President's Corner

Summer is now here, and we continue to move forward with a number of projects that help us to build community. Whether it is a building project (and we have more than our share this year) or a trip to South Dakota or Guatemala, we are continually building relationships. God wants us to build those relationships in order to work together in his ministry as the Body of Christ.

On July 18, 2019 we will participate in the kick-off of Lumberjack Days with the Ice Cream Social at the Historic Courthouse, which is kiddy corner from our church. We will provide food and games. We will again provide family friendly pricing on all of our food items thanks to the generosity of Cub Foods who has donated all of the brats and hot dogs for the event. We still need donations for pop, water and chips. We will have the ring toss and therefore need about 125 large bottles of pop. More importantly, we need volunteers as some of our volunteers will be on the trip to Guatemala. Remember all of the proceeds for this event go to defray costs of the two mission trips this summer.

At the June 30th, 2019 Worship Service, we previewed and discussed another opportunity to provide housing for our homeless youth. In the next few weeks, we will be discussing this topic at the adult forum as we have found a seven-bedroom. 2250 square foot modular home; which is fully furnished with beds and appliances for approximately \$78,000. We will be inviting other churches both ELCA and other denominations to meetings, if the congregation and council approve moving forward with this project. There are a number of options to discuss including putting a full basement under the home and therefore creating additional bedrooms with the use of egress windows.

We need to discuss the location of the building as we may have the ability to utilize some of our own property, so that the housing is near our church and the Youth Drop-In Center. We will also look at alternatives on vacant parcels within Stillwater. As I indicated, we only want to proceed if the congregation and the council support the project. This next addition will answer and move toward our goal of providing affordable housing, especially to our homeless youth. I will also require us to do some planning as to how we meet the needs of a home that will have the for 24-hour staffing. After the service, a member came forward and made a commitment of \$5,000 towards this project if the church decides to proceed with it. I encourage you to come to adult forum and discuss this project and how we might continue to build community for young people in Stillwater.

You will also be hearing about other projects including the possibility of a Thanksgiving meal to be cooked by a Chef at our church. We will be discussing what benefits something like this could have in offering fellowship and again building community.

We will look into what other churches are doing and whether we should partner with them in these types of projects.

You will also notice changes in our staff as we are advertising for an office coordinator to work approximately 16 hours per week. The office is now open Monday through Thursday from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.. I want to thank the office volunteers, Adele Urhammer, Judy Clausen, Nancy Grebis, Shelley Jokinen and Jacqueline Shoeberg for volunteering time in the office. If anyone else is interested in volunteering please let Pastor or I know, as I am sure we can find things for you to do.

The Council decided unanimously that we needed to move in a different direction with our Youth, Family and Education program. As a result, we will be reviewing our needs for the Sunday School and confirmation programs and our opportunity to reach out to young people. We will then determine what staffing is necessary to meet our needs. As you are aware, vacation bible school is our next opportunity to building community in August and we could really use your help this year.

At the special congregation meeting we discussed the 2019 improvement projects which are estimated to cost \$183,000. The congregation had approved \$63,000 at the annual meeting but the organ, roof, new heating and air units, flat-roofing project, skylight maintenance and renovation of the lounge and choir room required the special meeting. The congregation approved a loan from our accounts under the supervision of Business Management of \$150,000. We are hoping to only utilize \$120,000. This works out to about \$600 per giving unit in the church. We intend to pay back the loan over five-year period. We are encouraging as many members

as can afford it, to pay the \$600.00 in advance so we can lower the amount necessary to borrow. A member has already stepped forward with a donation of \$22,000 which will be used to defray the costs of the roof project. Your help allows us to make the necessary repairs and be able to offer our building for a number of different uses during the year. If you have any questions, please talk with Barb Dietrich the chair of property and grounds.

We have a number of opportunities yet this summer to build community including our annual picnic and outdoor service and ice cream social with Nelson's ice cream in August. I hope you will make the time to participate in as many events as are possible. If you have any questions please make sure you ask one of the council members, the Pastor or myself. We welcome the input.

"You have searched me, LORD, and you know me. You know when I sit and when I rise; you perceive my thoughts from afar. You discern my going out and my lying down; you are familiar with all my ways." Psalm 139:1-3

Leadership

There has been a lot written on Leadership. When I Googled it there were seven hundred and eighty-four million hits. When you think about leadership what type of people come to mind? What are the qualities and characteristics you look for in a leader?

When Jesus chose leaders, he went way beyond the normal expectations that people had of leaders in his day for this new community he was forming – the church. The type of leaders he chose radically redefined and shaped his image for the church. His early choice of Peter would have shocked people. A poor, uneducated working-class fisherman, but Jesus even went so far to call him the "rock" of this new community of faith. And then Jesus chose Matthew, a wealthy, corrupt tax collector and not to be outdone he chose Mary Magdalene who was possessed by no less than seven demons.

So, what is it about these three very different people that Jesus chose them to be leaders? Every one of them was willing to give up everything for Jesus, so it begs the question, "how much are you willing to give up in order to be a follower of Jesus?" The other thing that I noticed about all three is that they were willing to let Jesus create humility in them through the inner and outer struggles of life. I've learned that humility is not something you can simply choose to do – at least not the kind of humility Jesus desires – it something that Jesus does in you as you continually seek him daily.

Humility is the opposite of pride, and pride always desires attention, and the desire to be seen as relevant and significant by others. Pride is also about winning and getting our way. Humility only seeks to glorify Jesus and a desire to serve others so that they can grow into their full potential. The humble leader rejoices in the success of others and not their own. One Christian writer said, "I am convinced that the Christian leader of the future is called to be completely irrelevant and to stand in this world with nothing to offer but his or her vulnerable self. That is the way Jesus came to reveal God's love."

I know for some people that can sound alarming, but when you study the life and ministry of Jesus that's exactly what he did so that God's will would be done, and we are to do the same. Listen to what Paul writes in Philippians chapter two. "Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of the others. In your relationships with one another, have the same mindset as Christ Jesus: Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage; rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to death—even death on a cross!" Philippians 2:3-8.

I hope that you will also see and understand that Jesus has chosen you, just as he chose Peter, Matthew and Mary, to be leaders in his church. My prayer is that we will all desire and pray that our Lord will lead us into a deeper understanding and practice of humble servant leadership.

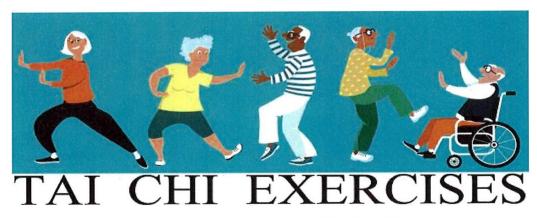
