Hi, Richard.

I'm following up on some details in one of our SACS Compliance Report drafts (CS 3.10.6). If you can provide answers to these questions, please send them in a reply to this email.

1. Where are the seven Automatic External Defibrillators (AEDs) located on campus? Currently, I only know about the one in Founders Hall.

ANSWER: We have an AED at Founder Hall near room 155, in the University Center at the Information Desk, at the Housing Office by the copier, in the Media Center first floor by the elevator, in LSF/MSB by the vending machines, in the Fine Arts Building theater lobby, Stokes Admin Building near the Registrar's Office. I also have a unit that we carry in a patrol car.

2. Are campus police officers **required** to complete emergency medical first responder training and earn certification as National Registry Emergency Medical First Responders?

ANSWER: There is no written requirement that our officers undergo this training but we have put most officers through the basic and refresher training over the past few years. The officers that we have put through this training have received National Registry certification. With the County EMS unit stationed on campus our role is more immediate response and scene stabilization. We have direct radio contact with Central Dispatch and with the dispatched EMS units.

3. Is training and certification a condition of employment? If so, how long does a campus police officer have to complete the training and earn certification?

ANSWER: Not a condition of employment just another attempt to better serve our campus community. We try to get all new officers through the training program within 18 months depending on the training capability of the County EMS folks, the frequency of the offered training program and the needs of the university for departmental services.
