“Why?” asked the bishop. “What?” said the parishioner. “Why do you want to grow?” said the bishop. “Well ... isn’t that what we’re supposed to do?” “Well, why?” said the bishop. “Well ... so the church can have more members,” said the parishioner. “Why?” said the bishop. “Well ... so the church can grow,” they said. “Why?” said the bishop. “Well ... more members means more pledges, and more pledges means we can grow,” said the parishioner.

And the conversation went on from there.

As I reflect on that exchange a couple of things become apparent to me. The first one is that the bishop was trying to change his parishioner’s understanding of why we are called to be the church. He was trying to change a deep-seated, consumer mentality about how many (*dare I say most*) of our church members view the mission of the church. The church does not exist as an instrument designed for self promotion and self service; but is rather a ministry designed to care for God’s people, beyond our walls and our self interest.

The second insight I glean from that conversation is that the majority of our time and effort is spent on maintaining the bricks and mortar of the institution, as opposed to reaching out in mission and ministry to those we have been called to serve. The mantra you’ve heard many times says it best of all. What should be, ‘God first, others second, self third,’ so often becomes just the opposite.

My brothers and sisters, over the course of a long Pentecost season I encourage you to spend some time with the question posed by the bishop of Connecticut. Why do we, St. Philip's, want to grow as a church? And, as we further define the answer to that question, what are we, individually and corporately, doing to make it happen?

What do you think?

The Worship Corner

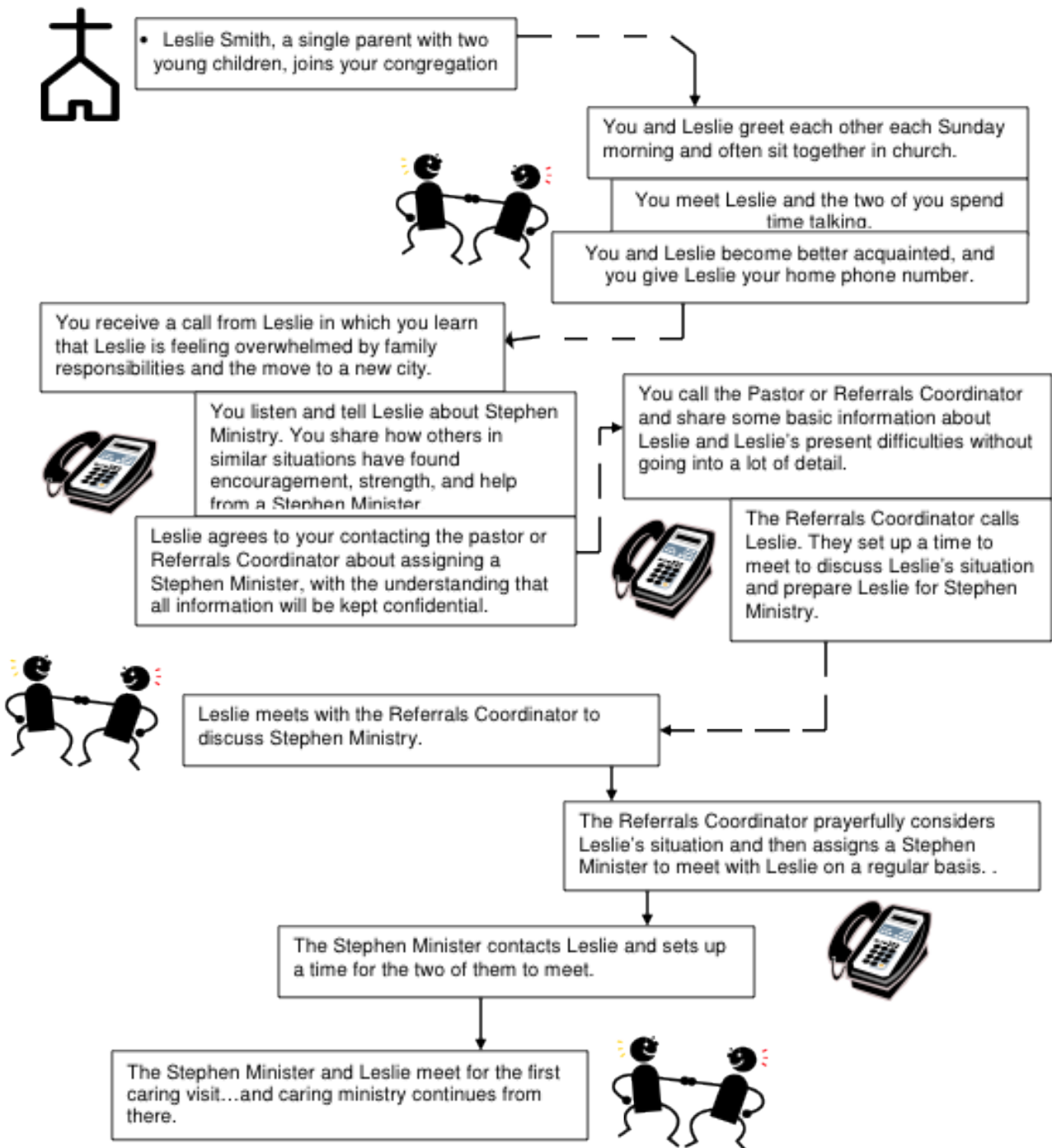

“Be who God meant you to be and you will set the world on fire”

Amidst the pageantry of the recent royal wedding was a beautiful homily on Christian marriage by Dr. Richard Chartres, Bishop of London. Below are excerpts. (ed)

“Be who God meant you to be and you will set the world on fire.” So said St Catherine of Siena whose festival day it is today. Marriage is intended to be a way in which man and woman help each other to become what God meant each one to be, their deepest and truest selves....

In a sense every wedding is a royal wedding with the bride and the groom as king and queen of creation, making a new life together so that life can flow through them into the future....

A spiritual life grows as love finds its centre beyond ourselves. Faithful and committed relationships offer a door into the mystery of spiritual life in which we discover this; the more we give of self, the richer we become in soul; the more we go beyond ourselves in love, the more we become our true selves and our spiritual beauty is more fully revealed. In marriage we are seeking to bring one another into fuller life.

It is of course very hard to wean ourselves away from self-centeredness. People can dream such a thing but that hope should not be fulfilled without a solemn decision that, whatever the difficulties, we are committed to the way of generous love.

You have both made your decision today – “I will” – and by making this new relationship, you have aligned yourselves with what we believe is the way in which life is spiritually evolving, and which will lead to a creative future for the human race.

We stand looking forward to a century which is full of promise and full of peril. Human beings are confronting the question of how to use wisely a power that has been given to us through the discoveries of the last century. We shall not be converted to the promise of the future by more knowledge, but rather by an increase of loving wisdom and reverence, for life, for the earth and for one another.

Marriage should transform, as husband and wife make one another their work of art. It is possible to transform as long as we do not harbor ambitions to reform our partner. There must be no coercion if the Spirit is to flow; each must give the other space and freedom.

As the reality of God has faded from so many lives in the West, there has been a corresponding inflation of expectations that personal relations alone will supply meaning and happiness in life. This is to load our partner with too great a burden. We are all incomplete: we all need the love which is secure, rather than oppressive; we need mutual forgiveness, to thrive.

As we move towards our partner in love, following the example of Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit is quickened within us and can increasingly fill our lives with light. This leads to a family life which offers the best conditions in which the next generation can practice and exchange those gifts which can overcome fear and division and incubate the coming world of the Spirit, whose fruits are love and joy and peace.

St. Philip's Summer Concerts

The United States Air Force Heritage of America Band has a rich history of inspiring hearts and minds, building and sustaining American patriotism, and enhancing esprit-de-corps in the United States Air Force. It was one of the original Army Air Corps bands, created by order of the Secretary of War on October 1, 1941 and assigned to Barksdale Field, Louisiana. In June 1946, after a short stay at Brooks Field, Texas, the band arrived at Langley Air Force Base, Virginia, its current home.

On Tuesday evening June 14th, at 7:30 PM, St. Philip's will host one of the band's five smaller touring ensembles, the Langley Winds. Each year, the band's ensembles travel more than 30,000 miles to perform hundreds of concerts for listeners across a six-state region from Pennsylvania to South Carolina.

For over 10 years the Langley Winds, a woodwind sextet, have been inspiring audiences and enhancing Air Force esprit-de-corps with superb artistry in a broad range of musical performances. Under the leadership of bassoonist MSgt Julie Stockdill the ensemble performs classical recitals, college master classes, school assemblies, and official military functions. Members have performed with the Waco Symphony, Aspen Music Festival Orchestra, West Virginia Symphony, and Central Ohio Symphony Orchestra. The sextet includes Master Sergeant Julie Stockdil, bassoon, Technical Sergeant, Anne Epperly, flute, Staff Sergeant Grace Ruttay, oboe, Staff Sergeant Jeffrey Boehmer, clarinet, and Airman 1st class, Daniel Omer, French horn. All members of the ensemble hold degrees in musical performance from institutions ranging from the NC School of the Arts to the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music.

Invite your friends and neighbors to come and enjoy this outstanding evening of music in the sanctuary of St. Philips on Tuesday, June 14th, at 7:30 PM. The concert is free and open to the public. We would love to see the pews packed for this second concert in our Summer Music Series.

Summer Time Fun in the Sun

Just like the children, I look forward to summer; not that I get three months off or even have less work but the focus changes. Summer allows me the time to focus on the programs we offer at St. Philip's. It gives me time to see what is working and what can be tweaked before we start up again in the fall. Summer also provides the time to develop new programs.

The most obvious Christian Education Program is Sunday school. This year we had 30 children participate on a regular basis in four classes. Ideally, we would have had five classes with a total of 20 teachers. While this may seem a high teacher/student ratio, we are required to have two teachers in each class. To allow for teachers not to have to be present EVERY Sunday, we try to have two sets of teachers per class. This year we had 11 teachers. These people certainly deserve your gratitude and a break! They were Mike Burke, Jennifer Gould, Tina Powers, Thomas Kohler, Ginger Munroe, Todd Adkins, Lyn Sutton, Jennifer Williams, Harriet Powell, Joyce Robinson and Nancy Pittenger.

Youth group has continued to grow but we still only meet once a month. This is because at this point, I am the only person who regularly leads the youth. I would love to see this expand to at least twice a month. This fall we are also hoping to start a Jr. Youth group for those in grades 3-5. That will require even more adults to help with the Christian Education Programs.

Speaking of adults, Christian Education isn't just for children! We offer many adult programs ranging from Sunday morning's Rector Forum to Wednesday morning's Bible Study to Seekers which only meets twice a month. **In this month's *Philippian* you will find a survey about adult Christian Education. Please take the time to complete it and return it to the parish office.** We want to be able to provide the types of programs that interest our parishioners.

This summer we will have Vacation Bible School. Starting Sunday, July 10th and culminating on Thursday, July 14th we will be looking at some of the festivals in the Bible. While VBS is predominately a program geared towards young people we do provide an adult class. This class looks at the same stories that are being used by the children during the night. There are activities but not necessarily arts & crafts. It really is a good time and I encourage you to attend. ***PLEASE visit the website or complete a registration form in the Bell tower narthex. It helps with planning if we have an idea of how many adults will be attending the class.***

Enjoy your summer and be prepared to be fully involved with Christian Education this fall!!!!

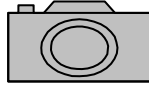


Rated PG

The SILVER and the GOLD

Bob and Meezie Childs are examples of folks who contribute to the wonderful mix of religious traditions at St. Philip's. (Unfortunately, Meezie was called out with a business emergency but will be featured in a future column.) With Bob's mellifluous Texas accent I learned that he moved from northeastern, Jacksonville, Texas to Southeastern (Baptist) Seminary, in Wake Forest, NC, but was ordained a Presbyterian minister in 1959. He was pastor of the Southport Presbyterian Church 1963-69 and Siler City Presbyterian Church from 1969-79, adding that there's a special place in heaven for ministers' wives! By 1989 both Meezie and Bob looked for changes in their church family and were warmly received at St. Philip's – in particular by Millie Hart's mother on their very first visit, and they've been with St. Philip's ever since.



Bob connected with a number of St. Philip's previous pastors, developing a deep friendship with the Rev. Frank Ross in the '80s and mid '90s the Rev. Bob Beasley and Rev. Charles Supin. Now with Rev. Barry Kubler he continues to be involved in worship leadership, preaching on Sundays and officiating at funerals and weddings. He has long felt "at home, comfortable and challenged, in the Episcopal Church, having for years been known as a high-church Presbyterian, or as a prayer book Presbyterian." He believes that assisting in worship is very rewarding and what he was called to do.

Bob and Meezie have two sons, one a medical doctor and the other a police sergeant; and three grandchildren. They own a motel, B & B and restaurant on the Cape Fear River in Southport. He claims Southport is way different from the "dirt poor" way it was in the 60's. There were no outer neighborhoods and the river was lined with small stores and commercial fishermen.

After taking a photo of Bob next to one of the antique fans in his collection (the oldest one is from 1908), we bid adieu and I accepted his warm invite to come back in the late afternoon for a cocktail and a nice view of the passing boats along the river.

Peter and Anne del Sol have hit the ground running, since their move to St. James Plantation and St. Philip's a little over a year ago. Formerly involved with St. John's in Huntington, Long Island, they filled in their visitors card on the very first visit to St. Philip's, as they felt so warmly received. 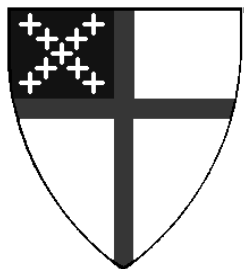
