Executive Board Highlights

November 2010

Moderator Tony Wilson, pastor of White Oak Church, and Vice Moderator, Alan Rogers, pastor of New Salem Church, began their terms of office. David Myers, Director of Missions, shared the mission effort of the Primera Iglesia Bautista Hispana along with the Oak Grove Church in forming a new Hispanic mission in the Oak Grove Community. A Fall Festival was held on October 30th on the Oak Grove property.

Dr. Myers also reminded those present of the desire of the associational staff to arrange for displays, booths and/or speakers at mission events and any other time the local churches wish to inform the membership about the ministry of the association.

Sandy Bishop, Director of the WMU, presented her oral report. The theme for the WMU this year is "Unhindered, Unstoppable, Undistracted."

January 2011

The January meeting was postponed due to inclement weather. There are no minutes for January.

March 2011

Sandy Bishop, Director of the WMU, announced the WMU State Get-Together is scheduled for the first of April. The annual WMU meeting will be hosted by Brainerd Hills on the first of May. The speaker will be from the Women at Risk organization in Cleveland.

Gerald Lawson, Director of HaCoBA Care Center, announced that 845 children received toys from 36 volunteers who worked in that ministry this year.

Becky Witt, Administrator of Finance and Language Ministries, reported that, in addition to the churches, about 30 groups or individuals give to HCBA causes monthly. She noted that the TN Baptist Medical Grant was used at HaCoBA Care.

Becky also reported that 35 persons registered for the ESL training held in January/February – taught by National Trainers for NAMB, Brenda Myers and Edie Barry. She noted the work of Francisco Ruiz and Pastor Jaime Betancourt at the Oak Grove church property. There are more children and moms responding to this ministry than anticipated. HCBA and HaCoBa Care donated two computers to be used at the Oak Grove location.

Becky thanked HCBA for opportunities as she completed 23 years of service during February.

David Myers, Director of Missions, announced that all 22 children who participated in the Bible Drill for HCBA were state winners. David Myers noted that he, along with Randy Davis, Executive Director of the Tennessee Baptist Convention and Steve Holt, also from the TBC, are meeting with Tennessee Temple University concerning property they might provide for HaCoBACare relocation.

May 2011

David Myers will celebrate his 27th year as Director of Missions on June 1. Gerald Lawson, Director of HaCoBA Care Center, reported the roof has been repaired—no leaks thanks to the pastor and five

other men from Apison Church. The defibulator is up and running at the center thanks to TN Baptist Hospital Grant fund.

Steve Roper, Specialist with TBC Collegiate Ministries, announced that his ministry is trying to focus on more one on one with students who are dealing with spiritual pursuits. During summer break four students served on summer missions through the TBC. Three additional students served on staff at camps. Two served in youth ministry at their local churches.

Richard Blalock, Treasurer, presented the financial reports. Richard thanked everyone for their prayers during his illness. He asked that we pray for our churches and our giving to HCBA in addition to responding to the needs of our community during these times of disaster.

David Myers, Director of Missions, announced a disaster collection center at Concord (no clothing needed). He also noted that the TBC gave Apison Church \$5000 and HCBA \$5000 for relief expenses. Morris Hill Church is coordinating the chain saw volunteers, and Apison remains open daily to give out water, food, clothing and other resources. David stated that two contracts have been submitted on the 2 lots of property adjoining our building, one for \$150,000 with \$10,000 earnest money received. Ann Hale is the realtor and is not taking commission.

September 2011

A motion was made by Gerald Lawson to accept New Sholar Church into full membership at the October 25th annual meeting of HCBA, Ron Burton, Signal Mountain Church, seconded the motion and it passed.

Ron Mitchell, East Ridge Church, moved on behalf of the relocation team that the Executive Board present a motion to the Annual Meeting in October to authorize the Relocation Team to pursue and negotiate the sale of the building on North Market Street and oversee the relocation of the office to another location. The motion passed.

Ray Williams, One Accord Church, made a motion that this Executive Board follow up with a motion of the same content for adoption at the annual meeting. Ron Burton seconded this motion. It was adopted.

Richard Blalock, Treasurer, also presented a preview of the HCBA General Operations Fund budget for information only. This budget will be adopted at the annual meeting in October.

Director of Missions

David Al Myers

It has been so encouraging to see our churches respond so wonderfully to the victims of the tornados of April that came through our community and neighboring area. A special thanks is due Pastor Bob Dasal and the Apison Baptist Church who served as a collection and distribution center for groceries, household good and other supplies that were being provided for the victims of the tornadoes. Volunteers from Apison Baptist Church worked tirelessly for months keeping the center open and assisting persons seeking help. Beyond that, the local Disaster Relief trailers were called into operation including shower trailers, cooking trailer, laundry trailer, chainsaw trailer -- each staffed by volunteers from the respective church providing the trailer. The Brainerd cooking unit provided hot meals for delivery by Red Cross to workers



as well as residents in the local tornado areas. Ridgedale activated their washer/drying and shower trailers. Dallas Bay's chain saw trailer was busy all over the area in cleanup. New Salem's trailer was used locally and in nearby areas. Many volunteers from our churches manned the trailers in these locations and many others worked in the field with the clean up efforts. A large thanks goes to Bill Mason of Morris Hill who coordinated the Baptist volunteer groups that came into our area to assist. Concord served as a collection point for our association. Thousands of acts of kindness neighbor to neighbor went unheralded by publicity or news, yet made a significant impact in the lives of hurting people during and since those early recovery days. They continue to this day. While I have not nor can I name all the individuals and/or churches that offered leadership and labor in response to this area crisis, I can say that Baptists served on the front lines without hesitation in this response effort. Baptists did well in showing God's love in action!

A summary review of the work of the Relocation Team throughout this year may be found on pages 21-22 in this booklet. The Annual Meeting voted in last year's meeting to sell the two lots adjacent to the Baptist Building on Market Street. That has now taken place and the selling price was \$150,000 dollars, which is actually more than the appraised value. The Finance Committee has not locked in any specific percentages or dollar amounts for particular causes, but does plan to hold some in reserve to give a strong base for the General Operating Budget which has experienced a decline in contributions across the last several years.

The messengers from our churches at this Annual Meeting will be asked to act on a recommendation from the Executive Board that the Relocation Team be given authority to pursue the sale of the Baptist Building on Market Street and the relocation of the associational offices. The Relocation Team had presented a recommendation to the Executive Board in September to pursue this sale and the Board adopted it. The Relocation Team's and the Executive Board's recommendations are found on page 22.

Director Missions

You see from the Financial Reports in this book that the contributions from the churches have declined this past year. This has been the pattern across the last several years which has called for significant action to be taken. **We have reduced our budget across the last 5 years to attempt to keep it from reflecting inflated numbers. The full time staff have reduced their salaries. The number of hours worked by the part time ministry assistants has been reduced.** While many of our churches have remained faithful in their giving and some increasing their support of local associational mission, a number of our churches have changed the percentage of their mission dollars to the association. Remember, we receive no cooperative program money for our general operating budget. We have remained vigilant to keep expenditures within the receipts from our churches, which is our only source of support. I am concerned that the contributions continue to decline -- and yet the staff continues to faithfully carry on the program, plan future ministries and respond to the churches with reduced resources. **I would urge you to consider your church's contributions compared to a year, two years, or more ago.** Many will reveal drastic reductions that the association has no way to make up. It has called for reduction of staff, reduction of materials offered to churches and reduction of resources available to the churches. We have made these changes in response to this trend.

Let me go quickly to a word of praise and appreciation for our staff in the Baptist Building. They continue to work diligently. Linda Mauritzen, Administration Assistant, began work in January of 1999. She works two days a week. Glenna Smith, Receptionist and Prayer Coordinator, began in February of 2003. She works part of two days a week. David Martin, Web Design Specialist, began in the summer of 2003. Becky Witt, Administrator of Finance and Language Ministries, is in her twenty-fourth year, having begun in February of 1988. Those who are involved in our ministry through teams, committees, or other leadership roles, know that we are privileged to have such a dedicated staff of office personnel. They try their best to respond to the requests that come into our office as individuals and churches call on our office for assistance. I count it a privilege to work with persons so dedicated to this association and our mission effort.

Approximately fifty of our church have no full time staff or pastor. Most of these pastors are bi-vocational. They call on our office for assistance in the form of information, forms, materials, counsel and a myriad of other needs that they do not have in their local church. The association serves as a ready resource for these churches. But even the largest of churches call the association with questions, seeking information and assistance in various forms. We gladly respond to every church that calls. Is it important that we maintain a healthy local association to encourage our churches working together? Is it important that there be a local association where lay leaders, part time staff, bi-vocational ministers and church committees can call when seeking information or guidance? Is it important that there be a local association to promote conversation and communication among the churches? Is it important for a local association to coordinate some joint ministries that would be prohibitive by individual churches alone?

As you consider the future of Baptist work in Hamilton County, serious, creative, invested thought must be given to how "my church" is participating to keep local Baptist work vibrant. This book reflects some of what we Baptists do together in this place. Ministries to students, ministries to a growing ethnic population, feeding the hungry as Jesus taught us, responding to natural disasters, repairing dozens of homes in our community, training church leaders, encouraging Bible Drills and many other expressions of being on mission are possible only as we have a strong local base of operation and cooperation. The shape may change, different methods will evolve, but the purpose remains the same. We must give a renewed, concerted effort to doing it together -- and better!

HCBA plans monthly luncheons for those working in business management of churches. Luncheons are held on the fourth Wednesday of each month at noon at the Brainerd Baptist BX CrossRoads Cafe. This is open to business administrators of any church in the area. Also Abba's House Administrator, Denise Craig, hosts luncheons often for \$10 at their church with speakers of interest to church administrators. If you are interested please contact Denise or let me know.

Becky asked participants to call if the staff can set up the association's exhibit in a church entry or fellowship area. Many churches have mission emphases during the year. Becky stated that she and David Myers would love to come and answer questions or be at the booth for any size group, just call us 267-3794.

Becky reported that the associational office hosted a full day of **computer bookkeeping year-end training** on December 14 and the **annual tax seminar** led by Deborah Taylor of the TBC with over 45 attending on December 7th. February 23rd we hosted a conference on "**Financial Issues Facing the Church,**" led by Richard Skidmore of the TBC. Fifty-two persons attended.

The HCBA computers have been updated by the expertise of faithful members of churches volunteering after hours. The server and office computers are all changing to a link station for file sharing. We had many frustrations with our slow and outdated computers and systems. The computer labs at HaCoBA and the Baptist Collegiate Ministry on Vine Street were donated for distribution to church offices. The following churches received computers: New Union, Brainerd Library, Alpine, the start-up Spanish mission group at Oak Grove, New Salem, East Ridge, Northside, Lookout Valley, Riverside, and Highland Park. David Martin and Ed Markert prepared these donated computers for gifting. We always accept items for donation to other churches. During June a local law firm donated 5 Dell computers and we have given away all donated to churches. David Martin picked up, prepared and delivered these donated computers for gifting. We had a dozen HP large LaserJet printers to donate to churches and those were well received.

The association staff has monitored closely all expenditures. At the same time, the association is trying to meet the needs and requests of churches more efficiently than ever.

Because of limited staff, if meetings or appointments are away from the office building it could be that no one will be at the building. Please contact us to make sure we are planning to be at the office prior to making the trip!

The HaCoBA roof has leaked this year and volunteers from Apison Church repaired it on a Saturday. We are grateful for the support of classes, groups, and churches provide by volunteering and donating items or funds to HCBA and HaCoBA Care. English as a Second Language had expenses totaling \$9,888.48 dollars this year coming from your designated gifts. HaCoBA CARE and the ESL classes are not covered in the General Operations Budget.

On April 11 Ann Hale Hall put up the FOR SALE sign on the lots HCBA owned adjoining the offices. The listing price was \$150,000. Ann handled this for HCBA without her usual commission.

The offer of \$150,000 was given by Dr. Jacob Becker and closed on July 6. The finance committee has decided not to make a division of funds until other decisions are made on moving HaCoBACare and

the sale of HCBA office spaces. They placed the total of \$148,854.23 in the designated line item of “causes forwarded.”

Churches have continued to ask questions about screening staff and volunteer workers. It is always the best policy to screen everyone who works with children and youth. The association can assist in this if you do not have ways in place to conduct such screening. We have resumes in our office from persons hoping to work in churches in HCBA. The resumes are for all staff positions within churches. We do not place a person’s resume in our files without their signed approval to have criminal and credit background checks performed if requested by any church.

During March I was certified, along with Jane Hutchings, to be a facilitator / leader of workshops for “Better Choices, Better Health”, the management of chronic disease. Many of our church staff members and church members have chronic illnesses themselves and have family members they must care for who have chronic illness. All of these affect our work and sense of wellbeing. This is a program of Stanford University has a proven track record of helping people. It is being offered We look forward to having a church host this class. HCBA would like to offer these classes at our building or at your church. Different sites around Southeast Tennessee are now offering this six-week series of classes.

During the summer we continued to pray for Richard Blalock, Treasurer, as he began a different type of chemotherapy. He has been most kind in sharing his thoughts with HCBA and discussing his faith with everyone he comes in contact with when going for treatment. His testimony is on our website.

A 2011 used Ford F 150 van was purchased with a designated gift to HaCoBA Care Center that totally covered the price. The truck was picked up over the July 4th holiday weekend.

All church office staff workers are invited to quarterly luncheons. HCBA provided meals on July 11 for a planning meeting for the officers of the Hamilton County Baptist Ministry Assistants Association (HCBMAA). Please consider volunteering to work in your church office so your church secretary might attend four times yearly. The group supports HaCoBA Care Center and collected school supplies in addition to normal donations during the August meeting. This is another way HCBA tries to enhance the work of local churches by having peer support and education.

LANGUAGE CHURCHES

The Korean First Baptist Church pastor came to introduce himself on May 3. The church meets inside the chapel of Concord Church. Pastor Kim's first Sunday with the congregation was May 1, 2011.

Red Bank Hispanic Church

Jaime Betancourt, pastor, has encouraged and trained his congregation to begin an outreach/mission start-up in the Oak Grove community. Oak Grove Church was excited about being part of this outreach by allowing Pastor Betancourt and volunteer workers to use their facilities. The HCBA Local Mission Fund provided resort type vendors for the Fall Festival celebrated on the Oak Grove grounds on October 30, 2010. About sixty families registered attendance for that fellowship time together. Regular meetings began November 7, 2010, on Sunday afternoons at Oak Grove. Pastor Jaime Betancourt and mission leader Francisco Ruiz have seen good results. They are visiting the homes and find lots of moms and children in the neighborhood.

During the summer the attendance grew to **35 children** and **12 volunteer workers** coming from the Red Bank Spanish Mission – Primera Iglesia Bautista Hispania. The church enjoys reaching out in the inner city but will be praying about avenues for discipleship of the families. They have a group of five youth who are in a discipleship program from that neighborhood. Joe Sanchez leads that group with Pastor Jaime.

Jaime and 3 others from his Red Bank congregation went to Honduras again this year (June 12-19). They gave out 700 salvation bracelets and 700 salvation tattoos for the combined ministries at Red Bank, Oak Grove and on the mission trip.

ENGLISH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE (ESL)

A Thanksgiving Meal for International Students and their families was held at First Church, Chattanooga on November 14. David and Carol Martin did an excellent job with the program.

The past year **over 400 people enrolled in ESL classes**. Free books and classes are provided to those who attend one of the association's ESL centers. The volunteer teacher training and resource books are also free to those who are a part of the association's ESL ministry. Volunteers have teaching opportunities to serve five days a week. Volunteers may choose the most convenient time of day and day of the week.

Additional volunteers are needed. Join us for training twice yearly. **Call me for info!**

ESL Teacher Certification Training was scheduled in January and August 2011. Certification is granted by the North American Mission Board. Seventy-eight persons responded and registered this year for training. The materials are free for those who volunteer at one of the 7 host sites. These sites currently offer classes 10 times per week.

This year we have collaborated with the Partnership for Families, Children and Adults to reorganize classes that meet in the Partnership portable classroom at East Lake Parks and Recreation. An outcome of this collaboration was that a City Parks and Recreation staff member became interested in teaching ESL. She completed certification training and is now leading a daytime class.

TUTORING CHILDREN & YOUTH

The Oakwood Baptist Church has continued to tutor children one-on-one for years. They just requested eight additional trainer manuals for volunteers. Remember that persons from your church and family can learn to help a child. This is for individuals, parents, grandparents, friends, or anyone. It is free. Loretta Swingle led the North American Mission Board Certification class on Tutoring Children and Youth on Saturday August 13. Seven persons registered for this specialized workshop on helping children with reading and math.

Volunteer training for TUTORING CHILDREN with their school work will be offered again on Saturdays, from 9-3 pm, in January and August 2012.

On August 18, I was asked to share our Salvation/Friendship bracelets with the 22 women involved in THE NEXT DOOR, an organization for helping those just out of prison to start a fresh life in new surroundings. This is community service for THE NEXT DOOR clients. I was able to tell the story of the colors and what salvation is to those who believe. This is a win-win situation for HCBA. We still give out thousands of bracelets yearly and need additional volunteers to put them together.

All of the HCBA disaster relief units were called upon in response to the April 27th tornado outbreak in the Chattanooga area. This included the Oak St. laundry trailer to New Hope Baptist Church, Spring City, the New Salem Baptist shower trailer to Morris Hill Baptist, the Brainerd feeding unit for the Red Cross, and the Ridgedale Baptist shower and laundry trailers to Apison Baptist. Numerous volunteers from Morris Hill Baptist assisted with chainsaw and supply distribution and the Dallas Bay chain saw unit assisted in numerous areas. Other volunteers from several churches in Hamilton County assisted these units. Chainsaw teams from the Chilhowee Baptist Association and Greenwood Baptist Church, Ooltewah also assisted in the Chattanooga area. Volunteers from Hamilton County also assisted with long-term recovery efforts for Southeast Tennessee.

A disaster relief training session was hosted by Bayside Baptist Church in May with about 100 attendees from several associations. A full slate of courses were offered including a Chaplaincy class. The Hamilton County disaster relief feeding unit out of Brainerd Baptist has helped locally again with World Changers and a Thanksgiving event.

The Men's Ministry Director served as Treasurer of the Southeast Tennessee Volunteers Organizations Active in Disasters (VOAD), participated on the HCBA Missions and Ministry Team, and attended the Equipping Missions Leaders training at First Baptist Chattanooga that included classes on the basics of Royal Ambassadors and Baptist Men.

We also have ongoing collections of yarn for the women in the state prison, eye glasses for missions trips, coke can tabs, etc. Every church also has their own missions action activities they do throughout the year.

We had four ladies return to West Virginia to the Greenbrier Federal Birthing Center, along with seven people from Pleasant Point Baptist Church in Paris, TN. They took a trailer load of clothes, baby items and goodies for the new mothers. They also visited the men's prison. They conducted Bible study and delivered several winter coats.

Many ladies from our churches attended the annual state-wide Missions Get-Together in Gatlinburg where workshops and trainings were offered on leadership and day to day issues confronting Christians today.

Our Annual Meeting was held in May with speaker Wendy Brown from Cleveland, TN, who works with Women at Risk International being our special guest. She opened our eyes to the human exploitation that is going on around us in our own community. This was a spirit led meeting with Ray Williams ending our meeting with some very inspirational words and prayer not only for those who are being exploited, but for us to be able to reach these people for the Lord.

As an associational-wide trip, several ladies traveled to the national WMU office in Birmingham, AL. We were able to see actual Lottie Moon and Annie Armstrong artifacts as well as many other artifacts donated by other missionaries. The trip opened our eyes to the wonderful history of WMU and those that pioneered this great organization.

In August, Hamilton County Baptist Association WMU was honored to host the state-wide Equipping Missions Leaders Training at First Baptist Church, Golden Gateway. Team work made this training one of the best we have ever attended. Working together as an association to promote missions has proven to be very productive and very exciting! We are looking forward to seeing what the Lord has in store for us this next year.

Church Media Library

The Hamilton Place LifeWay Store hosted our Spring Meeting on April 9th. Eleven librarians from 8 different churches in Hamilton and Bradley Counties were there for a time of book reviews and new media presentations presented by the store's staff. We appreciate the LifeWay staff for providing this service to us.

The Tennessee Fall Library Training Clinic was held at Westwood Baptist in Cleveland on September 10th this year. As usual, this was an all day training time for church and school librarians. There were 40 attending from 16 different area churches.

We received annual reports from 13 churches this year. They reported over 79,100 items in their libraries with a total circulation of over 16,400 for this year. Church Library ministries this year have included sponsoring Reading Clubs for children and adults, ministering to church members and members of their communities by providing Christian media and sometimes just by being a listening ear or sounding board for people.

Some items of interest:

***Bayside** had a Reading Club for adults this past winter and a Summer Children's Reading Club.

***East Ridge** reported having 3 Round Table Book Discussions and ministering to a shut in.

***Silverdale's** library has been closed since May because of church renovations. Hope to open again by early 2012.

HaCoBACare Ministries

As we have come to the close of my third year as director it seems like it was just yesterday when all of this started, some days however it feels as though it has been twenty years. The thing that keeps me focused is all the volunteers that have given their time and talents to make this ministry successful. To all the Churches that have stood with HaCoBa the past year, thank you very much. To the staff of Hamilton County Baptist Association, thank you for all your help and support.

Statistics for Church Year 2010/2011, people receiving food was 9233. Out of that number there were 3653 children ages 1-18. God blessed us with 77 professions of faith and 24 rededications.

The Baptist Nursing Fellowship (BNF) has registered nurses that conduct the HaCoBaCARE Health Ministry under the leadership of Mrs. Mary Louise Gunnels. This year 700 blood pressures, 306 pairs of glasses, 5 referrals, and 2 referred to Volunteers in Medicine, and 1 emergency room referral.

The following is written through deep appreciation for the support that is given to HaCoBaCARE. The Sara Lee Thrift Store is a regular supplier of loaf bread. Pruett's Food Market on Signal Mountain has also become a supplier of miscellaneous canned goods and other food items. The BiLo Food Store gives pastries and breads daily. The Women's Missionary Union sponsors an annual event to promote collection of canned goods and money. Groups in a number of churches have sponsored events to collect food items. Sunday School classes and other groups send regular monetary gifts. Individuals give both monetary and material support. Some monetary gifts come through a church budget. Food collected by the U.S. Postal Service, South Station, an annual food drive, benefits HaCoBaCARE. The Administrative Assistants group gives money and other support.

This year we were given a New Van by one of our Volunteer families, another Volunteer made the signs for the new van and also gave us the mat that goes in the cargo space, and yet another volunteer arranged the donation of a bulkhead to go in the van, yes we have been blessed.

HaCoBACare was organized to exist by free will support for all expenses, including operational overhead, and not to rely on finances of the Hamilton County Baptist Association except in case of emergencies. Staffing is 100% by volunteers who personally often give monetary and/or material support.

Summary of Relocation Process

In April 2009 the Administrative Team discussed the formation of a task force to study the possible relocation of the association office and HaCoBACare. This had first surfaced in a vision group meeting in July 2008. An appraisal of the property was completed in July 2009 by request of the Administrative Team. In August 2009 the Administrative Team authorized the formation of a team to lead the relocation study. The Relocation Team began work in February 2010. At the first meeting of the team on February 25, discussion included: selling the vacant lots on Market Street owned by the association, selling the associational office building on Market Street, relocation of the associational office, relocation of the HaCoBACare Ministry Center and the value of property owned by the association.

Eleventh Street Property for HaCoBACare

Following an initial visit to the property by Becky Witt and David Myers in February 2010, a few others joined in looking at property on Eleventh Street, formerly known as Onion Bottom, in the Farmer's Market area, with Jack Edwards, General Services Administration of Chattanooga, to assess its possible use by HaCoBACare Ministry Center. Later discussion was held with the Mayor of Chattanooga and Richard Beeland and members of the Relocation Team. Michael McMahan, city attorney, was asked to give an opinion regarding our use of the property as a religious agency. All appeared to be moving along favorably, but with the agreement of the Relocation Team, a letter to the city withdrawing our request for the use of the Onion Bottom property was written. The city made the property available to the Health Department which had made an earlier request and whose potential plan for building on that location was now materializing.

Tennessee Temple Building for HaCoBACare

Highland Park Baptist Church offered the use of space in their church office building, but the space was inadequate for the demands of HaCoBACare.

David Myers entered discussion with Eric Lovett of Highland Park Baptist Church who was giving leadership to urban renewal in that area. Working with a religious group from California, Eric is open to our association's possibly using a Tennessee Temple building for HaCoBACare. We will continue to be a part of that discussion related to relocating HaCoBACare.

After looking at the old high school building on the TTU campus, David Myers, Steve Holt of TBC and Randy Davis of TBC (by phone) met with President Danny Lovett to talk about using the TTU building for HaCoBACare. No decisions were reached, but we were promised to be continually included in future discussion regarding their campus property's redevelopment. Two local building contractors also looked at the building to evaluate its quality and to suggest the renovation needed and possible cost. The building has been empty and in need of repair for some years.

Tennessee Baptist Children's Home Housing the Association Office

In February, 2010, David Myers asked Bryant Millsaps of the Tennessee Baptist Children's Home about the possibility of available space on their Lee Highway campus for relocating the association office. Several from the Relocation Team met with Carl Willis and Bryant Millsaps on March 18 on the Lee Highway campus to further discuss the possibilities. Following that meeting Dwyte Winningham sent the association a "draft lease for discussion" of the Ward Counseling wing for the association's use. No further discussion with the Children's Home has taken place beyond communicating our continued interest in moving to their campus when the Market Street office is sold.

Sale of Two Wooded Lots on Market Street

The Administrative Team concurred with the Relocation Team to sell the two vacant lots on Market Street. The Administrative Team recommended to the Annual Meeting 2010 that they be given authority along with the Relocation Team to negotiate the sale of that property.

Summary of Relocation Process, con't

On July 6, the contract for the sale of the two lots was signed. Ann Hale Hall, realtor and member of the Relocation Team, has assisted in this transaction at no cost to the association. The property sold for \$150,000, which is more than it was appraised for two years ago.

Sale of the Market Street Office Building

The Administrative Team in July 2011 has asked the Relocation Team to now address the sale of the office building along with the continued pursuit of relocating the HaCoBACare Ministry Center. It is hoped a recommendation will be made to the Executive Board and then to the Annual Meeting regarding steps to be taken from that point forward in regard to these two matters.

Communication and Information

A concerted, deliberate, effort has been made throughout this process to keep each involved team or/and committee or/and board informed each step along the way as progress has developed or failed.

In the September Executive Board Meeting the Board adopted the following recommendation from the Relocation Team:

We recommend that the Hamilton County Baptist Association sell the office building at 508 North Market Street and that the Relocation Team be authorized to pursue and negotiate that sale of the building and oversee the relocation of the office to another location.

CONSTITUTION

Article I, Name

This Association shall be known as the Hamilton County Baptist Association.

Article II, Purpose

It shall be the purpose of this Association
 ...to promote fellowship among the churches,
 ...to conduct a definite work of local missions in cooperation with the churches of the association,
 ...to encourage the churches to support the cooperative work of evangelism, missions, Christian education and benevolence,
 ...to assist churches in developing and maintaining effective programs and organizations that will enhance the spiritual growth and skills of the church members, and
 ...to edify each church in fulfilling its missions and ministries.

Article III, Membership

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of messengers who are members of the Baptist churches cooperating with the Association in carrying out the purpose as set forth in Article II.

Section 2. Each church cooperating with the Association shall be entitled to two messengers for its first sixty members, or fraction thereof, and one additional messenger for each additional hundred members or fraction thereof, provided, however, that no church shall be entitled to more than 15 messengers.

Section 3. Each church shall select its messengers according to its own method and shall certify them to the Association on its annual letter to the Association.

Section 4. Churches desiring to affiliate with the Association shall make written petition stating their desire and pledging their cooperation with this Association. Said petition

shall be referred to the Administrative Leadership Team. Such petitionary letters shall be acknowledged at the next Annual Meeting of the Association and voted on at the following Annual Meeting of the Association upon evidence of cooperation in the associational and denominational work during the intervening year, and the recommendation of the Administrative Leadership Team. If the petition is approved by a majority vote of the messengers present, the messengers of such church shall be received and the moderator, on behalf of the Association, shall extend the right hand of fellowship.

Churches which have withdrawn from the Association but wish to rejoin the Association shall present their request to the Administrative Leadership Team for study. Upon the team's recommendation the church shall be received into the Association by a majority vote of the messengers present at the next Annual Meeting of the Association and the Moderator shall extend the right hand of fellowship to the church's representatives.

A newly constituted church which was a mission of an affiliated church or a newly constituted church formed by a group of members from an affiliated church may be considered for membership in the same manner as a church which had previously been a member and withdrew from the association.

Section 5. If a church does not send an annual report or show any interest by giving or participating in the Association over a period of three or more years, the Administrative Leadership Team shall seek to encourage participation. If the situation continues, the matter may be brought to the attention of the Association by the Administrative Leadership Team. The Association respects the autonomy of each local church and encourages the strengthening of church relationships.

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Section 6. As an associated body, we disclaim any power to ecclesiastical jurisdiction over the churches, yet we deem it our privilege to judge for ourselves of the propriety of continuing any church in our fellowship. Any complaint by a sister church of the Association against any other church cooperating with this body shall be brought in writing to the Executive Board of the Association, and shall be referred to the Administrative Leadership Team which will make careful study of the situation and seek reconciliation or satisfaction of the bodies concerned. When the desired reconciliation or satisfaction cannot be attained, the Executive Board shall bring its report and recommendation to the next Annual Meeting of the Association. Withdrawal of fellowship from any church shall require a majority vote of the messengers present.

Article IV, Meetings

Section 1. The meetings of this body shall be held at such times and places as the Association shall deem wise by a majority vote of the body. The Executive Board shall have authority to make changes in time and place of meeting if necessity arises for such changes.

Section 2. In cases of emergency, the Moderator, upon a majority vote of the Executive Board, shall call special meetings of the Association.

Article V, Officers

Section 1. Officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer and any others which the Association shall see fit to elect from time to time.

Section 2. The officers shall be elected annually at the Annual Meeting by majority vote of messengers present and shall hold office until successors are elected.

The Administrative Leadership Team shall present one nominee for each office of the association: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, and Assistant Treasurer. The floor shall be open for additional nominations and elected by secret ballot if two or more are nominated for the same office. Nominees shall be contacted in advance confirming their willingness to serve.

Section 3. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall not serve more than two years successively. In case of resignation, death, moving away or disability of the Moderator, the Vice-Moderator shall automatically become Moderator, and the Executive Board shall select another Vice-Moderator. In case of necessity, the Executive Board shall fill any other unexpired term. No association staff person shall serve as Moderator or Vice-Moderator of the Association, nor serve as chairman of a standing committee. The Moderator or Vice-Moderator shall not serve as chairman of a standing committee.

Section 4. (1) It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside at the Annual Meetings and all Executive Board Meetings. He shall serve on the Administrative Leadership Team. He shall support and promote the ministries of the association. He shall also be called the President of the Corporation.

(2) It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to assist the moderator and if necessary, assume the responsibilities of Moderator. He shall serve on the Administrative Leadership Team.

(3) It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to give the treasurer's report in the Executive Board Meeting. He shall review the budget and financial practices on a regular basis in consultation with the Administrator of Finance.

(4) It shall be the duty of the Assistant

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Treasurer to act in the same capacity as the Treasurer as needed.

(5) It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep accurate records of the proceedings of the meetings of the Association, the Executive Board and the Administrative Leadership Team. The Clerk shall prepare these minutes for printing. The Clerk shall also be called the Treasurer of the Corporation.

(6) It shall be the duty of the Assistant Clerk to fulfill the responsibilities of the Clerk when needed.

(7) The Moderator and the Director of Missions shall serve as ex-officio members of all committees and teams of the Association.

Article VI, Trustees

Section 1. The Association shall elect three trustees, each to serve three years, with their terms so rotated that the term of one will expire each year.

Section 2. Any vacancy occurring between Annual Meetings shall be filled by the Executive Board upon recommendation by the Administrative Leadership Team.

Section 3. The Trustees shall be the legal representatives of the Association and shall act for the Association upon direction of the Association or its Executive Board in the care of all legal matters, protecting the interests of the Association where any process of law is required. The Trustees shall be called Directors of the Corporation.

Article VII, Executive Board

Section 1. The Association shall have an Executive Board whose duty shall be to care for every interest of the Association and direct its activities from the adjournment of any session to the convening of the next. The

Executive Board shall be authorized to act ad interim for the Association between the Annual Meetings of the Association.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall be composed of the following: (1) the Officers and Trustees of the Association, (2) the active pastors of the churches in the Association who hold membership in a church of the Association, (3) one other member of each church, elected by the church (4) and the program leaders of the Association, the chairperson of all standing committees, (5) the team leaders of all teams, (6) and one additional member to the Executive Board for each 1,000 members not to exceed five members from any one church—even if these other members serve as chairmen of committees or as officers of the Association.

Section 3. The officers of the Executive Board shall be Moderator, the Vice-Moderator and Clerk of the Association.

Section 4. Regular meetings of the Executive Board shall be held at such time and place as the Board shall determine. The Moderator of the Executive Board may call special meetings with sufficient advance notice to the membership of the Board, stating the time, place and purpose of the meeting.

Article VIII, Director of Missions

Section 1. A Director of Missions shall be chosen and called by the Association whenever a vacancy occurs. His election shall take place at a regular meeting or a meeting called for that purpose. At least two weeks' notice shall be given to our churches.

A Director of Missions Search Committee of no fewer than seven members shall be recommended to the Executive Board by the Administrative Leadership Team of the Association. Every reasonable effort shall be made

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to keep a proper balance of lay persons on the Committee. The Director of Missions Search Committee shall consult with the Finance Committee concerning salary and the Personnel Committee concerning job description and recommendation of the new director. Both of these matters shall be brought to the Executive Board before a nomination is made. An affirmative vote of three-fourths of those present shall be necessary to determine the matter of salary and job description.

The Director of Missions Search Committee shall bring to the consideration of the Association only one name at a time. The recommendation of the Committee will constitute a nomination. Election shall be by secret ballot with an affirmative by seventy-five percent of those present being necessary for a choice. The Director of Missions, thus elected, shall serve until the relationship is terminated by his request or the Association's request. The Director of Missions shall give a thirty day notice at the time of resignation before terminating his responsibility as Director of Missions. He shall be called the Vice President of the Corporation.

Article IX. Standing Committees

Section 1.

(1) Finance. The committee shall give general supervision to the entire associational finance program, shall prepare and recommend an annual budget to the Executive Board and the Association. They shall encourage regular systematic giving to associational missions through the associational budget.

(2) Personnel. Except as provided in Article VIII, Director of Missions, Section 1, it shall be the duty of this committee to recommend staff personnel to fill any vacancies occurring during the year and to work with the staff on such problems as may arise in the

course of the work. The committee shall study job descriptions and salaries and make specific recommendations to the Finance Committee.

Section 2. Vacancies on standing committees between Annual Meetings of the Association shall be filled by the Executive Board on recommendations from the Administrative Leadership Team.

Section 3. The Committees shall meet when needed as determined by chairperson and/or associational staff. The reports of the committees shall be given in writing to the Executive Board and the Annual Meeting of the Association.

Article X, Teams

Team members will be recruited or accepted to work on specific tasks and move toward performance groups. Teams may have defined membership who may serve indefinite terms based on task completion. The team leader will be chosen by the Administrative Leadership Team (ALT). Core members will be chosen by the Administrative Leadership team for a specific team. The number of core members per team may vary as determined by the Administrative Leadership Team (ALT). Other team members will be recruited, accepted or otherwise added to the team by agreement of the team itself. The team leader and core members will be elected by the Annual Meeting.

Team members, by definition, are persons who have expertise, gifts, skills and preferences to complete a certain task or mission.

The functions, membership, responsibilities and meeting times of each team are outlined in the Committee and Leadership Structure adopted by the association.

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Section 1.

(1) Administrative Leadership Team.

The Administrative Leadership Team (ALT) is empowered to act on behalf of the Executive Board between board meetings. Made up of team leadership, committee leadership, core members and staff, the ALT will serve as a coordinating team for the total mission of the association

(2) The Mission and Ministry Team.

This team develops and implements the mission and ministry plans of the association. This team serves in an advisory role with staff coordinating associational missions and ministries.

Section 2.

Teams may be created or dissolved by the Administrative Leadership Team as needed to accomplish the mission of the association.

Article XI, Programs

Section 1. The following programs shall promote the organized work of our churches: Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union, Church Music, Church Media Library, Missions Development, Evangelism, Stewardship, Pastoral Ministries, Family Ministries, and Baptist Student Ministries.

Section 2. The leaders and program councils of the departments shall be elected annually by the Association upon recommendation of the respective organizations through the Administrative Leadership Team. The heads of these departments shall be approved by the Executive Board upon recommendation by the Administrative Leadership Team in the May meeting. Vacancies occurring during the year shall be filled by the Executive Board upon the recommendation of the Administrative Leadership Team.

Article XII, Amendments

The Constitution may be amended by a majority vote of members present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented in writing at the first session of the Annual Meeting provided further that such amendment has been presented in writing to the Executive Board at least thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association.

When staff titles are changed upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee and approved by a majority vote of those present at the Annual Meeting or Executive Board, such title changes may be made automatically in the constitution.
