From the Canon Administrator

It is that time of year when we begin to look at our programs and funding for the coming year. What we call the "Annual Campaign" usually begins with an appeal from the clergy for you to carefully consider what you will give to the support of St. Andrew's in the coming year. It might also include something about the "tithe" (10%) being the standard for the minimum level of giving in the Episcopal Church as set by the

General Convention in 1979.

This past summer in the newsletter "Networking," published by The Episcopal Network for Stewardship (TENS) there was an interesting article about the stewardship ministry of St. Matthew's Episcopal Church, Brecksville, Ohio. The article began with their examination of "the fundamental issue at the core of stewardship programming: why people give, or fail to give, to the church."

The answer they

discovered to the question was "FEAR." "People of faith give because they fear God. Not in the modern 'scared' sense, but in the ancient 'awed' sense. They have a personal relationship with God who has cared for them and provided for their needs. They know who God is, who they are, and what God asks of them. Finally, they know that God will continue to take care of them. As a result, they give of their time and treasure with joy and

without anxiety, secure in the knowledge that God will reward them for their faithfulness. People who fail to give or who 'undergive' also do so out of fear...they fear not having enough: not enough money, not enough time to do the things they have to do. This fear stems from the absence of a relationship with God. As a result, they have to look out for themselves because no one else will."

Luke 12:34 says, "Where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." I think it is unfortunate that we tend to transpose the treasure and heart. It is easy for us to believe that if we just have a good heart we will be rewarded. As usual with Jesus,

he turns our world upside down. He asks us to examine where our treasure is so that we might know where our heart is as well.

In light of St. Matthew's Church discovery, the real question before us would seem to be, "Is your relationship with God truly what you treasure?"

I hope that you will reflect on that question over the next few weeks. November 12th will be our ingathering of pledge cards for 2007. I hope that your financial expression on that day will be in response to the awe and wonder that you have found with God in your life.

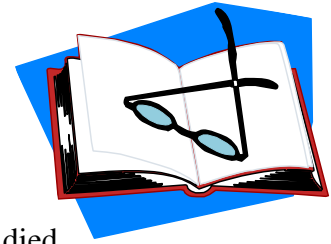

Damien the Leper

Fr. Damien did not contract leprosy until late in his comparatively short life. He died soon after his 49th birthday, having aroused worldwide awareness of leprosy and its victims. As a young man, of course, he had obeyed his father's wishes and studied to become a merchant; but his own desire to become a priest was so strong, it overcame parental disapproval. When the opportunity later arose for him to serve as a priest in the leper colony on Molokai in the distant Hawaiian Islands, nothing could stop him.

What he found on Molokai was appalling. Lepers were brought there from all over the Pacific area and dumped. Food was occasionally provided but never enough. No shelter existed. Most clothing was quickly reduced to rags. No one was in charge: the lepers accordingly preyed on one another. Here Damien found his life's work, bringing order into chaos. One of his first projects was to build small huts as shelters from the elements, followed by a chapel for worship services. Much of the carpentry work he did himself. He also built coffins and dug graves for the lepers

who died.

Word quickly spread concerning this remarkable white man who not only did not fear the lepers but enjoyed their company and did everything he could to improve their living conditions.

Damien contracted leprosy and died at the comparatively young age of 49. By this time his fame was universal and volunteers came from all over the world to continue his work. His body was returned to Belgium where he was buried with honors in the presence of the King of Belgium and the Cardinal Archbishop of Malines. †

The primary work of the Transition Committee is:

1. To be present to work with and support Bishop Chang, his family and the diocesan staff during the transition.
2. To be present to work with and support the Bishop-elect and his/her family as their ministry begins.
3. To work with the presiding bishop's office in regard to the consecration and ordination of the bishop-elect.

As such, the committee is focusing on several events that will help us and the diocese accomplish this work.

1. Several occasions where the diocesan family can celebrate with Bishop Chang and Dee are being planned. Rather than one large event in Honolulu, there will be smaller island-wide celebrations to coincide with one of the Bishop's regularly

scheduled visits to the island. On the calendar:

October 15 Maui
November 12/13 Hawai'i
February 11 Kaua'i
January 7 Moloka'i
January 14 O'ahu

We urge individuals or churches that want to give a "gift" to the Changs, that the most valuable gift (as suggested by the Changs) would be a donation to the Clergy Children's Scholarship Fund. This fund was initiated by the Bishop, a number of years ago, to help with the education expenses of clergy with children. This is particularly beneficial as the diocese attempts to attract young clergy families to the islands. Churches could make checks payable to: The Episcopal Church in Hawai'i, for *Clergy Children's Scholarship Fund*.

2. A slide show is planned for the Annual Convention Banquet on Friday, October 20th. Please search scrapbooks and old files - we would love to have pictures of Bishop Chang and his family to add to the show. Clergy, please help us collect pictures from your congregation and submit to The Rev. Daniel Leatherman. Email

(dleather@iolani.org) or call (943-2205) Dan for more specifics.

3. The committee would like to invite any interested churches to participate in a special Prayer Vigil activity. Beginning with the Sunday before convention, a different church would pray for Bishop and Mrs. Chang. They could send him a card/poster/ phone call/special pictures (the church/group could be creative with this), indicating that they are praying for him and Dee for the week. Following the election, the next church would pray for both the Changs and the newly elected bishop (and family, if appropriate). If your

church is interested in being a part of this activity, please email me (nfc@hawaii.rr.com). Also if you have a preference for a specific week, let me know. Based on those interested, I will develop a schedule and inform each church.

4. The committee is preparing a folder outlining things that will help a family settle in Hawai'i including housing options, schools, and medical support.

Trellis, Anyone?

Louise Lanzilotti, Honolulu Theater for Youth's CEO, presented to the B&G committee several detailed sketches for non-permanent attachments to the front left side (from Beretania) of Tenney Theater. This would simulate a visible entrance to the theater and, we hope, still pass muster with the state historical site review board. The committee likes the one that resembles an attractive trellis with greenery, and Glen Mason, our restoration architect, also likes it. He will run it past some members of the review board to get their feedback. Other plans are also attractive but may look

too permanent.

Days of Our Lives. In the roofs-and-floors on-going soap opera, the brand new Von Holt roof has been undergoing slipping-membrane diagnosis and has been partially fixed under the warranty. Its beautiful new floor is bubbling inappropriately in the center; a manufacturer's representative is being sent to see why. The organ pipe chamber's new copper roof also leaks, and the roofing company is due shortly. Organ specialists Terry Schoenstein and Bill Petty will assess the condition of the pipes. Once the repairs are finished, we can then re-schedule the re-plastering and painting of the apse ceiling, which had been targeted for December 2006. Lastly, the Tenney re-roofing project is going out to bid. It has already been budgeted, and work will be coordinated with HTY's performance schedule.

We'll Be So Clean! As part of our on-going maintenance work, we are presently accepting bids

for professional cleaning services to regularly clean the sanctuary and other areas of the cathedral buildings. The first bid was very high, so we are narrowing the scope a bit and trying to solicit more companies. In other maintenance work, Jim Harvey is currently securing the drainpipes, cleaning the gutters, painting the back wall of the Memorial Building, restriping parking stalls, attaching the plexiglass tract rack to the wall, and designing a new lock for the vault box in the narthex, which was broken into and destroyed.

No More Freckles. The stall dividers in the women's bathroom of the Memorial Building have had a rusty freckled complexion for some time, and finally will be replaced and the seat-cover receptacles lowered so that children can reach them.

Coming Attractions. The next *Nuts and Bolts* will feature news of all our stained glass!

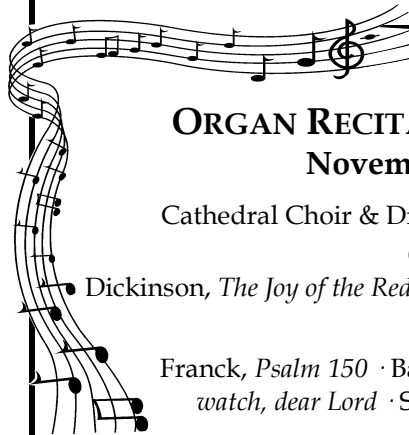

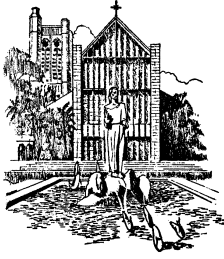

classroom and strengthen your classroom management skills. You will deepen your understanding of children's spirituality. Each activity takes place in a prayerful atmosphere of give and take with talented, creative Godly Play Teacher Trainers. You will improve your teaching skills, achieve greater clarity about the foundations of Godly Play and leave spiritually refreshed.

This training event is being sponsored by the Episcopal Diocese of Hawaii and St. Andrew's Cathedral. The training will consist of lively interactive learning activities.

Prior experience with Godly Play is helpful but not absolutely necessary. Participants are asked to read and complete a worksheet on The Complete Guide to Godly Play: Volume I by Jerome W. Berryman as a prerequisite of attendance. Each participant will be required to present a story or lesson in the presence of a trainer without notes. Upon successful completion of this training, a certificate of accreditation as a Godly Play Teacher will be awarded from the Center for the Theology of Childhood. The training will begin at 3 p.m. on January 11th and will conclude on January 13th at 5 p.m. Participants are required to be

present for the entire training experience.
