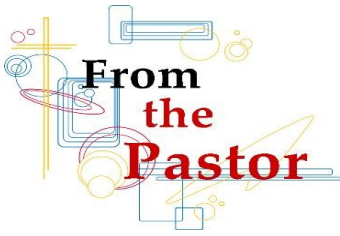

A Time For All Seasons

Ecclesiastes 3:1-8 reminds us there is a time for everything is a Christians' life. There will be good days, and bad days. People coming into our lives, people moving to different places. All in the plan of God. Perhaps, we can loosely apply the meaning of this verse to September 4, 2011. Sunday, September 4th 2011 is the day we say a type of "good bye" to a friend of ours that has been part of our church family for a very long time (since about 1928), the Wangerin organ. September 4th is designated as the last time the Wangerin organ will be used for a church service.

I am going to try something different this fall. It is a practice that has a long history in the Reformed tradition. I am going to preach through an entire book of the Bible.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer, in *Life Together*, urges individuals and families to engage in the “consecutive reading of Biblical books.” He argues that this will help increase our knowledge of Scripture and our understanding of ourselves as participants in God’s story.

It was John Calvin’s practice in Geneva to preach in sequence through an entire book of the Bible. He rejected the medieval lectionary because he believed the readings severed the passages from their context. Many early Reformers followed Calvin’s example, including John Knox in Scotland.

More recently, the lectionary has become accepted in many Reformed circles. I believe the advantages far outweigh the disadvantages (after all, the preacher or a good study Bible can always supply the context of a passage!). This year, in September and October, the epistle readings on four of the

Sundays come from Paul’s letter to the Philippians. I have decided to expand on these selections, and actually read and preach through this entire letter. The schedule will look like this:

Sept 11	Philippians 1:1-20
Sept 18	Philippians 1:21-30
Sept 25	Philippians 2:1-13
Oct 2	Philippians 2:14-30
Oct 9	Philippians 3:1-11
Oct 16	Philippians 3:12-16
Oct 23	Philippians 3:17-4:9
Oct 30	Philippians 4:10-23

I encourage you to spend some time with this book. Read it several times yourself in the coming weeks. Let me know if you benefit from this approach. If I hear from enough of you, perhaps I will try this again sometime soon.

Dear Friends and Family!

Greetings to you from Berlin! We are now at home again, and learning daily about where that is. Emma, in the 9th grade this year, started school yesterday at the John F. Kennedy School – a German public school founded 50 years ago to bring German and American children together in a cross cultural school environment. There was a large American population here at that time, with the Berlin Brigade, an American garrison in West Berlin. The experiment, which began with 50 children, has thrived, and now the school is the largest in the city. We are deeply thankful that Emma has a place there. They have long waiting lists and we see her acceptance as a gift from God.

It has been a summer to remember, except that much of it seems blurred. Sometimes I have to look back at my calendar and pictures to remember the details. The last time I wrote to you, I was alone in Moscow, waiting for the girls to arrive. They arrived without significant problems, though Meg arrived sick. The MacPherson team arrived two days later and we all headed to Oryol for their yearly baptism on the river, and I returned to Moscow to continue sorting. Meg returned a few days later for a doctor's appointment, leaving Emma in camp to take care of the group. Meg felt so bad, that she stayed on for several days with me, and when she was able to get back to camp, she felt even worse (continues of page 5)

Finance

Securing the Future of Your Church

Biblical study can provide many opportunities to increase our understanding of God's purposes for our resources. The Old Testament tells us, gifts were given primarily for atonement, for support of the priestly functions and to support less fortunate people. (cf. Exodus 30:11-16 and Amos 4:4-5). Faithful people were to give from the first fruits of harvest and to leave some in the fields for others to gather (cf. Leviticus 19:9-10 and Deuteronomy 26:10-11).

In the New Testament, Jesus frequently spoke of the "grace of liberality." Paul in his second letter to the Corinthians, focuses on the spirit in which the gift is made, not the amount (8:2-4) and urges them to excel in this grace of giving (8:10).

Endowment Funds and programs are part of a larger vision of stewardship. Our usual image of stewardship revolves around giving from our current income or financial status. This supports the present such as our annual Ministry Budget. Gifts of endowment come from accumulated assets to share your vision for your Church's future. Endowments are established on the generosity of those whose vision includes a fuller response to the mission of God in the world.

*****First Presbyterian Church of Green Bay does have an Endowment Charter whose guidelines are administered by the Finance Committee. Brochures as well as other information are available.**

Review;

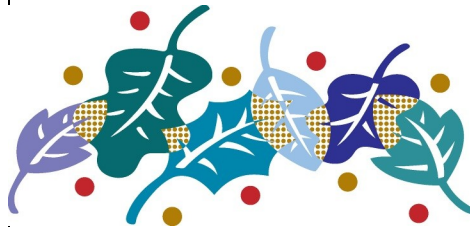
On May 9, 2011 a motion was made and passed by the Finance Committee to adopt a cash flow budgeting policy of providing access to \$4,000 monthly for the current Ministry Budget, beginning July 1st.

From the Finance Committee Minutes of May 9, 2011.

Letter received dated 04/28/11 from the Eply Land Company referencing the renewal of the mineral rights to eight acres of property on Section 16, Bryant County, Oklahoma. Offer was for \$500 per acre for 5 years plus 3/16 or 19% Royalty. This is from a bequest from the Jones Estate. **Motion made and passed: To accept the offer.**

The Church has received a \$4,000 check from the above.

We celebrate with the final disposition of the Marion Waldron Estate. A check has been received for \$2,008.32 and will be added to Marion's initial contribution in her fund in our Church's Perpetual Endowments.

and spent several days sleeping in her tent (not like Meg at all, so we know how crummy she felt). Emma rose to the challenge and did a great job of translating and taking care of her sister. The team did a great job too. We had MacPherson's pastor, Jim Randall, two men that have spent the last 3 years helping with renovations of a house the church purchased as a base for the camp (bathroom facilities, kitchen and future dining hall) and 5 youth, who participated in all the camp activities. The relationship has been growing over the course of 13 years. The bonds between members of the two churches are deep and wide. MacPherson has invited the church in Oryol to send three to North Carolina next summer to participate in their mission trip to a work camp in West Virginia. We are all excited about the prospects.

In the midst of all my sorting and packing, I found a couple of days to go to Davidovo and spend some time in the

camp for handicapped children and their families, and to talk with Father Vladimir and some of the staff about their hopes and dreams for the camp and for community projects. Davidovo is a place I am drawn back to continually. It was a dying village until Father Vladimir and his family, with the help of many friends and some of the villagers, began to restore the church, which after 70 years of neglect was in ruins. The community that came out of this experience looked around at the needs of the village, and began to respond. They established a kindergarten, an elementary school for children struggling in regular classrooms, a shelter for teenage boys, and restored the farm, providing work for the community.

The camp for handicapped children and their families is another response to the needs they have seen around them. They look ahead to establishing a center for the handicapped and think about the issues families fear most – what happens

to the children when their parents die. [Father Vladimir has asked me about the possibility of visiting some facilities for adult handicapped as they think about this issue. As we think about a possible trip, I would be grateful for any suggestions of places we ought to see.]

I hope I can find people ready to participate in one of the two camp sessions next summer. They are always looking for volunteers and they would welcome an American group. They had some Romanians this year. The only common language was English. They managed. I am confident that this would be an extraordinary experience for anyone that came. It is a place that restores the soul.

Al is writing a newsletter to update you all on Roma issues, so I'll let him share about the Roma camp. We had another team from Crestwood PC in Richmond that came to visit their partner in Kirovo-Chipetsk. Gordon Shaffer, the leader of that team, has been coming to Russia as long as I have, so he is quite (continues to page 8)

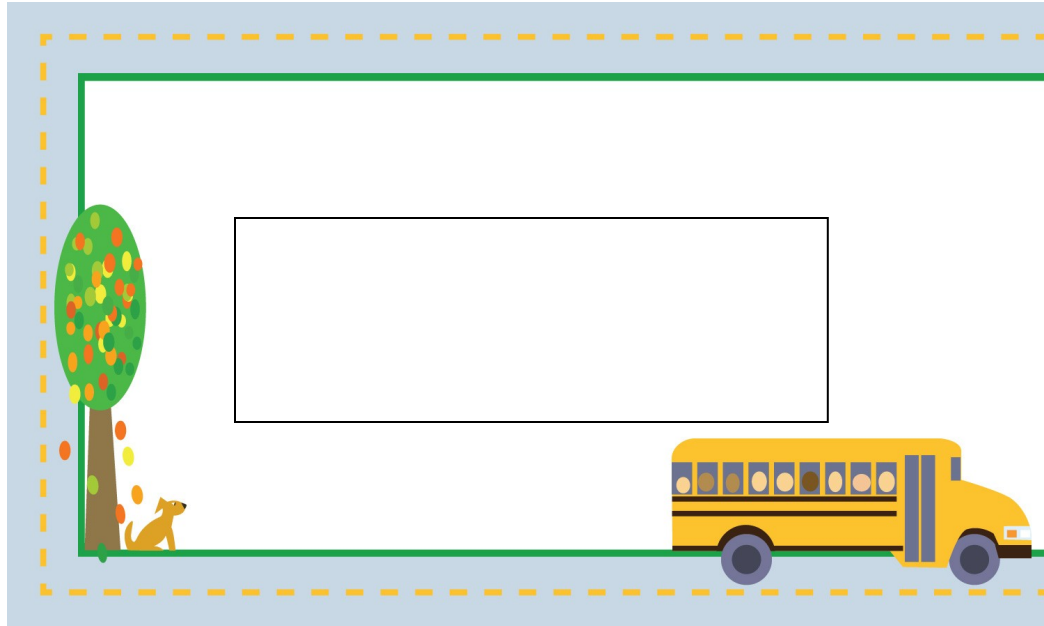
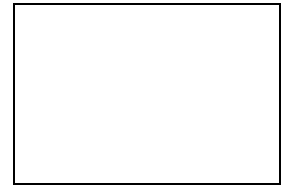

comfortable taking his groups out there without our assistance. They had a great visit, and we had time to connect when they returned to Moscow.

On July 24, we departed for Berlin. The adventure continues! It has been an amazing month. We stayed in a friend's apartment for the first few days, until we could buy enough furniture to function. We moved into our flat with two beds and a sofa. Over the last four weeks, we have made 10 trips to IKEA and scoured used furniture options on Craig's list and at a local charity shop. It was nearly 2 weeks before we had a functioning kitchen (an IKEA kitchen, so we had to build it ourselves). We managed in the meantime with the purchase of a microwave and a very tiny grill. Because we had no refrigerator, we walked to the store 3 times a day. We are still not done, but the flat is now quite comfortable in a very European style. We like it.

We purchased bicycles early on, and those have been wonderful. We have, though, recognized that there are challenges to living in Berlin because of the bicycle lanes. I have never lived in a place where I had to be looking both ways quite so much. Crossing the street is easy enough, but the bicycle lanes often run along half of the sidewalk, and the bicycles can come from either direction at great speed. When we are in the bicycle lanes on our own bicycles, we have to watch constantly for pedestrians who will wander into the lanes and cars that will crowd our lanes to make their turns. Last weekend, we rode our bicycles out to Babelsberg near Potsdam, to see a castle. It was a wonderful day with glorious weather and we enjoyed the trip very much. On the way back, I was in the lead (because I'm the slowest) and rang my bell (all bicycles in Germany have bells – it's a law) to warn a woman to get out of the

bicycle lane. She politely moved out of the lane, but as I passed, her father suddenly walked into the lane sending me flying. I am bruised, but considering the fall, came out of it pretty well. My bicycle is waiting for a new rim and spokes. The bicycles are essential, but we recognize the risks. We will continue to be careful.
