THE GOSPEL READING Luke 3:1-22 | The Proclamation of John the Baptist

³ In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, ² during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. ³ He went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, ⁴ as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah,

"The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight. ⁵ Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be made low, and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth; ⁶ and all flesh shall see the salvation of God.'"

- ⁷ John said to the crowds that came out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? ⁸ Bear fruits worthy of repentance. Do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. ⁹ Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire."
- ¹⁰ And the crowds asked him, "What then should we do?" ¹¹ In reply he said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." ¹² Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?" ¹³ He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you." ¹⁴ Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" He said to them, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages."
- ¹⁵ As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, ¹⁶ John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you

with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with [e] the Holy Spirit and fire. ¹⁷ His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

¹⁸ So, with many other exhortations, he proclaimed the good news to the people. ¹⁹ But Herod the ruler, who had been rebuked by him because of Herodias, his brother's wife, and because of all the evil things that Herod had done, ²⁰ added to them all by shutting up John in prison.

²¹ Now when all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, the heaven was opened, ²² and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

SERMON "Jesus' Baptism"

There are a few things happening today. The first is the celebration of the Baptism of our Lord Jesus. At the end of our text, Luke treats us to a mere glimpse of Jesus' baptism. According to Fred Craddock, far more critical to Luke is "to highlight the post-baptismal revelatory character of Jesus' experience." This revelation of Jesus as God's beloved serves to inform the reader everything that happens in the life of Jesus is sanctioned by the God who claimed Abraham and his descendants as God's own, the one who created all that is. In other words, Jesus has God's approval and authority.

The second thing happening today is the movement from Christmastide into Epiphany and Epiphany into the adult life and ministry of Jesus. Last week, Darcie talked to the children about the star that led the wise men to find Jesus. That star was the revelatory experience that the wise men needed to trust that this was, in fact, the son of God. And in response to the gravity of the moment and the God made flesh nature of this child, the men, being wise, brought gifts. Because of the seriousness and the station of God's son born on earth, they brought meaningful gifts.

The third thing happening on this first Sunday of the Epiphany season; our response to the Epiphany, to the revelation that he is the son of God incarnate revealed this day as God's beloved following his baptism. What will be our response to this joy to the world?

Luke's response to the life, ministry, and sacrifice of Jesus Christ was to record his gospel "so that [we] may know the truth." And in these first verses in chapter three that lead us to the water as Jesus is baptized are John's words about our response to God. Luke tells us that John goes into the wilderness to prepare the way of the Lord. Fred Craddock reminds us that "the desert [- the wilderness -] is not simply a place designation; it recalls Israel's formation as God's covenant people and hence implies a return to God." So John is in the wilderness around the Jordan River, just as the prophet Isaiah claimed, where all flesh shall see the salvation of God. And in the fashion of the Old Testament prophets, John delivers scathing instructions to the people who flock to him to be baptized.

Fred Craddock points to the much shorter preambles to Jesus' baptism in Mark and Matthew's gospel as a signifier that Luke's much longer preamble - much more detailed account of John the Baptist's ministry - signifies how vital repentance is to the gospel of Jesus. Our response then to God's grace in our lives is indeed the sharing of the gospel, is indeed building up the kingdom of heaven, is indeed loving our neighbor. But first, our gratitude for God's salvation must be repentance. For only in repentance can we accomplish John's directive to bear good fruit, fruit that is worthy of true repentance.

And John the Baptist here is precise - he says to the people who want to be baptized in verse 8, "don't tell me that you're special because you are among God's chosen people, for God could create more people out of these rocks if God so chose. To respond to God, you have to be honest about your sin, about your hatred, about your selfishness and greed. True repentance cannot take the form of a snake, slithering back and forth around the truth, biting with poison fangs any who get close. No, true repentance looks like sharing what you have with those who need it. True repentance looks like not stealing or swindling money from those who have no choice but to pay. True repentance looks like not using force to shake down those with less power than you and be satisfied with all you have.

As John says all of this, the people begin to understand, and they start to wonder if he is the messiah, for what he is saying rings with the truth they long to hear. The truth for which all who seek repentance search. The truth that their leader, King Herod, cannot abide. The truth that God is working right now to gather up all of the wheat. For as Fred Craddock warns, "when repentance and forgiveness are available, judgment is good news. We hear this in verse 18. Judgment is not scary news, for repentance is the seed that allows us to bear good fruit. It is this message of the truth of the gospel, this message of repentance for which the leader of the people imprisoned John the Baptist. Repentance is possible, and God's grace is within reach. But those who turn away, those that would remain a viper, will be cut down and thrown into the fire. And so we are led then, to Jesus' Baptism. A baptism, unlike Mark's and Matthew's story. John is not present, but instead, the spotlight of Luke's gospel shifts away from the prologue of repentance toward the plot of the transforming power of the Spirit of God. This is the same Spirit that embodies Jesus, blesses Jesus, and shares the truth of our salvation with the world. Jesus' coming out party is complete. He has been announced by a prophet in the wilderness in the words of Israel's most influential prophet, thus fulfilling and affirming his authentic lineage from God's chosen people. He has now been baptized alongside everyone else, bridging the idea that God's Spirit is not merely on him but on each one who participates in a baptism of repentance.

My friends, we have each been baptized in the same ritual cleansing as our Lord Jesus. And in our baptism, we have been called to repent of our sin and acknowledge our failings that we might be set free to bear excellent and worthy fruit. Like a dove, the Holy Spirit has landed on each of us, inspiring us to share what we have with those in need. God calls each of us beloved and desires for us to participate within a community of kingdom-building Jesus followers who refuse to settle for the world's standards but instead insist on setting the example of Jesus as our standard for love, truth, and humility.

So let us repent that we might be bearers of good fruit, that we might believe that we are loved, that we might be inspired to love others because God first loved each of us. Amen.
