Minutes of Executive Board Meeting

1. Richard Jones, Moderator, opened the September 15th meeting of the Executive Board meeting at 6:30 am at Wally's Restaurant in East Ridge.
2. The minutes of the May meeting of the Executive Board were reviewed and stood approved.
3. R. C. Thornbury, Director of HaCoBACare, brought his report. Gerald Lawson was present to be introduced to the group by R.C. Thornbury.
4. Sybil Jacks, WMU Director, report was given by Becky Witt.
5. Richard Blalock, Treasurer, gave the financial report and explained the proposed budget was listed for review only. The budget is adopted at the annual meeting during October each year.
6. Steve Roper, Baptist Collegiate Minister at UTC, gave his report.
7. Becky Witt, Administrator of Finance and Language, gave information about the East Lake ESL new start up classes. These classes are on Thursday evenings and started after training had just been completed in August. The financial books, budgeting and work of the finance and personnel committee continues to prepare to close the fiscal year on September 30th.
8. David Myers, Director of Missions, gave announcements, introductions to those new to the meetings, and noted that the time of the meeting is with special interest to those bivocational pastors and church leaders unable to attend day meetings. David also noted the budget decrease of over eight percent proposed for adoption in the Annual meeting. The meeting will provide time for a free meal that the TN Baptist Convention is offering as they promote Cooperative Program giving.
9. David Martin, Webmaster, was present and requested that all churches constantly update their phone, emails, and any data with HCBA and for the churches promotion available on the HCBA website at www.baptistassociation.com.
10. The consideration was to review the proposed budget, but no questions were asked and no vote is taken at this meeting.
11. The meeting adjourned with 21 present.

What a good Annual Meeting we had! Concord was a wonderful host for the meeting. The ushers, greeters and helpers of all kinds were most cordial in their welcome and in taking whatever measures to see that all of the messengers were welcomed and comfortable. The choir and music directed by Drew Scott were excellent. A few people asked us why our association was giving emphasis to the Cooperative Program when we do not get regular support through the Cooperative Program. We believe in cooperative giving. This is a genius, God-given plan to amply supply the financial support for our multiple Baptist causes in proper proportion and it provides the giver with a means of being a part of every facet of Southern Baptist life without having the nightmare of getting money to all the thousands of persons, programs and ministries that we support. We have a part in every one of the ministries of our Baptist work together. Giving to this larger Baptist work is only a part of our giving. Giving to the local association is another part of our giving to support our mission enterprise. I think Jerry Massey and Gary Rickman did a great job in promoting our work together.

It was a blessing to welcome two new church plants, Journey Chattanooga and Southside Bible Fellowship, into our association family and to recognize two churches petitioning to become a part of the association upon the vote of the association next year, Lyndon Avenue Baptist and Bethlehem Missionary Baptist. It was a historic, momentous occasion to have the messengers accept overwhelmingly the request of Highland Park Baptist Church to return as a part of the association. After a break in the spirit of cooperation and brotherhood extending more than fifty years, the association and Highland Park received each other as fellow servants and co-laborers with the Lord to advance the cause of Christ through this association in our community. The journey culminated in this event has been long. It was sometimes accompanied by misunderstandings, misinformation, hard feelings, disappointments, anger, jealousy and bitter spirits. Both the association and the church must take deserved responsibility for each one's contribution to the separation and resulting strife. Both the association and the church can also take delight for an emerging spirit of brotherhood, commitment to the Lord and His work, a heart felt desire to join hands and the submission to God's grace that initiated this step toward healing and hope. Time will reveal the good brought to the Kingdom by this step and time will allow differences and wounds to heal as they fade into the distant past. We are laborers together with God. With the emphasis on "together" and "God," I am convinced the path ahead will bring rewarding experiences as we focus on Kingdom service.

The association also adopted a reduced budget based on current income which we hope will be sustained through next year, if not increased. The staff and committees continue to be take seriously the responsibility of being good stewards of the resources provided the association.

Constitution of the Hamilton County Baptist Association

Article III, Membership

Section 4. Churches desiring to affiliate with the Association shall make written petition upon the form supplied by the Association their desire and pledging their cooperation with this Association. Said petition shall be referred to the Administrative Leadership Team. Such petitionary letters shall be acknowledged at the next Annual Meeting of the Association and voted on at the following Annual Meeting of the Association upon evidence of cooperation in the associational and denominational work during the intervening year, and the recommendation of the Administrative Leadership Team. If the application is approved by a majority vote of the messengers present, the messengers of such church shall be received and the moderator, on behalf of the Association, shall extend the right hand of fellowship.

Churches which have withdrawn from the Association but wish to rejoin the Association shall present their request to the Administrative Leadership Team for study. Upon the team's recommendation the church shall be received into the Association by a majority vote of the messengers present at the next Annual Meeting of the Association and the Moderator shall extend the right hand of fellowship to the church's representatives.

A newly constituted church which was a mission of an affiliated church or a newly constituted church formed by a group of members from an affiliated church may be considered for membership in the same manner as a church which had previously been a member and withdrew from the association.

Language Missions

1) English as a Second Language (ESL)

A word on Tutoring children.....**TUTORING**

I know that some churches and rec centers have afterschool programs that involve tutoring, but in my opinion that really raises the level of responsibility on the part of the church or rec center. I have heard of churches in other cities that have an arrangement with the school system where the school bus drops students off at the church. I don't know if the Hamilton County System would do that, but they do for rec centers. The parents would then pick the students up at the church, but someone would have to be ready to stay with students who aren't picked up on time since that's bound to happen sooner or later. The church also has to be responsible for training volunteers to be aware of child abuse issues, such as making sure a child is never alone with an adult - for the safety of both.

The tutors who have taken the Tutoring Children and Youth Workshop at Hamilton County Baptist Association have either helped family members, neighbors or found their own placement in local schools by calling their neighborhood school and offering their services. I used many of the volunteers at my teaching school/Elementary. They usually came for an hour or two, once or twice a week. Most of the volunteers read with the same students all the time. Other volunteers went to a classroom and read with any student who wanted to read, or helped students take Accelerated Reader tests on the computer. I teach at Red Bank Elementary and they have talked about looking for tutors to come to their class to read with students. I think other schools / teachers would want help, too.

The Tutoring Children and Youth Workshop has sessions the second Saturday (Feb. 7) dedicated to looking at different ways to organize a ministry also. It will be covered in the manual. To help your family and your church it might be good to get some people to the workshop in January if possible. That's basic tutoring techniques. Then you can make some decisions about where to go from there.

The classes are from 9-3 on both Saturdays. Jan 31, 9-noon is focused on reading and the afternoon is on the new math. Feb. 7 continues in other areas and will be described. Come join me on the Jan 31st 9-3. Give it a try for your own children and grandchildren!

Baptist Collegiate Ministries

Our ministry to students at both Chattanooga State and UT-Chattanooga are both exploring new avenues of ministry while continuing many of the same ministries that we have had for many years.

At Chattanooga State, the traditional approaches to campus ministry have proven ineffective for many years. Much of this is attributable to the highly transient nature of a commuter campus, the absence of much in the way of “student life” on campus as well as our own reduced resources in both personnel and finances. Nonetheless, we continue to explore different avenues for meaningful student contact with the hope of developing significant relationships with students, staff and faculty. This year we have been most fortunate. We have had the opportunity for our Intern, Jordan Jackson, to teach a weekly class for the college on the topic of student success. This provides her with meaningful student contact with over 30 students, twice each week. While a great opportunity, we continue to explore appropriate ways in which to leverage this into opportunities for deeper, spiritual conversation.

At UT-Chattanooga we have been facing a difficult year of rebuilding lost leadership due to graduation. While it has been a difficult start, we are beginning to see some positive things begin to happen. Our lunch program has been very successful each week ...attracting not only many students but faculty and staff as well. We have had a couple of very successful fellowship events recently...our Corn Maize and Halloween Party. Also, our recent local mission day working with Widows Harvest saw 16 persons out at 8am on Saturday morning to build a wheelchair ramp. We will be having a retreat in partnership with White Oak Baptist Church during this weekend (Nov. 14-16). Our hope is to take a mission team to work with Whirlwind Missions in Doraville, GA, at the end of the semester. In addition, we are working diligently to start a new ministry utilizing Family Groups for the spring.

We are busy and working hard to be as effective as possible. We would appreciate your prayers.

Search Committee Orientation Available

Offered upon Request of Church -- and -- Resume Safeguards & Precautions

The association takes specific steps to help prevent persons with criminal backgrounds from having resumes in the files of this office from which churches may choose. The association receives resumes from potential ministers and staff persons daily through email, fax and ground mail.

For more than ten years, no resume is put into the resume files until the person returns a signed form indicating he/she has no convictions for certain crimes and also gives approval for a police background check. The church is expected to do a

thorough investigation. Given a reasonable amount of time for the individual to return the signed form, the resume is discarded if the form has not been returned.

At the request of any search committee, David Myers will provide a free orientation session for the committee at their church including: interview questions, reference questions, release forms for information, committee organization suggestions, "call" procedures, search processes and other questions raised by the committee.

Clothing and footwear distribution is continuing at a very good pace. Summer clothing has been changed out for our winter clothing. We are in great need of blankets for the coming cold weather. We give out the blankets as fast as they come in. There is a control over distribution; however, no formal reporting on the activity has been initiated. No plans are in the immediate future to start monthly reports..

From August to October, the Baptist Nursing Fellowship at HaCoBACare checked 196 clients' blood pressures, dispensed 73 pairs of glasses, 8 consultations regarding specific health problems. There are 3 nurses who serve, but there is a need for a few more to help with on the days when we have no nurse scheduled. The program is headed by Mrs Mary Louise Gunnells, who is BNF coordinator for the Hamilton County WMU.

HaCoBACare has a great need for reading glasses of varied strengths. pairs on hand are dwindling fast, and more popular strengths are very limited. We are hoping a church or group in a church will accept the responsibility of supplying glasses as a project.

The response to the request for school supplies has been awesome. Individuals and some groups have been very generous. Although we do not have an exact number, we have helped many children with school supplies this fall.

As we prepare for the Thanksgiving season we find that God has supplied our needs according to his riches with Turkeys and Hams. Thanksgiving is upon us and Christmas will be here before we know it, and we will have Turkeys to give. We do have A need for Christmas toys, unless we start getting toys quickly, we will have to restrict our distribution to one week this year instead of our traditional two weeks. I know that things are bad for everyone—but GOD. He can still supply. Let's trust Him, and do our part.
