Chapter Busy at Work

Time is flying fast, and we are fast approaching the start of all the activities of a new program year. However, Chapter has been hard at work through the summer. Much of their work resulted from the two Chapter retreats held in September 2004 and April 2005. As the Chapter members sought to develop a clearer vision of the ministry of the

Cathedral, it became clear that we needed to have a clearer picture of how our ministries are organized and under whose leadership they did their work.

To fulfill this task, a task force of the Chapter has met weekly to prepare a process for doing and "inventory" of the Cathedral's ministries. As they thought about everything that happens here, they came up with the following general categories, each containing a number of activities or

groups:

- Parish Development
- Pastoral Care
- Finances
- Heritage

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primary oversight for each of the individual ministries. They will be exploring the following questions:

1. Describe your ministry as it currently works

4. What are your needs? Where are the gaps?
5. Does this ministry have a mission statement?
6. Assuming no restrictions, what do you think would invigorate, empower, or help you reach your goals with this ministry?
7. What is your vision of what this mission can become?
8. How do you see your ministry supporting the overall vision of the Cathedral?

Beyond these questions, each member of the congregation

needs to be asking him or herself, where do I fit in the ministries of St Andrew's. When I look at the general categories, is there an area in which I feel called to give my self in service to others? What more do I need to learn or to understand in order to deepen my faith? How can I contribute to the life and vision of this place of spirituality in the center of the city?

I recently read an article in Trinity

News, the magazine of Trinity Church - St. Paul's Chapel, New York, by Michael Durall, in which he states, "To me, a variation to the stewardship message is to convey without doubt that the responsibility of each and every member is to create a church that is a worthy and deserving recipient of their charitable giving."

This idea that each of us, laity and clergy, new member and long time member, young and old, wealthy and less wealthy, all play

some role in creating and sustaining the church, really struck a note within me. The challenge for all of us is to create and sustain a church that is worthy and deserving.

Godly Play and Maria Montessori

Godly Play uses play, ritual and stories to invite children into the presence of God to create meaning and direction for their lives. It is more like ancient storytelling around a campfire than modern schooling. It is also much like a Montessori

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classroom, where children choose the work that suits them best.

Maria Montessori (1870-1952) revolutionized the education of children by her commitment to creating appropriate educational

 environments, materials and methods that honor the natural development of the child.

In Godly Play, the Montessori method has been adopted and adapted to nurture the spiritual development of the child. Children are encouraged to be more active, creative and self-directed. They participate in a community of wondering children in a story circle. They are surrounded by inviting materials and given the time they need to listen, wonder, and reflect on the sacred story. As children grow, the stories don't change, but they may choose to reflect on them in more sophisticated and skillful ways. †

NUTS AND BOLTS

--by the St. Andrew's Buildings and Grounds Committee

Faith of Our
Fathers, Living
Still... The Glenn
Mason (Mason

Architects, Inc--MAI.)
Conditions Analysis Report has,
among many other things,
highlighted for us the
comprehensiveness of the acts of
faith of our predecessors at St.
Andrew's in giving us buildings
of such surpassing beauty and
superb quality to serve as
enduring tribute to the glory of
God. . Mr. Mason says, "(the
buildings)...not only convey a
rich history of the Episcopal
Church in Hawaii, but also
represent exceptional works of
architecture. The current
condition of the structures is a
testament to the high quality of

construction that created them."
His report then details
areas of concern. Although the
buildings are in good condition
generally, there is some major
damage from roof leaks, some of
which need addressing right
away. The buildings are largely
historically intact on the
exterior; Parke Chapel is a
beautiful example of 1930's
architecture (C.W. Dickey) and
Davies Hall of Gothic Splendor.
Mr. Mason has organized his
recommendations as: first, health
and safety; second, conditions
that cause damage and
deterioration which if left
unaddressed could be more
serious; and third, maintenance
considerations. The full report is
available for your reading in
Canon Tim Sexton's office, but,
in general, the priority list is: #1
Tenney roof, #2 apse ceiling, #3
choir room and Davies Hall, and
#4 a comprehensive maintenance
plan.

MAI will be consulting

with others on the structural
condition of the stained glass
windows (the condition of the
glass itself has been reported on)
and drainage and sitework. The
flatness of the site is a challenge,
as all the buildings in the close
may be sending drainwater onto
the foundations of the cathedral
buildings.

Perfect Pitch. The Bird Chase
ultrasonic unit installed in the
belfry revealed that the birds are
tone-deaf but the human
musicians have perfect pitch.
Avians were completely
unfazed. Choristers and church
musician were distressed.
Therefore, the unit has been
removed, and the only solution
left is to install, at great peril,
steel grills inside the cast
concrete louvers and permanent
climbing rungs, or something
similar, to facilitate access for
cleaning. The current ladder is
very dangerous on the winding
stairs, and we don't want Canon
Tim to fall off and hurt himself.
The very determined birds peck
apart any mesh installed on the
outside. Alas.

number of caregivers is more

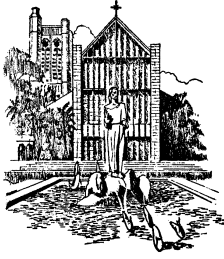
than 137,000. Most caregivers
