A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR LOWELL NELSON

Dear American Lutheran Church family and friends,

Welcome to May 2020! It is an amazing time to be alive, isn't it?

Now before you get frustrated with me uttering such a simplistic phrase, bear with me. "Amazing" is an overused term; overused to differentiate consumer products and services from competitors. Beyond consumerism, we truly are living in amazing times. The English Language Learners Dictionary defines *amaze* as twofold:

- First, to surprise and sometimes confuse someone very much.
- Second, to fill someone with wonder. I think that is an accurate way to describe our times. Don't you feel surprised these days, often on a daily basis? Certainly, the surprises are confusing; news sources differ in their predictions and in their advice, and governmental policies change dramatically.

People of faith, like all people, prefer life when things are "normal," the accustomed way of being, of having a steady orientation to life. Yet we are now experiencing the great disruption of pandemic in all its forms: worries about life & death for ourselves and our family, concerns for safety and adequate food, struggles for meaningful work and income, mounting frustration and anger, and a variety of other experiences. This is a time of disorientation for our country and for our world. Though don't forget the other description of amazing: to be filled with wonder. How can that be?

People of faith have the Biblical story to guide us in this time; the stories of Jesus' death, resurrection and ascension are the focus of our May lectionary readings leading up to Pentecost, the last weekend in May. Jesus speaks of abundant life. How can that be? The time of disorientation challenges us to let go of self-reliance and turn to full reliance upon Christ! God is in the midst of this time, leading us back to the only secure foundation found in the love of Christ. Remember; when you are feeling anxious it is a 100% accurate indicator that it's time to pray! God is faithful and will lead us to a new orientation of living, a "new normal" to express our congregational commitment to live out our ALC's mission. We proclaim the love of God in Jesus Christ, invite people to join us in ministry and bless others in word and deed. This mission touches the lives of our own congregational members and pours through us out into the community, Synod and world. While the ways we express this may dramatically change, our mission will keep us focused.

Proclaiming the Gospel is the firm foundation of faith, creating the spiritual incentive to invite people into this faith community and amplifying the Holy Spirit's power to bless others in all we say and do. In times of disorientation we return to the basics of faith. Never forget our Lutheran faith heritage:

A sinner is justified by grace alone (sola gratia) through faith alone (sola fide) for the sake of Christ alone (solus Christus), truth revealed to us in Scripture alone (sola Scriptura).

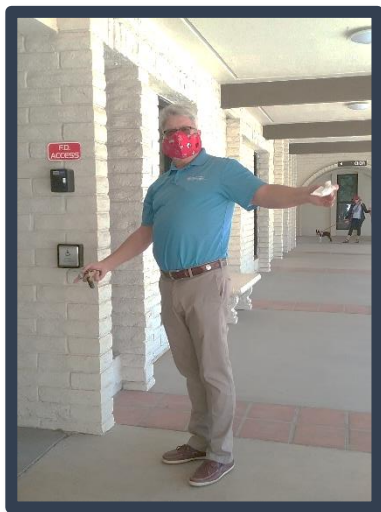

A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR JUDITH RAINFORTH

What an interesting time these past months have been serving as your pastor at ALC. I now wonder how so much could have transpired over such a short time.

My journey started from my home in Nebraska just after my 450-mile Camino Santiago pilgrimage along the coast of Spain. I flew from Nebraska to Madrid on September 13th and returned home by flying back from Porto, Portugal on October 23rd. In a couple of days, I drove away from my home to San Diego for a Leading Age Conference. It was part of my board duties for Immanuel Communities, a Senior Housing Organization in Nebraska. I spent 5 days going to the conference and then drove to Arizona where I promptly moved into a condo in Surprise, Arizona. This was just in time to report to American Lutheran Church for orientation as I began my six-month contract to serve as a pastor alongside Pastor Lowell.

The beginning was quite predictable as I met staff and parishioners and settled into my office. The usual duties for ordained ministry continued to unfold and of course it continued to be a busy time in my life. This part of the pilgrimage was much different than my Camino!

It was not until February and March that my life here changed dramatically. Pastor Lowell was not serving alongside me because he was home, diagnosed with Valley Fever and pneumonia. Sadly, I faced the fact that he was suffering and had no idea when he would return or *if* he would return as Senior Pastor. I put on another hat to serve in both our roles. I thank God that with my energy level, my determination, the love of God and the people of ALC, I was able to adjust to the dual ministry, and of course weeks before Pastor Lowell could come back into his role as Senior Pastor working from home on April 1, the horrible pandemic arrived.

All in all, through prayer and God's guidance, we have been able to continue our ministry here in new and creative ways as we await the time when we can gather together inside the walls, as well as outside the walls of ALC, being the hands and feet of Jesus. I feel blessed that I have been invited back and have signed another ministry contract as full-time, year-round Pastor of Spirituality and Care.


Upon my return in June, I will participate in weekly worship and design as well as lead Advent and Lenten weekly services. I will work with Pastors and staff to enhance Wellness/Care ministry including pastoral visits, funerals/memorial services and pastoral counseling. My involvement will also be in the design and leading of faith formation and

discipleship training. There will be a focus on Women's Ministry and leadership development.

I am amazed as I look at my life and how it has unfolded, and know that we never know where God is leading us. As a called and ordained minister of the Word of God, I follow and live with a grateful heart. My prayer is for our world to be healed as God provides answers and miracles in the midst of this dark time of the coronavirus pandemic.

With Resurrection Faith we take the hand of Jesus and say, "Here I am Lord, Lead me!" Our pilgrimage continues as we embrace opportunities to listen to the voice of God, and as we serve God and God's people one day at a time! Thank each of you for your love and support.

“What’s happening at American Lutheran Church?” might be a question that many of you might be asking, especially since we haven’t been able to meet in worship and fellowship. Hopefully, you are receiving by mail, or through email, our weekly updates and our monthly Outreach newsletter. For those of you who have online access, we hope you are visiting us on Facebook and/or our website so you can see our devotionals and sermons.

Pastor Gary Garvey and Dianne left this week, returning to family and friends. We will see them again in our pews when they return in the fall. Pastor Judith will be leaving for Nebraska later this week. She will return again in June to begin her new contract with us as a full-time Pastor. Pastor Lowell has been “released” from his doctors to work at home, so there was no need to bring on a temporary pastor, as we originally thought. Pastor Lowell and Pastor Gary Ulrich will continue to work remotely from home. We are waiting to hear more from our Bishop as to when we might reopen.

The Navajo Nation is continuing to have problems with water, food, getting protective gear and the coronavirus in general. There are ways we can help. The Navajo Mission is giving out 200 boxes a day to families. They are in need of the following:

- Canned chicken (not tuna)
- Canned fruits and vegetables
- Blue Bird flour (it’s better for fry bread)
- Pasta/pasta sauce
- Paper products

If you are interested in donating any of these items, Judie and Larry Stage (623-337-7747) will pick them up from your home and bring them to Christ the Lord Church in Carefree, where they will be delivered to the Mission. Also, there is a call for supplies and sewers. Susan Olson will be working with others to make masks, get bandanas, etc. They are in need of the following:

- Fabric
- Elastic
- Bias binding
- Knee high nylons
- Bandanas
- Sandwich bags for packing the masks

Sue will answer phone calls at 623-215-2475 and emails at npmilw@gmail.com and coordinate distribution of fabric and supplies. She will also be at the church on Sunday, May 3rd and 10th between 10:00-10:30 for any intake of materials.

I think you will all agree that although these might be small gestures, they mean a lot! We are in this together. “God, stretch out my hands in love toward others in my community and beyond. In Jesus’ name. Amen.” (Christ in Our Home, April, May, June 2020).

THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

At the end of March, our regular giving income was down \$32,644 or 9% from plan. Our operational expenses were slightly greater than planned. Your Finance committee and Church Council are working diligently now (mid-April) to adjust or postpone spending to mitigate the effects of the coronavirus pandemic on our congregation’s financial health. Since we are not able to conduct services and events in our buildings, our expenses are naturally dropping. Thank you to all stewards who continue to give joyfully and generously. Even though we are not able to worship, pray, and commune together we need to continue to support our congregation and programs with our regular giving. Please continue your weekly giving and consider increasing your gifts to help make up for the revenue we are losing because of the current health crisis. As we report this on April 15th, Easter week has passed. We are hoping and praying that your generous giving continues to exceed our ongoing expenses.

NEIGHBORHOOD GROUPS

To be living in this world of COVID-19 is a most challenging time for each one of us. It reminds me of a similar challenge that I, my family and friends experienced in 1939-1945. As a young boy living in England 70 miles northeast of London, there was a need to stay in our homes or run to air raid shelters, whenever enemy bombers were thought to be approaching the coast of England in our area.

These air raids were almost daily for a period of several months, but we had no idea where, when, or for how long we would experience the bombing. The wailing of air raid sirens was the signal to be diligent. We needed to carry our gas masks with us at all times – while at home, at school, shopping with mum, playing with friends, even going to church. Daily cleanliness of the gas masks was very important.

Also, most importantly we had a dearth of many household goods and foods. Rationing of food and household supplies was quite normal in England until 1951. We stayed in touch with family by mail, as home phones were almost non-existent.

In similar ways today we all need to be aware of our surroundings, wear masks and keep our distance from others who may contaminate us, search for toilet paper, paper towels and disinfectant wipes, and stay indoors as much as possible.

Fortunately, today we have cell phones and computers so we can almost instantly stay in touch with family and friends.

Our neighborhood groups are a great way to meet, greet and communicate with several members of ALC. So, even though we are all sequestered at this time in our lives, please stay in touch with members of your neighborhood group and with other church members. They are your very close friends and need to know that.
