We're Still Here: Contemporary Virginia Indians Tell Their Stories, Sandra F. Waugaman and Danielle Moretti-Langholtz, 2000, 107 pp.

This book is a collaboration of the authors and Virginia Indians to give the reader insight into the rich history, current reservation culture, and hopes for the future of Virginia Indians. The book includes extensive interviews, photographs, a glossary, and other resources to tell the story of these indigenous people.

The Forgotten Slavery of Our Ancestors is a short video from Teaching Tolerance which offers an introduction to the history of Indigenous enslavement on land that is now the United States. As the featured historians point out, the enslavement of Indigenous peoples stretched from Alaska into South America. It predated and helped shape the system of African enslavement in New England, and it lasted until throughout the 19th century in the West. "This," explains historian Andrés Reséndez, "is our shared history." Directed and edited by Howdige Brown III, *The Forgotten Slavery of Our Ancestors* was produced by Marie Acemah and Alice Qannik Glenn. The running time for this video is just over 12 minutes long.
