This handbook is an outline of policies and procedures but does not encompass every circumstance. Therefore, the school is not limited to what is written in the handbook and reserves the right to develop policies and procedures as needed to provide an enhanced academic environment.

Communication among students, parents, and staff is encouraged. If we are made aware that a concern exists, we can deal with it in a mutually satisfying manner. If we are unaware of a concern, we are powerless to address it. This can affect our teaching and the students' learning. Clear and open communication among parents, students, and teachers is encouraged and promoted.

In an effort to make each student a confident, self-reliant, functioning young adult, each student will be treated with respect and consideration. In turn, students will be expected to deport themselves as students displaying academic achievement, self-discipline, courtesy, and proper appearance.

Students are under the direct supervision of the classroom teachers. Students are expected to conform to all class regulations set forth by teachers and administration, whether on campus or away from campus. In order to create an atmosphere of learning, appropriate behavior will be expected at all times.

Group pictures, and occasionally individual pictures, are used in The Annual Report or for publicity purposes. Should you not want your child's picture, or a group picture that includes your child, to be used by the school or newspaper, please contact the school office and make your wishes known. We will endeavor to insure that your request is honored.

GENERAL INFORMATION

MISSION STATEMENT

Trinity Episcopal School strives to maintain the highest academic standards within a Christian environment. Each child's potential is maximized through the development of the individual spiritually, intellectually, physically, emotionally, and socially.

AIMS AND PHILOSOPHY

Trinity Episcopal School is a non-profit day school operating within the framework of the Protestant Episcopal Church and offering a superior education for the student 3 years old through the eighth grade. A Trinity education promotes spiritual, physical, intellectual, emotional, and social growth and encourages the involvement of families in the life of the school.

The school strives to maintain the highest academic standards of quality in its program and teaching for each level of instruction. Standards are compatible with those of the Episcopal schools associations and the Texas Education Agency.

Trinity serves the child whose ability is average or above and who is able to adapt to classroom routines. Teacher/pupil ratios are low, and each child is provided the opportunity to develop fully his or her own potential.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTIVES

In order to implement our philosophy, the board, administration, and faculty of Trinity Episcopal School are committed to the following objectives:

1. Provide those resources of faculty; clergy, curriculum, and environment that will best enhance each student's opportunity for spiritual, intellectual, physical, and moral development.
2. Inspire and lead, by precept and example, each student to become self-motivated and ready for future opportunities in education and in the exercise of citizenship in a democratic society.
3. View each student as unique so that special qualities may be recognized and developed.
4. Place emphasis on developing those traits of character that lead to high moral standards and an enthusiastic pursuit of excellence.

HISTORY OF TRINITY EPISCOPAL CHURCH

The first Episcopal family, Mr. and Mrs. George Harrison, moved to Victoria, Texas from Dinwiddie County in Virginia in 1849. Their home became a center for Episcopal services. In 1857, they were joined by several families from North Carolina. Historical record from the Episcopal Church in the Confederate States indicates that in 1863, an Episcopal deacon, the Reverend W.R. Richardson, was serving as a missionary in Victoria. On April 4, 1869, an Episcopal Church in Victoria was officially organized, and governing boards were elected. This was one of the founding congregations of the Diocese of West Texas. The first building of the Church was erected on the northeast corner of Liberty and Goodwin Streets. At this time, the name "Trinity Church" was adopted. In 1885, the church was moved from the present courthouse site. The Parish House on Liberty Street served as a USO center during the Second World War and a community center for many other activities. In 1954, Trinity Church moved to its present site with the construction of the Parish Hall and school wing. In 1961, the church and office areas were constructed. Trinity Church has been one of the strongest congregations of the Diocese of West Texas and a source of strength and assistance for the Episcopal congregations in this area.

HISTORY OF TRINITY EPISCOPAL SCHOOL

When Trinity Church moved to its present site at 1501 N.Glass Street in 1954, its rector, the Reverend Paul H. Kratzig, organized and founded the Episcopal Parochial School. He served as its Headmaster until 1973. During those years, the leadership of the school was shared with a faithful Board of Directors and its principal, Mrs. Lucy Kratzig.

The core of the curriculum in those years was built around the Carden System that stressed phonics and reading comprehension. The school quickly gained a reputation in the community as a strong school whose students were given a very solid foundation in basic subject areas.

In 1973, the Reverend Donald Blavier became the Headmaster and served in that capacity for ten years. During that time, kindergarten was expanded and strengthened, and the Endowment Fund was established. Other headmasters were Tom Rowland in 1983, Donald Harmon in 1985, Marshall Abell in 1987, Mrs. Audrey Russell in 1993, and Dr. Richard D. Partney in 1998. Jay Foreman joined Trinity Episcopal School as Headmaster in 2000 and Patty Zapalac as Assistant Headmistress in 2003.

STRUCTURE OF TRINITY EPISCOPAL SCHOOL

A Board of Trustees, many of whom are parents of currently enrolled students, serves as a major governing body of the School. The Board is elected to three-year terms, and members of the Vestry of Trinity Episcopal Church and St. Francis Episcopal Church are individually elected and make up a part of the Board. The Board makes policy decisions and works through committees. The Rector of Trinity Episcopal Church is the only permanent member of the Board, thus helping determine policy for the school and speaking for the Church. The Rector is not involved in the administration of the school. The purpose of the Board of Trustees is to set policies, raise funds sufficient to run the school, and provide a Head of School.

Trinity Episcopal School is accredited by the Southwestern Association of Episcopal Schools. The association is recognized to accredit private schools by the Texas Education Agency through the Texas Private Schools Accreditation Commission. S.A.E.S. accreditation is recognized by the National Association of Independent Schools.

ADMISSIONS

Trinity Episcopal School strives to maintain high standards serving children who qualify and can succeed in classroom routines. Admission is made without regard to race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. For entrance, a child must be three years old for K-3, four years old for K-4, and five years old for K-5 as of September 1.

NEW APPLICANTS

Persons applying to Trinity for the first time should call the school office during the month of January prior to the start of the school year for which application is being made. Application forms are mailed the last working day of January and are due back with the application fee of \$50.00 as soon as possible. Applications are considered with special attention to admission testing which is scheduled on a Saturday in February and on a two-week timetable during the summer months. We require all applicants' admission test scores be at least at the middle of the scores of the class for which he/she is applying. Applicants are encouraged to visit the school as part of the admissions process. Decisions are based on successful testing, evaluation of previous records provided by the parents, individual readiness for the group, and space available. The Headmaster makes final acceptance decisions.

Three- and Four-year-old applicants must be three/four years old and toilet trained before September 1.

Kindergarten applicants being considered are required to be five years old and toilet trained before September 1. A visit in the Kindergarten classroom on one of the admission assessment dates is also required. They are observed as they engage in activities and get acquainted with the environment.

First- through eighth-grade applicants follow an admission process, which considers standardized test scores, each child's past educational record, and personal characteristics of the applicant. The child's past educational record includes a recommendation from his/her current teacher. For Middle School candidates, a recommendation is required from his/her current Math and English teachers. A teacher recommendation form is included in the admissions packet. Applicants for grades 1-8 are given portions of the Iowa Test of Basic Skills.

RETURNING STUDENTS:

Re-enrollment agreements are sent on February 1 to all current students who are invited to return and whose account is current. Agreements and re-enrollment fees are due in the office by March 1 in order to secure a place for the following school year.

AFTER SCHOOL CARE/BEFORE SCHOOL CARE

After School Care is provided until 5:30 p.m. when school is in session. No After School Care is provided when there is a noon dismissal. The After School Care (ASC) Program is under the direction of Trinity Episcopal School. Each child using the ASC program, whether full time or drop-in, must have an enrollment form completed by the parent/guardian and returned to Trinity School. There is an enrollment fee of \$10.00, which must be submitted with the form. This fee is required of regular weekly participants and occasional drop ins. Also included is an emergency card, which we ask parents to complete for emergency information.

Students in K-3 and K-4 using the ASC program will be supervised by the ASC director who will be responsible for seeing to it they have lunch, which may be purchased at school or brought from home. At 2:00, the K-5 students attending ASC will join them. The K-3, K-4, and K-5 students have quiet time from 2:00–3:00 each day and are joined by other ASC students at 3:30 and again at 3:40.

All students are asked to bring a separate snack for After School Care. Juice and milk will be available for .50.

Should you need to contact the ASC Director, please call the School number (573-3220) and press 6 for the ASC extension. This service is only activated at 4:00p.m. each day.

After School Care is not available when school is not in session or on certain days of early dismissal, of which you will be informed in our monthly calendar, newsletter, or weekly “What’s Happening This Week” flyer. **Late pick-up fees are as follows: \$5.00 for the first five minutes and \$1.00 every minute after that.**

Children with homework are separated. Children may bring activities (not toys) from home if they desire, when homework does not apply.

All requests for drop-ins must go through the school office to assure a vacancy during the school year. **Please call or come by the office on the days you need the service.**

BEFORE SCHOOL CARE is available for K-3 through 8th Grade. Teachers are in their classrooms and ready for students at 7:50 a.m. each morning. Children are not to go into their classrooms prior to this time. For all students who arrive before this time, BSC is available in the Parish Hall beginning at 7:15 a.m.

AGREEMENTS: ENROLLMENT AND RE-ENROLLMENT

Please read your Enrollment Contract carefully. We consider the enrollment and re-enrollment agreements legal and binding.

ANNUAL EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

BIRTHDAY BOOKS

A long-standing tradition at Trinity Episcopal School. The librarian keeps a certain number of specially selected and designated books on hand for this purpose. As a child's birthday approaches, he/she chooses the book he would like to give to the library and during his/her birthday week, that book is presented at the chapel service. Parents may also make their own suggestions for birthday books to the librarian or purchase one. (Books not paid for are not presented.)

BOOK FAIR

Held in the Spring and promotes family interest in reading. Parents come to school during the Book Fair to take their children from the classroom to the Book Fair. The Book Fair encourages the addition of new acquisitions to the Trinity Library by donation of books and dedication of materials. All proceeds from Book Fair are used by the Friends to benefit students.

EASTER EGGS

Homemade by volunteers and sold as a project of the Friends just before the Easter holiday. They take three and one-half days to prepare in the Trinity kitchen and are delicious.

FALL FESTIVAL

Our observance of Halloween and is normally held on October 31 at the school and is another project of Friends. Sometimes it precedes the religious celebration of All Saints' Day, November 1.

GARDEN TOUR

Sponsored by the Trinity Board and the Victoria Master Gardeners, is a fundraiser highlighting area gardens. Tickets are bought to tour one or all gardens identifying gifts of creation.

INGATHERING

Sponsored by the Middle School Student Council and is held at Thanksgiving and Christmas. We "gather in" those things that we will share with others. Since Trinity is a church school, teaching children to share with others, to think about the needs of others, and to find ways of helping people less fortunate is

always a major goal. At Thanksgiving, staples and canned goods are collected and delivered to area food banks. For Christmas Ingathering, classes adopt a family to fulfill a variety of needs.

OPEN HOUSE

Held in the Fall, it provides an opportunity for parents to visit their children's classes and hear a presentation by the homeroom and special teachers regarding curriculum, expectations, and special events. This is a parent event and as such no children attend

OUTDOOR EDUCATION

A program that is an integral part of the required curriculum, and students in grades four through eight are required to attend. Failure to attend results in unexcused absences and zeros in all class assignments. Besides the academic objectives met by the students on these trips, there are also many opportunities for students to learn a great deal about themselves and about the groups with which they work. Faculty members direct the study in preparation for each trip and accompany the students on the trips both in teaching and as supervising roles. The trips range from \$50 to \$400.

PARENT VOLUNTEER

Opportunities are provided through participation in this Friends program. Parents pledge one or more hours per week, on a regularly scheduled basis, to act as an aide to the art music, Spanish, computer, or P.E. teacher as well as the librarian, school office, or Chaplain.

SCHOOL PICTURES

Individual and group pictures will be taken during the school year. You will be notified when the school makes the arrangements.

\$10,000 NIGHT

A Board of Trustees fundraising event that takes place each Spring. Besides the many Trinity families who participate, members of the Victoria community come together for an evening of fun. Dress is business casual.

UNIFORM RESALE

A Friends-sponsored uniform resale. Outgrown and like-new uniforms can be purchased at a reasonable price. Information is available in the school office.

WELCOME SOCIAL

Sponsored by Friends and is held on the evening before school begins. It is a time to get acquainted with other families as well as meet the faculty and staff. Parents have an opportunity to sign up for various activities. Important school information is distributed, and the Student Council sells school apparel. The Friends first meeting of the year is part of the evening's activities. This is an important social to attend.

SALLY FOSTER WRAPPING PAPER

During the beginning of school, families receive an order packet, which is returned promptly for processing as a Friends' fundraiser.

YEARBOOK

A yearly publication highlighting the school year's events is available

ANNUAL GIVING PROGRAM/ANNUAL REPORT

The Annual Giving Program begins with the publication of the Annual Report in October. The purpose of the Annual Giving Program is to maintain and extend the overall excellence of the school while at the same time offering reasonable tuition rates. The Annual Giving Program is conducted by the Board of Trustees and allows each family an opportunity to contribute according to their ability. Each family is encouraged to contribute to this program. Members of the faculty, staff, the community and businesses also contribute to Annual Giving.

Trinity Episcopal School is located in Old Victoria on two city blocks. One city block is devoted to the Lower School and the other to the Early Childhood Development Center, a playground and the T.S. Boozalis Science Center. The classroom and other inside facilities of Trinity are a combination of warmth and efficiency. Although some of the facilities date from the school's opening in 1954, improvements are made regularly to maintain a comfortable facility. The building of a new middle school and gym is currently underway.

Many of the classrooms and facilities are shared with Trinity Episcopal Church.

The athletic complex is located on the corner of Guadalupe and Smith Streets. Future plans include a softball field, a football field, and a soccer field including a concession stand and restrooms.

STUDENT PLACEMENT

In Lower school, classes are grouped heterogeneously and individual needs are addressed through grouping within the classroom. This grouping is flexible; children may be moved from one group to another within the class when such a move is warranted. Faculty and staff review each child's performance throughout the school year to assure that their individual learning needs are being addressed.

In Middle School, students can qualify for Accelerated Pace (AP) courses in Math and English based on our evaluation of a variety of criteria, including previous grades, achievement scores, prognosis tests, and teacher recommendation. Meeting individual needs of students is the objective of the homogeneous group in these grade levels. Faculty and staff review each child's performance throughout the school year to assure that their individual learning needs are being addressed.

Tuition is due, in full, on July 1. If using Trinity's tuition plan, tuition payments are automatically due by the first day of each month. Statements are not mailed to parents unless the account is in arrears.

Coupon books are sent to expedite payments and proper credit from Wells Fargo Bank-Trust Department. Since parents are on different payment plans and the Trust Department is separate from the bank, the coupon must accompany each check to assure it goes to the proper account.

Any child whose parents are in arrears in payments after 60 days is subject to dismissal until such time as the accounts owed are paid in full, including the month when the child shall return unless arrangements have been made with the Treasurer of the Board.

Student records, including report cards at their reporting times, are withheld if any account is not current. This includes tuition, library, and After School Care accounts.

ATTENDANCE, ARRIVAL, ABSENCE, AND DISMISSAL

Regular and punctual attendance habits are essential to school success and to success in later life and are a legal requirement. Those habits begin early and are clearly the responsibility of parents. **Parents are encouraged to use the carpool line for drop off in the morning and pick up at dismissal. Keeping hallways clear of excessive traffic aids in safety, while allowing your children to walk in and out of school.**

We request a note from the parent explaining any tardiness or absence or to have their child released for an appointment. Five unexcused tardies will result in one recorded school absence. When a student needs to leave the school, they should present the note to the office before school and receive a pass authorizing him/her to leave class. This procedure keeps the office from interrupting the classroom in order for a child to be released for an appointment.

Students are required to sign in and out of school whenever leaving the campus during school hours. Students should report to the school office and fill out the sign-in/sign-out book. An adult must accompany them. If it is someone other than the parent or guardian, a note or phone call to the school office is necessary. *The adult with whom the child leaves must sign the child out in the school office* stating the destination and the time of departure. This would include the noon hour and any other non-sponsored activities. **Parents are asked to check in to the office and wait for their children as to not interrupt classrooms or hallways.**

All students remaining after school has been dismissed may be picked up from After School Care at a fee.

Students are required to make up all work within a time equal to the number of days missed. Parents may call the office to request assignments for absences of more than one day. **Please call the office before**

10:00 a.m. to request assignments from teachers for the next day. This allows teachers to complete their assignment sheet during their conference periods. Assignments for single-day absences may be made up the next day at school. When the absence can be anticipated, parents must get a **pre-absence request form** from the office, signed by the Headmaster, **one week in advance**, in order for the student to obtain credit for work performed before, during, or after his/her absence. The school calendar lists all holidays and early dismissal days. There is, therefore, ample time to plan vacations that coincide with school holidays. The school hours are as follows:

Kindergarten 3 and 4

8:00 a.m. – 12:00 noon

Grades 1 through 5

8:00 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Kindergarten 5

8:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.

Grades 6 through 8

8:00 a.m. – 3:40 p.m.

BIRTHDAYS

Sharing a birthday with God is a very important part of each child's life. Special prayers are given for the child during Chapel. Summer birthdays are celebrated in May. Children may share birthday cupcakes or cookies with their classmates during their snack period or at another time if arrangements have been made with the teacher.

Children do not exchange gifts on birthdays at school. Party invitations may not be issued at school unless everyone in the class is included. ***This applies to all party invitations and gift giving. Children may not receive delivered gifts at school such as balloons, cookies, or flowers.***

CANCELLATION OF SCHOOL

With severe weather, storm, and/or danger of flooding, Trinity Episcopal School will not hold school whenever VISD announces school closing during the night or early morning. Most local radio and/or TV stations carry these announcements. If VISD announces a delayed opening of school, the Headmaster will inform Trinity parents of the course of action through the use of radio and TV. If bad weather occurs during the day, regardless of what VISD announces, school would be closed early only if there is time to contact parents by 1:00 p.m. at the latest. No student in a regular carpool will be permitted to leave in another vehicle unless arrangements have been made with the parents, and the school office has been notified.

COMMUNICATION FROM HOME TO SCHOOL

Communicate in writing with the homeroom teacher or school office in any of the following circumstances:

1. You will be out of town leaving your child in the care of someone else. Write down the dates of your absence, how we can reach you, information regarding who is in charge of your child, where that person can be contacted, and any deviation we should make from our general procedures in case of emergency.
2. There is some change or stress being experienced in the family that may affect your child. Please write a note for our information in helping your child.
3. There will be or has been an absence. How to handle absences is explained under the section entitled ATTENDANCE, ARRIVAL, ABSENCE, AND DISMISSAL.

COMMUNICATION FROM SCHOOL TO HOME

The major written communications from school to home are the following:

1. Calendar—yearly

2. Newsletter—quarterly
3. Menu—monthly
4. Calendar—monthly
5. Progress Reports—November, February, and May
6. Progress Reports—Grades K-5 – 8, after 4 ½ weeks of a grading period
7. Report Cards—Grades K-5 – 8, every 9 weeks
8. “What’s Happening this Week” Flyer—weekly (Monday or first day of week)

The office sends a “What’s Happening This Week” flyer every Monday or first day of the week on goldenrod paper. If there have been any changes, this flyer should be up to date. The monthly calendar and menu are sent home with the child near the first day of each month. Special notices are kept to a minimum but may be necessary, especially near major school events. Parents need to be alert to anticipate written communication from the school. The scheduled day that the office will send papers home will be Mondays (first day of the week). Unfortunately, items will come up unexpectedly. Classroom teachers and homeroom mothers will also be notifying you of special classroom information in writing (i.e. supplies, field trips).

FIELD TRIPS

Traditional field trips are a part of every grade level at Trinity. Often parents assist with the field trips by driving students or taking responsibility for a group of children. The purpose of every trip is to extend the classroom curriculum. Teachers provide parent volunteers with complete plans and instructions for each trip. Homeroom mothers cooperate with teachers in securing parent volunteers. Dress uniform is required for all students on field trips unless written notice to the contrary is given. Anyone who assists in transporting students must comply with our “Transportation Policy.” Parents cover the transportation cost of field trips. (Chaperone guidelines are located in the Rules and Guidelines section.) To insure proper supervision of students, younger siblings may not accompany chaperones on field trips.

FIRE AND DISASTER DRILLS

The school has a fire drill each month and a disaster drill annually. Instructions are posted in each classroom, in the school office, and in Parish Hall. All people present in the school participate in the drills.

HEALTH AND EMERGENCIES

Health Record – A fully completed Health Record, including immunization record, allergy information, and medication date must be on file in the school office before a child’s registration can be considered complete. Immunization records must come documented from the child’s doctor’s office.

Physician’s Name is required in case of a medical emergency when the parent cannot be reached.

Emergency Number of another person, other than the parent, who could be called locally when the parent cannot be reached, should be listed on the student’s emergency card.

Illness – Parents are asked not to send sick children to school because it might cause other children to get sick; this includes colds, fever, and any contagious illness. **After an illness, a child should be free of fever, vomiting and/or diarrhea for twenty-four (24) hours before returning to school. If a child becomes ill at school and cannot attend classes, parents will be called to pick up their child.**

Medications – For the administration of medications, the following conditions must be met before a school employee will be authorized to administer medication to your child:

1. A signed request to administer the medication to a student has been provided by a parent, legal guardian, or other person having legal control of the student.
2. A written doctor's request to administer medication when medication is to be given or stored at the school for longer than 10 days.
3. All medications are in the **original container**, properly labeled, stating:
 - a. Name of student
 - b. Name of medicine
 - c. Dosage to be administered, if different from container
 - d. Time to be administered
4. Due to storage restrictions, medications other than prescription should, if possible, be in a container no larger than 3" tall.

Physical Limitations – A note from the parent is necessary if there are physical limitations that affect the child's participation in any school activities. If a student is excused from physical education, they will also sit out on their break and lunch recess. Also following any extended illness or major surgery, a note from the physician is required indicating the extent of limitation and when the child can return to full activities.

Medical Emergencies – When these arise, school personnel will render first aid, contact the family or authorized person in their absence, contact the child's physician when necessary, or take the child to the nearest medical facility if needed.

Appointments – When possible, all medical and dental appointments are to be scheduled after school, when this is not possible, a note must be sent with the child on the day of the appointment indicating the time parents want to pick up the child and the reason. Children must sign in at the office and receive a pass to re-enter class.

HOMEWORK

Homework is given as an extension of daily lessons at school when it is a fitting continuation of the day's work. It is not given as busy work to fill the hours in the evening, but rather it is assigned for the purpose of establishing independent study habits, of practicing skills already correctly established, for memorizing material necessary for further understanding in class, or to develop individual creative assignments.

It is important that a student have regular study conditions at home, a regular time and place where he/she can study with no distractions or interruptions and be efficient in use of this time. There should be no telephone, no television, and no radio.

All lessons are explained to students in class. New work is never assigned for homework. Children having difficulty with a lesson should ask the teacher for help the next day. The child must bring to class the work attempted, so that the teacher can identify the specific problem.

The school realizes that parents are naturally interested in their children's work. Helping them with memorization, hearing spelling or vocabulary words, and reading aloud as well as talking about the day's events are important ways to share in a child's school life. Please notify your child's teacher if, in your opinion, your child is spending too little or too much time on his/her home lessons. If a student is unable to complete home assignments for a health reason or home emergency, parents are asked to send a note of explanation to the teacher. Otherwise, a student may lose credit for neglecting assignments.

When a student is absent, he/she is required to make up all work within the time equal to the number of days missed. Parents may call the school office to request assignments for absences of more than one day. **Please call the office before 10:00 a.m. to request assignments from teachers for the next day.**

This allows teachers to complete an assignment sheet during their conference periods. Assignments for single-day absences may be made up the next day at school.

HONOR ROLL

Third through Eighth Grades

“A” Honor Roll—90 or better in all academic subjects

“A/B” Honor Roll—A’s and B’s in academic subjects

A non-academic subject or conduct grade of two “NI’s” or one “U” automatically makes a student ineligible to be placed on the Honor Roll during that nine-week period.

LIBRARY

The school library is open from 8:00 a.m. until 3:15 p.m. Students attend library class on a regular basis to check out books, to work on special projects, to receive instruction in use of the library, and for listening to books read aloud. Parent volunteers are a valuable resource to the librarian.

Sixth, seventh, and eighth grade students will also use the Public Library and must have a library card. Teachers schedule time periodically and for special purposes, as does the Lower School.

Fines for overdue and lost books are assessed, and report cards are held in the school office until fines are paid.

LOST AND FOUND

Please identify all articles of clothing and other items with your child’s name. Lost and Found articles will be brought to the Lost and Found box each day, which you may find in the Library hallway. Please check the boxes regularly.

MESSAGES

The school office, located just inside the Moody Street entrance at Trinity Episcopal, is open from 7:45 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. daily. All messages to students or teachers, including requests for conferences and missed assignments, are made through the school office. The office staff will deliver messages if sufficient time is allowed. ***Please call only for real emergencies and educational reasons.***
Arrangements for after school activities must be made outside of school.

PARENT CONFERENCES

The Administration welcomes conferences with parents at any time at the convenience of the parent. Any concern or problem should be brought to the Administration’s attention immediately so that the best possible solution can be found before the problem gets out of hand. Teachers are available, by appointment, for conference. Telephone conferences can be helpful to parents and teachers. Your teacher(s) will make you aware of the best conference time. Teachers have a conference period each day. You may call the school office and request that a teacher return your call during conference period that day or the next. Parents are welcome to visit classrooms provided the office is notified in advance and teachers are advised of a visitor.

PARENT-SUBSTITUTE AUTHORIZATION

Parents must submit, in writing, to the school office the name of any other adult who is authorized to sign student permission slips. Only those names so indicated will be respected. This also applies to letting the

school know, with a note, who is caring for the child when parents are going out of town and leaving the child in the care of someone else, even if that person is a grandparent.

PARTIES

Christmas, Valentine's, and Easter parties are permitted the last hour before dismissal for all grades. An End-of-the-Year party is also held for all students.

Birthdays may be celebrated by the honoree bringing simple refreshments for the class at break time by prior arrangement with the teacher.

Invitations to home birthday parties may be distributed at school only if all members of the class are invited.

REPORT CARDS/PROGRESS REPORTS

K-3 receives reports bi-annually. K-4 receives reports in November, February, and May. Parent conferences are held during the first quarter.

For grades K-5 – 8, the academic year is divided into four 9-week periods with interim reports sent home after 4 ½ weeks of each period. Parent conferences are held in early Fall. The teacher will notify parents if a student is having difficulty at any other time during grading periods.

Teachers administer a battery of standardized academic tests each year to grades 1 – 8 at a predetermined time. Results are communicated to parents.

Grading in grades 1 – 2 reflects the developmental diversity, that occurs between the ages of three and seven. Children in this range experience an “explosion of growth” in all areas of development – physical, emotional, and cognitive. Because development is so rapid during these years and because each child is following his/her own developmental timetable, a wide range of levels exists at any single chronological age. This diversity must be taken into account in planning any program and recording progress.

Grades 1 and 2:

Academic subjects are Reading, English, Social Studies, Science, Spelling, and Math and are reported as follows:

V = Very Good	S = Satisfactory
NI = Needs Improvement	U = Unsatisfactory

Other subjects include Music, Art, Computer, Spanish, and Physical Education and are reported as follows:

S = Satisfactory	NI = Needs Improvement	U = Unsatisfactory
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Grades 3 – 8:

Academic subjects include Reading, English, Spelling, Math, Social Studies, and Science. Spanish is included as a core subject in grades 6–8. These subjects are reported as follows:

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TELEPHONES

The telephones in the school office are business telephones. Students may not call home to have an assignment or library book delivered. Make after-school arrangements with your child before school. Students may not call during the school day or immediately after school to make these arrangements.

TEXTBOOKS

Textbooks are provided to students by the school and issued by the classroom teacher. Students are responsible for the care of the books they receive. Loss or damage (including writing inside books) will result in a replacement charge or fine to the student. Report cards and records are held until damage or replacement costs are paid. Textbooks are to be covered at all times. The reading program in grades 5 – 8, and sometimes grades 3 and 4, may require the use of paperback books. Parents are asked to purchase paperbacks, which are considered consumable and can be marked for learning by students.

TUTORIALS/TUTORS

Teachers are available, by appointment or at their own request, to assist students who may need help with specific problems related to school work. Teachers are also available after school.

A Trinity teacher does not accept money for working on a specific problem with a child currently in his/her class. If parents wish to engage a tutor, they may contact the Headmaster for suggestions. Tutoring during school hours must be arranged with the Headmaster.

RULES AND GUIDELINES

CAFETERIA INFORMATION AND GUIDELINES

NO SOFT DRINKS

Administration will assist the teachers on duty daily. Students may sit where they choose, up to eight students per table. Parents and teachers are asked to encourage and frequently discuss proper table manners, use of utensils and appropriate lunch conversation. Administration will participate in assisting students with utensils, condiments, answering questions, visitation, and reinforcing a safe, pleasant lunch for all. Once the majority of the lunchroom has finished eating, upon instruction from Administration, students may begin cleanup – on, under, and around the tables. The teacher on duty will collect the group before lunch dismissal, monitor recess, or send second lunch to their next class.

PROCEDURE FOR LUNCH PURCHASES

All students may bring a sack lunch from home or purchase a hot school lunch. You will receive a calendar with an order form for the upcoming month's selection of lunches. **Promptly return your order form and include your payment by the due date listed on the form.** For a small fee, milk, juice, soup, fruit cups, and chips will be provided as supplements if your child brings a lunch. If your child did not order a hot lunch or bring a sack lunch from home, a plain cheese sandwich with milk will be provided. This is not an option on your lunch choices and will only be given in case of an emergency. There are microwaves available for grades 4 – 8. Students are asked to please clean any spills that may occur.

SNACKS/SNACK DRINKS

All students bring a snack for mid-morning. Those staying in our After School Care program until 5:30 p.m. may bring a second snack for the afternoon. Snack drinks for the mid-morning break will be available for your lower school child to purchase each day, or they may bring one from home. Your child will be asked to bring \$.25 each morning he/she wishes to purchase a snack drink from the school. Teachers in the classroom will collect this money. ***Again, you may send a drink each day with your child—it is not required they purchase one at school.*** However, if a child does not have \$.25, he/she will not be given a snack drink.

CARPOOL PROCEDURES

Trinity Episcopal School strives to provide a safe, effective system at school dismissal each day. In order to maintain this system, listed below is the information you will need to know when picking up and dropping off your children.

- All students will be dropped off only at the Moody Street Entrance each morning. The gates by the middle school on Guadalupe Street will be locked along with the entrance on Glass Street by the Parish Hall. This helps secure the school.
- All students, parents, and guests must stop at the school office. Persons picking up children during the day must sign the student out in the school office and sign them in upon return.
- Each family is assigned a “carpool number” during the summer. This number is placed on cardstock for you. ***This number is to be displayed in the RIGHT HAND CORNER OF YOUR VEHICLE WINDSHIELD when picking up your child(ren), easily displayed for the teachers on duty to see.*** The following instruction for pick up of students is to be followed **ALL YEAR, EACH DAY OF THE WEEK.**

GRADES K-3 AND K-4

Pickup is done only at the Center Vine Street Entrance. Cars are expected to flow through the circle drive approaching south to north. Please park in the side parking lot if you need to enter. No parking is allowed in front of any resident’s home on Vine Street.

GRADES K-5 – 5th

Pick up is done only at the school entrance on MOODY STREET. Cars are expected to approach the entrance south to north. As congestion dictates, the line of cars waiting to approach the entrance will extend around the corner onto Guadalupe Street and Glass Street. **Please do not block the entrance when picking up a student by parking your car on the street in front of the school at dismissal times for K-5 and Grades 1-5.**

Dismissal times are as follows:

K-3 and K-4 12:00 noon

K-5 2:00 p.m.

Grades 1 – 5 3:30 p.m.

GRADES 6 – 8

Student dismissal for grades 6–8 is 3:40p.m. each day. The following instructions are to be followed **ALL YEAR, EACH DAY OF THE WEEK.** Pick up for middle school children will be at the entrance on Glass Street by the Parish Hall. Cars are expected to approach the Parish Hall entrance north to south. As congestion dictates, the line of cars waiting to approach the entrance will extend around the Corner onto Colorado Street. The lower school teacher on duty will dismiss younger siblings of students in grades 6–8 who can also be picked up at the Glass Street entrance **after 3:30.**

ALL PERSONS PICKING UP STUDENTS ARE EXPECTED TO FOLLOW THESE RULES AT ALL TIMES TO INSURE THE SAFETY OF CHILDREN.

- Do not park across the street from any pick-up location and expect your child to cross the street to get to your vehicle.
- Do not park your car, walk to the door with your carpool number, and ask for your child. This delays the dismissal process for those patiently following the rules and waiting in the carpool line. This also causes confusion for the teachers on duty who are trying to be very cautious and prompt in getting children loaded into vehicles.
- No child may change carpools or go home with another child without permission of the parent or guardian or a telephone call made to the office by the parent or guardian.
- All children are to be picked up no later than 10 minutes after dismissal time. After that time, children remaining must be picked up in After School Care for a fee.

Your full cooperation and patience is required in helping this system be effective. When an all school dismissal occurs, pick-up for all students will be at the Moody Street entrance/exit.

DISCIPLINE CODE

Policy and Procedure – This is our fifth year of Education in Cooperation with the Creator. During the year much time will be spent on developing a clear methodology of disciplining our students in the Lord. We are developing a true principles approach to discipline. As always, Scripture will be our resource. Other supplements will be used for the ideas as long as those suggestions filter through the biblical model of God’s Truth. In keeping with the goal of developing God-centered students, there are three basic principles to be reinforced:

Obedience – 2 John 6
Respectfulness – 1 Peter 2:17
Honesty – Proverbs 12:22

These principles will help provide a learning environment that is positive and productive. As we teach our students the characteristics that apply to these principles, it will be easier to guide a student back to a principle should he/she stray from it. Also, poor choices will result in appropriate consequences. The goal of Christian discipline is to develop within the student a response of obedience to God and His authority. Proper inculcation of these principles will have far-reaching effects on the future life of the student as they pursue God’s call in their lives.

Our plan is to guide our students to evaluate their choices and monitor their own behavior. Each student is a unique individual and is experiencing a different level of growing in responsibility. We want to seek a balance between what a student is willing and able to take responsibility for and what we, as teachers and staff, need to continue to monitor to help this growing process.

The following steps reflect a general school procedure for training our students with additions taken from *Teaching With Love and Logic* by Jim Faye and David Funk. Text copies are available for check out from our library.

STRATEGY FOR IMPLEMENTATION OF “LOVE AND LOGIC” DISCIPLINE PLAN

Grades one through eight will be given a pocket folder for each student. Each teacher will utilize nonverbal warnings (close proximity, tap on the shoulder, etc.) to redirect inappropriate behavior hindering learning. If behavior continues, the teacher will inform the student he/she would like to see him/her after class. At that time the teacher will tell the student their perception of his/her inappropriate behavior that it has hindered his/her learning, the learning of others, and the ability of the teacher to teach. This student conversation is not up for discussion, should be brief and under one minute. The child will

continue to his/her next class. The teacher will immediately enter the date and a brief phrase stating the infraction (talking out of turn, inappropriate comments, etc.) into the student's folder. This again should be brief and under a minute to quickly resume teaching. If there is a desire from student or teacher to discuss things further, at any time, they may meet after school. If the behavior continues after only a few student conferences, teachers are asked to fill out a three-copy discipline slip. The teacher will keep the white copy and the student receives the pink. Teachers are to contact parents by phone before the next school day to inform/leave message that a slip is forthcoming, to ask for support or suggestions, and to encourage reinforcement of proper school behavior in order for all children to learn at Trinity. The yellow copy is to be dated and initialed again by the teacher letting the Assistant Headmistress know communication has been made. Place the copy in her mailbox by the following day. If students repeatedly disrupt learning and if numerous (2-4) slips have been received by the Assistant Headmistress, In-School-Suspension (ISS) may be administered and held in the study carrels in the library. Parents will be notified immediately. If a student repeatedly attends ISS, Out-Of-School Suspension (OSS) may be administered. At that time discussion on continued student attendance at Trinity School will be addressed. Late work or lack of school supplies is seen as poor work habits not a behavioral infraction. Individual classrooms will set and inform you of their own policy (points off, detention, etc.). In addition, daily parental notification by teachers will be made. It is imperative that students attend Trinity School in a safe and encouraging environment, allowing all students the opportunity to learn and all teachers the ability to teach. God given gifts may then blossom.

SHINING SPIRIT

Each grade will be responsible for helping to build good character and Christian values. Teachers are asked to choose at least one student daily to give a "Shining Spirit" award. If convenient, the child will deliver it to the Assistant Headmistress's office for congratulations. If she is unavailable, students and/or teachers are to place the award in her mailbox at the end of each day. Any other teacher or staff member may award a student with a "Shining Star" if desired and deserved. Again, they are to be taken to the Assistant Headmistress's mailbox at the end of the day. At that time, she will post all awards on the "Wall of Honor" outside the library. Awards will be periodically taken down and returned to students allowing for space and awaiting further awards. The Trinity family is encouraged to view the Wall of Honor regularly to help support each child as they grow in grace.

HONOR STUDENTS

Each Wednesday during Chapel, homeroom teachers will recognize any student exhibiting great character and Christian spirit. At that time administration, Trinity's rector, and fellow schoolmates will congratulate students.

EXPECTATIONS

Part of discipline is setting forth the standards of conduct that are expected. The following includes examples of some of our expectations.

1. Students must **respect** the authority of all teachers, office staff, and administration.
2. Students must be **respectful** of others' rights and property; this applies to both school and individuals.
3. Students must be **respectful** of others' personal space. This includes any physical contact that is inappropriate. Public display of affection (PDA) is inappropriate in a school (or school-related) setting.
4. Students are to be **honest**.
5. Students are to walk in the classrooms and hallways.

6. Students are not to use abusive, crude, vulgar, or profane language—written, spoken, or gestured.
7. Students are not to leave the classroom or the property without permission.
8. Students are expected to observe all contraband restrictions listed below.

CONTRABAND

The following items are NOT allowed on school grounds or in the school buildings BEFORE, DURING, or AFTER school hours. All items considered as contraband are subject to confiscation.

- Any items that are illegal for students on private or public school grounds in the State of Texas (e.g., beepers, pagers, weapons)
- Any objects that could be harmful to students or property
- Gum (Students who chew gum on school property may be assigned to appropriate remedial service activities.)
- Radios, CD players, Walkmans, walkie-talkies, Gameboys, and other electronic games (including those on calculators), etc.
- All games or toys (including sports-cards and other collections) unless special permission has been given by the administrators or classroom teacher
- Magazines, newspapers, or other reading material not specifically permitted by classroom teacher for a particular assignment or project
- Any media (books, videos, tapes, CDs, etc.) that advocate aspects of a lifestyle contrary to Biblical Christianity

CELL PHONE USE

Students may carry cell phones in their backpacks to be used in case of a school emergency. Cell phones are to be kept off and in their bags during the school day and while in the school building.

BEHAVIOR MODIFICATION TECHNIQUES

The following techniques may be used by teachers at various times to encourage appropriate, correct student behavior:

1. Positive rewards
2. Written behavioral contract
3. Written assignments, school rules, and a letter of apology
4. Students' calls home to report unacceptable behavior
5. "Timeout" in or out of the classroom
6. Lunch time/after school detention
7. Exclusion from extra-curricular activities
8. Assigned school duties (other than academic)

DRESS CODE AND SCHOOL UNIFORMS

Uniforms are required at Trinity Episcopal School and are an integral part of the overall Christian environment. A school expectation is that the dress code is followed by all students of the school. Please review the uniform requirements before you purchase your child's clothing for the upcoming school year. Attention to uniform policy will eliminate confusion and assist in maintaining an appropriate learning environment. Our local vendor for Trinity's school uniform is *Melvin's* and our shoe vendor is *Premier Sporting Goods*.

General provisions applicable to all students are listed below.

- All students in grades K-3 through 8 must wear only those uniform items listed below.
- K-3 students are asked to wear elastic waistbands on shorts. No belts
- K-3 through 5 girls must wear navy shorts or navy bike shorts under a skirt or jumper.
- Uniform sweaters and Trinity sweatshirts may be worn in the classrooms. Cold weather outerwear is permitted, but may not be worn in the classrooms.
- Students' shirt tails must be tucked in **AT ALL TIMES**.
- Caps are not a part of the school uniform and are **not permissible**.
- Athletic shoes should be colors that coordinate with our uniform (blue, black, white or gray) and non-skid soles). **No fluorescent, pink, purple, etc, high tops, lighted shoes, wheeled shoes, or skater shoes.**
- White and Green Trinity logo polo shirts will be the uniform for the lower school, K-3 through 5th, and the White and Navy Trinity logo polo shirts will be for the middle school, 6th through 8th.
- Middle School Girls:
 - Conservatively applied make up
 - Jumper and skirt lengths are to be worn no shorter than 2 inches above the top of the knee.
- Free Dress Day - On occasion, students will be given a "free dress" day. This does not mean "sloppy", "work-out" or "messy" dress. Shorts are to be the same length as uniform shorts; shirts may have no advertising (logos or emblems) of alcoholic beverages, illicit drugs, or tobacco products. Shirrtails must be tucked in at all times.
- Middle School students wear dress blue or plaid on Chapel Days. All other days may be everyday khaki, blue or plaid.

Approved Uniform for Girls

- **Dress Uniform – CHAPEL DAY DRESS - White** Peter Pan or button-down shirt (short or long sleeve), plaid jumper or skirt, navy continental tie, approved shoes (listed below), and white ankle socks.
- **Hair Ornaments** – Clips, headbands and bows should be appropriate colors to compliment the uniform, as monitored by Administration
- **Jumper** – School plaid, drop waist, or knife pleat
- **Skirt** – School plaid
- **Skirt** – navy or Khaki*
- **Walking Shorts** – Navy blue with belt loops; belt in navy, brown, or blue. Must be worn when blouse is tucked in. Khaki*
- **Slacks** – Navy blue twill (no patch pockets), Khaki*
- **Shirts** – White oxford, long or short sleeve (tucked in); long or short sleeve knit polo shirt with Trinity Logo; lower school students wear white or green; middle school students wear white or navy.

- **Ties** – Navy continental style
- **Sweaters** – Button cardigan (may be worn inside) – navy
- **Socks** – Ankle or knee socks in solid colors (navy, white)
- **Tights** – Solid colors (navy, white)
- **Shoes** – Athletic shoes should be colors that coordinate with our uniform (black, blue, white or gray) with non-skid soles. *No fluorescent, pink, purple, etc, high tops or lighted shoes.*
- **Docksiders** – Leather, navy or brown (optional)
- **Jewelry** – Must be simple, tasteful, and safe due to physical education requirements. Students will be responsible for the safekeeping of jewelry if removed.

Other:

- No make up is allowed for lower school (see rules applying to middle school girls).
- Trinity sweatshirt must have a uniform shirt underneath when worn.
- *Khaki applies to middle school grades 6 – 8 only.

Approved Uniform for Boys

- **Dress Uniform – CHAPEL DAY DRESS** – White oxford shirt, long-sleeve or short-sleeve, navy blue trousers or shorts (on certain field trips, trousers may be a requirement), navy school uniform tie, belt, approved shoes (listed below).
- **Shirts** – White oxford, long or short sleeve (tucked in); long- or short-sleeve knit polo shirt with Trinity Logo; lower school students wear white or green; middle school students wear white or navy (tucked in)
- **Tie** – Navy blue school uniform tie
- **Trousers** – Navy dress slacks (no patch pockets), Khaki*
- **Walking Shorts** – Navy (no patch pockets), Khaki*
- **Sweaters** – Navy (may be worn inside)
- **Socks** – Navy or white
- **Shoes** – Athletic shoes (low top) with half soles, solid colors only (Black, white, blue or gray)
- **Docksiders** – Leather, navy or brown (optional)
- **Belts** – Required with shorts and trousers (navy, brown, or black)
- **Jewelry** – Must be simple, tasteful, and safe due to physical education requirements. Students will be responsible for the safekeeping of jewelry if removed.

Other:

- Trinity sweatshirt must be over a uniform shirt when worn.
- *Khaki only applies to middle school grades 6 – 8 only.

ADHERENCE TO THE DRESS CODE IS EXPECTED AT ALL TIMES.

FIELD TRIP CHAPERONE GUIDELINES

Trinity thanks you for agreeing to accompany students on their field trips. Without your efforts, our children would not enjoy the many benefits that field trips provide. These guidelines will insure safety, uniformity, and continuity while on outings.

The following guidelines are designed to insure a successful experience for students and parents:

1. Read, sign, and return the policy on transportation of students by private automobile to and from school-sponsored events, along with a copy of your car insurance and driver's license.
2. To insure proper supervision of students, younger siblings may **not** accompany chaperones on field trips.
3. The teacher's role is to oversee the entire group and make sure the itinerary is followed. When possible, the teacher is not assigned students to oversee. This allows the teacher to move freely within the group and toured area and respond to any emergency situation that may arise. It also allows him/her to take over the supervision of any student who does not adhere to rules and/or parent supervision.
4. Any student who does not adhere to guidelines and rules or otherwise becomes a problem is assigned to the teacher for the remainder of the trip. Parent chaperones are to consider themselves as supervisors and sometimes teachers of the students. Their role is to oversee the behavior of the children. For some field trips, the teacher may prepare a parent's guide of what is being viewed with questions to discuss with the students. It is expected that students walk with the chaperones at all times as a group, use quiet and courteous voices, keep their hands and feet to themselves, and practice appropriate behavior that does not draw the attention of others.
5. When the students are directed to spread out, chaperones spread out with their assignees. If the group is directed to sit or gather as a large group, chaperones spread out evenly to oversee the group.
6. If stops are necessary on an out-of-town outing to obtain refreshments, the parent chaperone takes an order from the group in his/her car and obtains the refreshments. No more than two students at a time are allowed into convenience stores to use the restroom. Unless the teacher requires a stop during a Victoria-area trip, none is to be made.
7. It is the responsibility of the parent chaperone to oversee the safety of our students at all times. Supervising students on a school-sponsored trip requires more rigid demands of both students and adults than a personal outing with your child and a few of his/her friends. Do not hesitate to correct any student regarding inappropriate behavior or noncompliance of rules. We appreciate your cooperation. If you have any questions, please call the Headmaster at 573-3220.

SCHOOL RULES

The purpose of school-wide rules is to insure that children act with respect to themselves and to their families, school, guests, and fellow students. Students who do not follow the school rules will be subject to disciplinary procedures. Students may not:

1. Fight, trip, shove, hit, or physically interfere with other students
2. **Steal
3. Cheat
4. Use foul language
5. Show disrespect for teachers or other adults or students
6. Bring objects to school for sale or trade
7. Throw any object, except as a part of a teacher-directed school activity
8. **Damage school or personal property

9. Run in class, in halls, or at carpool
10. Leave campus during their school day without clearance from the school office
11. Chew gum at school
12. *Use or possess or be under the influence of controlled substances (e.g., drugs, alcohol)
13. *Bring weapons to school
14. Take computer software home or bring computer software to school without permission of the computer teacher.

*Violation of rule may result in immediate and permanent dismissal.

**Student will pay for damage and/or replacement.

SCHOOL-SPONSORED SOCIALS (Grades 6 – 8)

Guidelines for the hosting of a school-sponsored social:

1. Trinity Episcopal middle school students may invite a maximum of two guests. Names of guests must be submitted to the office no later than one day prior to the event. Guests must be of middle-school age.
2. Students are admitted only once to the event. (No one may leave and return.)
3. No decorations may be placed on the walls or from ceilings of the space being used without the approval of the Headmaster.
4. Use of space, other than Trinity Episcopal Church, to host a school-sponsored event must be approved by the Headmaster.
5. If using Trinity Episcopal Church for a school-sponsored event, the church must be notified for availability.
6. Only occupancy of assigned space is permitted.
7. Anyone damaging property is liable for its repair or replacement.
8. Six chaperones, parents, or faculty must be on the floor at all times.
9. A minimum of two chaperones must remain until all students are picked up by their parents. If a student is to leave the event with someone other than a parent, a note from the parent must be given to the Faculty Sponsor or designated school person. The note must state specifically with whom a student may leave.
10. Students must follow rules; non-compliance will result in students being picked up by his/her parent at that time.
11. Submit a plan of the event that includes the following information to Administration:
 - a. The date, time, and location of event
 - b. A list of chaperones, parents, and faculty, and their scheduled “duty” time
 - c. Means of providing music and type of musical selections
 - d. A list of people designated to clean up, naming one adult chairperson

STUDENT LOCKERS/STORAGE

Student lockers and/or storage areas are to be kept clean and orderly and may not contain items irrelevant to the educational process. Lockers and/or storage areas are checked by teachers periodically. Teachers and administration reserve the right to open any locker and/or storage area at any time.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

1. Attend school daily, except when ill, and be on time for all classes.
2. Be aware of all school rules for appropriate student behavior.
3. Wear required school uniform everyday, except for special days assigned by teacher and/or Administration.
4. Be prepared for each class with school materials and completed homework assignments.
5. Respect the property of other students.
6. Be kind to all students. Do not use profanity or threatening words.
7. Show respect for all adults, including teachers, administrators, parents, and volunteers.
8. Help promote a good Christian atmosphere with trust, kindness, and friendship.

PROGRAMS

AFTER-SCHOOL SPORTS

The objective of the athletic program is to develop the individual athletic skills of each student, to teach the fundamentals of each sport, and to encourage students to participate in a competitive extracurricular program. Students participating in any after-school sports program must receive a physical. Forms are available before the first sport begins. Students who anticipate participating in any after-school sport during the year must complete the form. Specific sports available are announced at the beginning of the school year and are dependent on competition with other private schools in the area. Participation requires a student to maintain at least a 70 average in each class. The coach is informed at two-week intervals of any student's grades falling below 70 or an "NI" in a nonacademic subject or conduct. When a player receives a failing report, a "U" conduct grade or a "U" non-academic subject grade at any two-week reporting period, he/she is not allowed to participate in any team activities until the end of the following two-week grading period and he/she demonstrates a passing average. A student can be dismissed from the team if he/she misses more than two scheduled practices without a written excuse submitted prior to the absence or, in the case of an emergency, the day following the missed practice. These rules were created to encourage players to stay current in their academic work, to practice self-discipline, and to foster team dedication. Students who are not participating in a school-sponsored sports team or not enrolled in the After School Care program may not remain on campus after dismissal time without a parent present.

CHAPEL AND CHRISTIAN DEVELOPMENT

The school's chapel services provide the entire student body and faculty with the opportunity to offer our many and varied activities before the altar of God, the center of our corporate life. Spiritual growth is a total developmental process with each personality. Consequently, emphasis is placed upon the total implication of living out the Christian faith in our daily lives.

As faculty and staff, we keenly feel our responsibility in fostering this vital aspect of the school program by our regular attendance at weekly chapel and through our teaching relationships with our students. All teachers and students participate in these chapel services. All classes are given regular weekly instruction, according to grade level, in Christian faith and life.

Parents are welcome to attend any of our services. **Weekly chapel services will be held on Wednesdays at 8:05 at Trinity Episcopal Church.** The service is approximately 30 minutes in length.

MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENT SERVICE COUNCIL

The Middle School Student Service Council is composed of student representatives from grades 6–8. The purpose is to give every student in the middle school the opportunity to participate in a decision-making body governed by Roberts’ Rules of Order. Students elect officers, serve on committees, and make group advisory decisions. School and community service is its focus. The middle school council sponsors the two Ingatherings of the year. Its primary fundraiser is the selling of Trinity T-shirts, sweatshirts, and totes.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

Trinity Episcopal Middle School is a chartered member of the National Honor Society Association. A chapter’s purpose is to create enthusiasm for scholarship, to stimulate a desire to render service, to promote leadership, and to develop character in the students of secondary schools.

Membership in this chapter shall be based on scholarship, school citizenship, service, leadership and character.

To be eligible for membership in this chapter, the student must have completed one semester at Trinity Episcopal Middle School. Election may take place during the second semester of attendance.

All pupils of Trinity Episcopal Middle School, after completing one semester in seventh grade, who have a cumulative scholastic average of 90.0, excluding physical education and athletics, and at least an “S” in non-graded electives at the end of the previous semester, shall be eligible to candidacy in the society. Students must also have completion and evidence of school or community service hours — 10 hours minimum. Such required scholastic achievement level shall remain fixed and all students who can rise in scholarship to, or above, shall be admitted to candidacy or election to membership. Their further eligibility shall then be considered on their school citizenship, service, leadership, and character.

Entrance into NJHS is a one-time only privilege. If you fail to meet the membership maintenance requirements and your membership is terminated, you may only enter again according to your new school’s bylaws.

APPENDICES

COMPUTER USE POLICY

Policy for Acceptable Use of the School's Electronic Communication System and Internet Access

Students may be given access to Trinity Episcopal School's (the "School") electronic communications system (ECS) for educational purposes. **The electronic communications system is defined as the School's network, servers, computer workstations, peripherals, applications, databases, online resources, Internet access, email and any other technology designated for use by the students.**

This educational opportunity is a privilege, not a right. Therefore, it comes with responsibility. It is important that students and parents read the Regulation for Acceptable Use Policy. Noncompliance will result in the consequences below, including suspension of access or termination of privileges.

Please note that Internet access is part of the School's electronic communications system. The Internet is a network of many types of communication and information networks enabling students to explore thousands of libraries, databases, and other resources while exchanging messages with people around the world. The School expects that faculty will blend thoughtful use of the School's ECS and the Internet throughout the curriculum and will provide guidance and instruction to students in their use. Although users will be monitored, they are responsible for their own use of the ECS. The School shall not be liable to any user or to any third party for person's inappropriate use of the ECS, violations of copyright laws, mistakes or negligence, or costs incurred by users. The School shall not be responsible for ensuring accuracy, age appropriateness, or usability of any information found on the Internet. ECS users and parents/guardians of Trinity students should be aware that information and other materials accessible by means of the ECS access may include inaccurate or objectionable material. It will be each student's responsibility to follow the rules for appropriate and acceptable use.

SOME RULES FOR APPROPRIATE USE

Students must only open, view, modify, and delete their own computer files, unless they have specific permission from a teacher or staff member to do otherwise.

Internet use at school must be directly related to school assignments and projects.

Students may be assigned an individual email address or account and must use only those accounts and passwords that they have been granted permission to use. All account activity should be for educational purposes only.

INAPPROPRIATE USES

Using Trinity's ECS for illegal purposes.

Sharing your user name and password with others, borrowing someone else's user name, password or account access.

Purposefully opening, viewing, using, or deleting files that belong to another user without permission.

Electronically posting information about yourself or others.

Downloading or plagiarizing copyrighted information without permission from the copyright holder.

Playing computer games unless directed by a teacher.

CONSEQUENCES FOR INAPPROPRIATE USE

Suspension of access to the School's electronic communication system;

Revocation of the School's ECS account(s); and/or

Other appropriate disciplinary or legal action in accordance with the Discipline Code as set forth in this handbook.

DRUG-FREE SCHOOL POLICY

Trinity Episcopal School has a responsibility to our employees, staff, parents, and students to assure that our operations are free from the effects of drug, alcohol, or other substance abuse. The purpose of this policy statement is to reemphasize the school's policy on the use of drugs, alcohol, and other intoxicating substances and to develop procedures to address and control their use. This policy applies to all employees, contractors, and students of Trinity Episcopal School.

Policy

Trinity Episcopal School:

1. Prohibits the possession, sale, distribution, and/or use by its employees, contractors, and students of, and
2. Does not tolerate its employees, contractors, or students being under the influence of or in a state indicating the use or abuse of any illegal drugs, or other mind, mood, or body-altering substances, alcoholic beverages, or prescription drugs (except when taken as directed by the employee's, contractor's, or student's doctor) at any time while on school premises (including parking lots, playgrounds, and school vehicles), on school business, or school activities. Reporting to work for classes or other school activities and/or working or attending the same under the influence of or in a state indicating the use or abuse of alcohol, illegal drugs, or other mind-, mood-, or body-altering substances is a violation of school policy.

Definitions

As used in this policy the word "drug" includes alcoholic beverages, inhalants, other substances capable of causing intoxication or altering bodily functions regardless of how introduced, illegal drugs, prescription drugs that are not prescribed for current medical treatment by the employee's physician, and prescription drugs taken in amounts exceeding the prescribed dosage. "Illegal drugs" are those substances defined as illegal under federal, state, or local laws including, but not limited to, marijuana, heroin, hashish, cocaine, hallucinogens, and depressants and stimulants not prescribed for current medical treatment by an employee's, contractor's, or student's physician.

Consequences of Violation

An employee, contractor, or student who violates a provision of this policy can and may be subject to disciplinary action up to, and including, termination.

Available Treatment

Trinity Episcopal School encourages employees, contractors, and students who recognize that they have problems with drug addiction, alcoholism, or other substance abuse to resolve those problems voluntarily through pastoral assistance, treatment, counseling, or other means. Trinity Episcopal School does not sponsor or make available any employee assistance/rehabilitation programs for alcohol or substance abuse, but it will make reasonable efforts to advise its employees, contractors, and students who seek assistance of community resources what may be available to them in this regard. **Participation in a rehabilitation or treatment program, counseling, or other positive actions by an employee, contractor, or student will not, however, excuse non-compliance with the policies of the school.**

Drug Testing

All applicants for a position with the school and incoming students will, if and when requested to do so, submit to a urinalysis for the purpose of detecting any illegal drugs. The school does not presently have a regular testing program for existing employees, contractors, or students, but reserves the right to institute such program at any time.

HARASSMENT POLICY

GENERAL POLICY

Trinity Episcopal School seeks to be a community in which every individual is treated with sensitivity and respect. The school encourages consideration of others and will not tolerate harassment of individuals based on ethnic or religious background, race, sex, or sexual orientation.

The environment necessary for the educational program and fostered by the school must be one in which all individuals are free to work, learn, and develop appropriate relationships. The individual must be able to pursue his or her work or academic program without fear of intimidation, humiliation, or degradation from the unwelcome and unacceptable behavior of another.

It is the policy of the school to prevent, correct, and remedy any form of harassment. All students, faculty, staff, and volunteers are subject to this policy. Individuals who engage in such behavior are subject to discipline up to, and including, discharge, expulsion, or other appropriate sanctions.

ETHNIC, RELIGIOUS, OR RACIAL HARASSMENT

Ethnic, religious, or racial harassment is an abuse of an individual or group on the basis of ethnicity, religious preference, or race. Harassment includes both easily identifiable acts of verbal, written, or physical abuse and subtler, but equally damaging, forms of harassment such as graffiti, epithets, and stereotyped remarks or humor.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT

Sexual harassment is a violation of anti-discrimination laws. It is defined as unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature when: (1) submission to or rejection of such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of employment or a basis for employment decisions; (2) such conduct has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with an individual's work performance; (3) such conduct has the purpose or effect of creating a hostile, intimidating, or offensive work environment (Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964).

Activities that may constitute Sexual Harassment, include, but are not limited to:

1. Physical assault
2. Subtle pressure for sexual activity
3. Any demeaning sexual propositions
4. Inappropriate touching
5. Sexually explicit or suggestive remarks about a person's physical attributes, clothing, or behavior
6. Sexually stereotyped insults, humor, or verbal abuse
7. Inappropriate personal questions
8. Inappropriate or exploitive media such as, but not limited to, posters, calendars, magazines, movies, and e-mails.

While unwelcome sexual advances are prohibited between employees of Trinity Episcopal School, any and all sexual advances are strictly prohibited toward students, even if a student is apparently accepting of them.

REPORTING PROCEDURE

Any alleged violation of the Harassment Policy should be reported immediately. When the accused or accuser is a faculty or staff member of the school, grievances may be brought to the Headmaster or Assistant Headmistress. When the accused or accuser is a student, grievances may be brought to a teacher, the Headmaster, or Assistant Headmistress.

If a student or colleague comes to you with a report of harassment, follow these guidelines:

1. Allow the individual to express his/her feelings. Avoid asking for details.
2. Report the incident to the Headmaster or Assistant Headmistress.
3. Maintain confidentiality.

INVESTIGATIVE PROCEDURE

Any alleged violations of the Harassment Policy involving students, faculty, or staff will be promptly investigated in a timely and appropriate manner, depending upon the circumstances of the individual case. In an effort to protect the alleged accused and accuser, the school will make all reasonable efforts to keep the matter confidential, except as required by law.

The investigation process will be under the discretion of the Headmaster or Assistant Headmistress. Depending on the circumstances of the case, the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees may be called upon to review the case and submit recommendations to the Headmaster or Assistant Headmistress.

Following a full investigation of the circumstances, if the evidence suggests that action is appropriate, depending on the severity of the offence, sanctions may include, but are not limited to:

1. An apology to the individual(s) involved
2. Participation in appropriate counseling
3. Probation, suspension, non-renewal of appointment, or termination.

**TRANSPORTATION POLICY
OF STUDENTS BY PRIVATE AUTOMOBILE TO AND
FROM SCHOOL-SPONSORED EVENTS**

It is the policy of the Parish School (DBA Trinity Episcopal School) that:

1. All persons transporting students by private automobile to or from school-sponsored events possess a valid Texas driver's license, be in compliance with all restrictions contained therein, and otherwise be legally qualified to operate the particular motor vehicle being used. Such persons shall not be under the influence of alcohol, any prescription or non-prescription drug, nor any other substance whatsoever that will or might affect in any manner that person's ability to operate a motor vehicle.
2. All vehicles used to transport students to or from sponsored events be properly licensed, currently inspected and otherwise are in all things legally equipped for operation on public streets and highways. At minimum, all such vehicles shall be equipped with lap and shoulder restraints for front seat passengers and lap restraints for all other passengers.
3. The operator and passengers of any vehicle being used shall observe all applicable laws to transport students to or from any school-sponsored event. No such vehicle shall be occupied by more persons than there are seat belts or restraints. Such belts and restraints shall be used in the manner designed at all times that the vehicle is being operated.

It is the responsibility of the person operating any motor vehicle used to transport students to or from any school-sponsored event to comply with this policy as so stated.

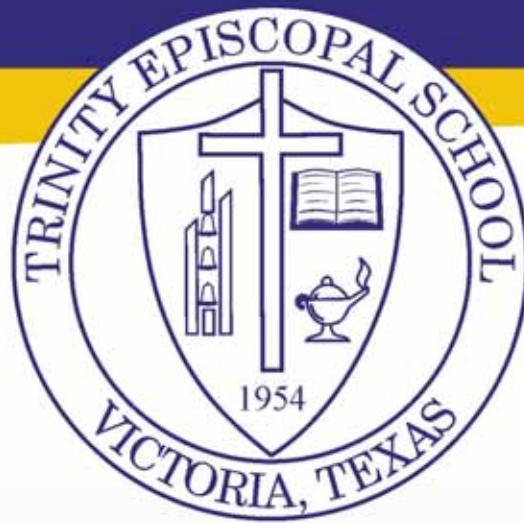
