Presenter: Michael Fuller is a member of Ladue Chapel and Professor of Anthropology at St Louis Community College. He co-directed archaeological excavations at Tell Tuneinir in Syria from 1986 to 2004. His fieldwork experiences include projects in Egypt, Jordan, Greece, and the United States.

Architecture in St. Louis Fireside Room

If you were to consult a concordance of Scripture on the issue of "building projects," you might be surprised at how much the Bible has to say on this particular issue. Not only does the Bible tell us to build communities in the figurative sense, but it also admonishes us to take good care of the physical structures which are necessary for a healthy and thriving community. "By wisdom a house is built and through understanding it is established; through knowledge its rooms are filled with rare and beautiful treasures." (Proverbs 24:3-4) In our architecture series we will learn more about some of the treasures which can be found in our community of St. Louis.

November 1: Saint Louis Heroes and Their Architects: Four Legendary Figures & the Legacy We Enjoy Today

Presenter: E.J. (Gene) Mackey III is a second generation architect in Saint Louis. Gene established his office in 1968 and has successfully worked with most of the major institutions in our region. The firm designed the Alberici headquarters off of I-170, numerous buildings for Washington University, Saint Louis University, Webster University, The Saint Louis College of Pharmacy and Projects at the Missouri Botanical Garden, Saint Louis Zoo, and the Missouri Historical Society, among others. Gene serves on the board of KETC Channel 9, The Saint Louis Beacon, Tower Grove Park, and the National Council of The Sam Fox School of Design at Washington University.

November 8: St. Louis in 1900 - A Vanished World

This class will include slides of St. Louis in the period of the World's Fair - a very different city from the one we know today. It was in the midst of a great shift in population during which almost every institution moved west. We will look at the great buildings that disappeared in the course of this transformation.

Presenter: Esley Hamilton is Preservation Historian for St. Louis County Department of Parks and Recreation and lecturer at Washington University School of Architec-

ture. He was recently awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Arts and Letters by the University of Missouri, St. Louis.

November 15: The Work of Theodore Link, Architect

Theodore Link, best known for Union Station and Second Presbyterian Church, was one of St. Louis' most prolific and accomplished architects. Gary Tetley has captured images of Link's work throughout the United States and has conducted intensive research into the life of this talented St. Louisan.

Presenters: Jeff Mansell is Executive Director of Landmark Association of St. Louis. Gary Tetley is an architect and photographer, currently researching the life and work of Theodore Link.

November 22: Northside Regeneration

Paul McKee will discuss regeneration of the Northside infrastructure, green space, transportation system, neighborhoods and businesses.

Presenter: Paul McKee is Chairman and CEO of McEagle. McEagle was created in 1990 by Paul McKee, Jr., to develop real estate in a unique method of value creation through high quality sites, buildings and amenities. McKee has a long history of entrepreneurialism, creating construction management company Paric Corporation in 1979 and Environmental Management Corporation (EMC) in 1980.

**Art in the Nineteenth Century:
Poverty, Piety, Spirituality and Malaise**

The art of the nineteenth century is rich and varied reflecting the profound changes that arose from political revolution, scientific discovery, industrial and technological innovation, and the philosophical and cultural movements in the aftermath of the Enlightenment. Through a PowerPoint format, this course will examine images by artists such as Goya, David, Delacroix, Millet, Manet and van Gogh as well as lesser known artists. We will consider how art of this period exposes the tensions of poverty and upheaval as well as the piety of faith found increasingly in secular contexts such as landscapes. We will also consider how secular art relies on the conventions of past religious and classical works for its expressive force.

Presenter: Peggy Carothers, M.A. Washington University Art History, has taught for several years at Maryville University. She continues to teach in community settings.
