A Congregational Worship Statement First Baptist Church—Lampasas, Texas

FBC Lampasas identifies three essential purposes for church life: connecting with God, connecting with each other, and connecting with a Christian lifestyle. Our main setting for nurturing the God connection together is regular congregational worship.

The importance of worship calls for a statement of convictions that unite us around what Christian worship is. This statement is offered as a tool to define Christian worship, to guide us in the preparation of worship services, and to inform people of what generally can be expected in worship at FBC.

Christian Worship

Christian worship expresses genuine love to God as He is experienced in the gospel of Jesus Christ. Wherever the truth of God inspires a spirit of humble delight in Him, there is worship. In the broadest sense, all of life can be worship. In a narrower sense, Christian worship consists of specific practices that sharpen our attention to God's glory and express our response to God's grace. Our best model for worship in spirit and in truth is Jesus himself.

The purpose of corporate or congregational worship is to gather the church for receiving God's Word, praising God for who He is, and responding to God in loving repentance and faith. The means used for the purpose of worship include (for example) praying, singing, hearing scripture and biblical preaching, making offerings, observing baptism and the Lord's Supper, hearing instrumental worship music, sharing testimonies and commitments, and silently reflecting on God's glory. A balanced worship service helps the congregation both to hear God and to love God with heart, soul, mind, and strength.
